Ottawa, Sept. 25.—A mother and her daughter are lying in the Protestant Hospital in a precarious condition. They were shot late yesterday afternoon by the husband of the daughter. Joseph C. Savignac has been running a Turkish bath establishment in Ottawa, but the profits have been for the most part spent in liquor. Finding, after the unproductive summer months, his resources at an end, he announced to his wife that he was going to Florida to claim the estate of his father, who was recently killed, and left no will.

Fearing that her husband would discover her there she scrambled through the narrow window and rushed down the roadway towards the toll house, where refriends lived, but after proceeding quarter of a mile she fell unconscious. She was shot through both shoulders just below the shoulder blades. A neighbor took care of her.
