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TIME FOR A CHANGE.

Several St. John clergymen took occasion Sunday to refer to the grave scandal which has arisen in New Brunswick politics, and to the necessity for a very thorough political house-cleaning. They gave expression to a feeling that is wide-spread throughout the province.

The report of the Royal Commission on the Dugal charges makes it imperative for the friends of good government in the province of New Brunswick, regardless of previous party affiliations, to take such action as will remove as far as possible the stain that has been placed upon the good name of New Brunswick. The banquet which will be tendered to L. A. Dugal, M. P., and F. B. Carvell, M. P., at Fredericton on December 3, will be a rallying point for the friends of good government, and will be followed the next day by a conference, at which an effort will be made to draft a policy under which politics will play a smaller part in the management of the public services, such as the crown lands and the highways of the province. The people are all too familiar with the result of a system which permits the politicians to use the crown lands and the highways for their own purposes, and no greater political service could be preformed than to formulate a policy which would take the great public services as far as possible out of politics. This is not a matter which concerns Liberal or Conservative alone, but the whole citizenship of New Brunswick. Messrs. Dugal and Carvell have rendered a notable service in exposing a great scandal, and presenting to the public in all its nakedness the result of a system which permits unscrupulous politicians and officials to exploit the public treasury. We have come to a time when an end must be put to this sort of thing, and the conference in Fredericton should be attended by men from every part of the province who feel that public welfare should be superior to partisanship, and that it is the part of true patriotism to wipe out the disgrace brought upon the province, and so clearly reverted in the report of the Royal Commission—Times-Star.

MR. FLEMING

No public man in New Brunswick, possibly none in Canada, has ever come in for such wholesale condemnation as Hon. J. K. Fleming. His unhappy bed is of his own making, and for his unenviable plight he cannot even blame his colleagues. Many clergymen have denounced him from the pulpit and not one has tried to condone his misdoings. Newspapers that have given him warm support condemn his hypocrisy most roundly. Three years ago many provincial papers—perhaps a majority of them—

were open admirers of Mr. Fleming. Of all of them there are left today but three to wield the whitewash brush in his behalf.

Elsewhere in this issue may be found the Commission's report on the timber charges. That on the railway charges will be printed next week. These reports have appeared in every paper in New Brunswick and have simply astounded every other paper in Canada. The Standard, The Gleaner, and The Press—the three occupying a unique place in journalism—still can find no fault in the man so wholly condemned. Perhaps it is well they do not—for the man who so short a time ago was proudly triumphant in an almost clean sweep of the province, is a real object for pity.

OPINION OF THE GLOBE

Of all the newspapers that gave the Fleming government support and praise none was more ardent than the St. John Globe. No one will accuse that paper of unfair criticism when it says that the Report of the Royal Commission

"Must eventually compel the retirement from public office, if not from public life, of Hon. J. K. Fleming, premier of this province," and that "in the face of the reports they (the Royal Commission) have made, it is absurd for Mr. Fleming or any friend of his to continue to hold office," also that "the lieutenant-governor should not, and it is assumed will not, continue to recognize him as the head of the government of the province." The Globe says further that Mr. Fleming's colleagues should no longer recognize him as the head of the government, and that if he does not resign his retirement must be forced "if the good name of the province is to be maintained." The Globe expresses with clearness and force the views of people of New Brunswick with regard to Mr. Fleming, and it might have gone further and declared that if the good name of the province is to be maintained the whole Fleming government must also go.

A BANQUET

It is intended to hold a banquet in Fredericton next Thursday evening in honor of L. A. Dugal, M. P., and F. B. Carvell, M. P., the two men, who above all others in recent years, have rendered the province the greatest service. This in the expose of Fleming the Gaffer.

The event will not be altogether political, for the service these men have rendered is longer than the more or less narrow confines of politics. Thousands of the people of New Brunswick, erstwhile supporters of Mr. Fleming, have come to look upon Messrs. Dugal and Carvell in a new light and with a new respect.

The day following the banquet there will be a conference of those opposed to the present maladministration of provincial affairs.

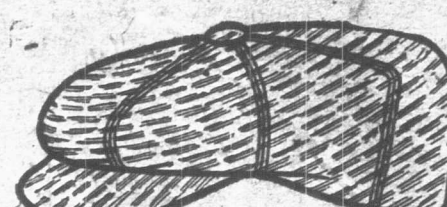
