The People's Forum.

To the Editor of the Acadian.

The proposition made to the ratepayers of Wolfville by promoters of the proposed new hotel seems to be a most praiseworthy step on the part of the promoters.

It is proposed to ask the ratepayers of Wolfville to guarantee the promoters and stockholders of the Wolfville Hotel and Improvement Co. five per cent premium on their capital stock of twenty-five thousand dollars for five years. Whether this guarantee is to be given from the birth of the idea in the head of the original promoter, or from the date of issue of their very artistic and generous prospectus, or from the time the promoters get their hands into their (or some one else's) pockets and put up the money is not quite clear, but this is clear, they wish to benefit the taxpayers of Wolfville and ask them to play a small game on the principle of "heads I win, tails you lose."

Generously enough they say, "If we make a profit of five per cent, we won't ask the town for anything, except a mere trifle of immunity or partial immunity from taxation, and besides will give the town representation on the Board of Directors."

As the town is already indebted to several of these gentlemen (the provisional directors) for their patronage in coming here to get an education, and to others for having impressed themselves and their belongings here within the last few years, any proposition emanating from them should have our serious and favorable consideration. Now, as the town is rich and has "money to burn," would it not be as well to consider some other enterprise also?

Only the other day a grocery business was started here and the proprietor it would seem found it very hard work to make the business pay. It seems to us the town should take that man in hand and guarantee him a fair profit on his business for say five years. He is bringing into the place his capital, his experience and his ability in his own line, all he wants is a little financial backing to make the thing a success. Let us give it to him, by all means. The other fellows in the same line may do a little kicking, but then you see this man will run a better store (1) has more experience (2) and more capital (3) than the other chaps have. What we want here are more places of business.

There is a young medical man of my acquaintance who would be glad to come here—if he was guaranteed a living for a few years, and he says he would not think of being harsh about collecting his fees, he would not take the last cow, and he never, never, would meddle in civic politics so long as he gets a guarantee from the town.

Why, I know a man who fell off a log with an accident policy tied to his leg who would gladly come here with all his insurance money and start a hardware business, if he could be guaranteed a fair profit on his investment. Just think of all the benefits this system and these people would bring to the town, living here all the time, the increase natural and otherwise in population would soon make a real live city.
