SUICIDE CAME FROM CHATHAM

Unidentified Man Found With Bullet Through his Heart at Port Stanley

Name May be John Ruff-Body Now Awaiting Inquest at Town Hall.

Port Stanley, Aug.21.—In a gully at the approach to the picnic grounds an undentified man committed suicide by shooting himself through the heart to-day at 2.30 o'clock and was found several hours later.

Where the man came from is not known. His name may be John Ruff. The, theory that he came from Chatham has been knocked out, because the authorities there state that they know of no man answering the description given.

He bought a ticket for Port Stanley at Chatham to-day, but spoke to no one, as far as is known. There was an excursion from Chatham and Ridgetown to-day.

Outside of this information there is nothing to show who he is or from what place he comes. The remains were examined and among a collection of minor articles, was found a dirty, sand-marked card with the name written, John Ruff, in faded ink.

The dead man is clothed in dark blue sack coat, and vest slate colored, striped pants, heavy woolen sox and No. 9 boots, and wore a black cap with hard cloth peak, seven and a quarter size, white shirt with brasstuds.

FOUND IN POCKETS.

In his pockets were two red, cotton handkerchiefs, two small combs, a box of morphine tablets, a ring on which were three small keys, small magnifying glass and 71 cents in change.

The man is about five feet six inches in height, grey moustache and heavy, grey chin whiskers, blue eyes.

The revolver shots were heard by the residents in the neighborhood about 2.30 o'clock, but the dead man was not discovered until some hours later.

The body is waiting inquest at the Town Hall.
