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# DAZZLING WONDER OF SOLAR SYSTEM

Distances Which Are Almost Impossible to Grasp—Something About the Relation of Stellar Bodies

In the course of an address to the "Christian Brotherhood," Mr. W. D. McPherson, K.C., M.P.P., Toronto, gave the following interesting facts: "Scientists inform us that the mean distance of the earth from the sun is 93 millions miles, consequently the diameter of the pathway traversed each year by the earth in order to travel round this immense orbit in one year is about 186 million miles, which means that the earth is continuously whirling through space at the amazing rate of 18 miles in each second of our time. Our measurements of time, we know, are derived from the planetary rotations; that is to say, our day is the equivalent in time of the complete rotation of the earth on its axis; our month is the equivalent in time of each revolution of the moon around the earth, and our year of 365 1/4 days is the equivalent in time of each revolution of the earth around the sun.

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# ALASKAN DEVELOPMENT

The Railways May be Linked up With Lines in British Columbia

The development of Alaska, which is now occupying the attention of the United States Government, will benefit British Columbia very considerably, experts say. The Pacific Coast Province is looking forward to the time when the main line of the Grand Trunk Pacific will be linked up to the system of Alaskan railways, about to be built by the United States, thus providing a new northern avenue of commerce for Canada. From Prince Rupert the Alaskan boundary can be reached by a steamship trip of forty miles and the traveller returning from the land of the Northern Lights can be well on his way to Chicago over the new Transcontinental route before he would reach Seattle by the older method of travelling down the coast by steamship. Governor Hiram published, in his annual report, just in Finland in population, wealth, and material development is possible in Alaska on a much larger scale. With a climate very like that of Alaska and with one-fourth Alaska's area Finland supports two million seven hundred and fifty thousand people, she has over three million head of live stock, she produces annually some nine hundred thousand tons of grain and legumes. This development is in part a result of good roads, canals and a railway system aggregating two thousand five hundred miles of line. The new railways and wagon roads building in British Columbia and the Yukon will diminish Alaska's severe handicap in transportation matters, and as Alaska's fishing, mining and farming opportunities are much greater than those of Finland, British Columbia's northern neighbor has obviously a better future.

## A POULTRY ALPHABET

A utility bird is rarely worth doing, the axe being an excellent surgical instrument to apply to such fowls.

Rush young birds toward maturity if you wish large profits.

Try to waste no feed, either by over-feeding, careless methods, or one-sided diet.

Unless you give your flock regular care, they are not likely to return profits.

Very few poultrymen know so much that they can learn nothing from the experiences of others.

Watch the flock constantly. It is the eye of the owner that gets results.

You are the one who must take responsibility for profit or loss.
