The Relation of the Church to the Liquor Traffic.

The Rev. E. J. Grant, recently lectured before the students of the New Brunswick University, Fredericton, on "The Church in Relation to Political and Social Questions."

A condensed report of this address appears in the St. John Sun of Feb. 5th, from which the following extract is taken—"Of course the times at my disposal forbids more than a brief reference to any of the great political evils calling for prompt and vigorous action on the part of the church. That the traffic in strong drink is the cause of most of the suffering, poverty and crime in this country is a fact that cannot be denied, that no one pretends to deny. And yet this fearful scourge, so destructive of our national wealth, so fraught with sorrow to our homes, so appalling in its blighting effects upon society; this fearful traffic, which thrusts its open sepulchre, under whose lips is the poison of sin, whose mouth is full of cursing and bitterness; whose feet are swift to shed blood; in whose ways are destruction and misery; and before whose eyes there is no feat of God, no regard for man; the destroyer of hope, of happiness, and of honor, is by the will of the people given a legal standing in this country for the sake of the revenue derived from it, but beyond the passing of feeble and oft meaningless resolutions at public meetings the church does nothing to suppress this fearful scourge."

I say that so far as the form and functions of government are concerned, with matters of political economy, social policy and purely trade questions, the church has nothing to do.

But I contend that when great moral principles are violated in the conduct of public affairs, when great social wrongs are being perpetrated upon the innocent and helpless members of society, the church not only has a right to be heard, but it becomes her imperative duty to make her influence felt, even to the extent of dictating to governments and to kings what the state shall do and shall not do in regard to such questions. Imagine for a moment the obliteration of the divisions in the church of this country, and think of all the christian people in the land united in one great body, and all determined to put an end to this deadly evil; could not such a body dictate the policy of the state in regard to this traffic?

Well, I submit that however far apart the different christian bodies may choose to be in regard to the matter of interpretation and church policy, there is no reason why they should not unite against this common foe. They ought to unite; they must unite, if not in the spirit of love and self-sacrifice for the defence of the helpless, then for the less worthy reason of self-defence. It is marvelous that the church should have so long tolerated this most deadly and appalling scourge of society, but the fact is (and we might as well confess it) that even at this hour the rank and file of the church membership are comparatively indifferent in the matter, and if here and there a leader in the church undertakes to speak with the church disposed to grapple with him. While we have claimed, and we claim, that the church is the greatest institution that exists among men; the salt of the earth, and the light of the world; that she has done, and is doing, incomparably more to uplift and bless the world than any other force known to man; while gladly recognizing and emphasizing this fact, we are at the same time forced to admit that she has failed and is failing to marshal her forces against this most destructive and deadly foe of the race.

Many even of the most prominent men in the church are dominated by selfishness rather than by the spirit of self-sacrifice for the general good. It is of course impossible to eradicate the selfish or any other evil from society without antagonizing to do wrong; the boy-cott is business is the most effective weapon of self-defence in the hands of the class, and it is effective because so many respectable men prominent in the church, and for the most part also in the world, have not the moral courage to stand up against the spirit of self-defence, to stand up against the fact, in this struggle, relying on the church for support, have hesitated to take any action that the church was not prepared to
