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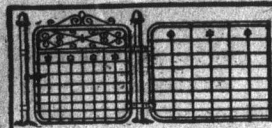

**A Motto Every Mother Should Use In

## LAUNDRY LINES.

warm water shrinks them.

A bit of orris root placed among

ed will pleasantly perfume them.

For starching muslins, gingham and  
calicoes dissolve a piece of alum the  
size of a hickory nut for every pint of  
starch. This will keep the colors bright  
for a long time.

Linen crash, blue denim and ticking  
are the best possible fabrics for cov-  
ering iron holders. Make them remova-  
ble by fastening one end together, and  
occasionally put them in the family  
wash.
