General News.

NOVEMBER 3rd is set apart as Thanksgiving Day in Ontario.

A FIRE in Toledo, Ohio, last week destroyed the Milburn wagon works. Loss, \$700,000.

MR. KEANS, M. P., and County Treasurer, of St. John, died on 30th ult., aged seventy-two.

The number of 270 varieties of splendid fruit, has been sent to the Philadelphia show from Canada.

The cash admissions to the Centennial Exhibition on the 28th ult., amounted to \$237,236.

The Gulf Port Steamship Company have this season carried 25,000 tons more cargo from Montreal to the lower ports than during the same time last year.

RAPID INCREASE.—A few days ago a Royal Irish Fusilier's wife presented him with triplets; and Saturday Policeman Shaw learned that he was the happy father of twins. Boy and girl. —H. Herald.

DOUBLE MAIL.—Two English mails arrived at Halifax on Sunday—one via Rimouski, the other by the "Hibernian." The dates of the latter were two days older than those via Rimouski.

MESSRS. LAIRD & MITCHELL have sold out their interest in the "Patriot" newspaper to Mr. Henry Lawson, the Editor. The political course of the paper will, we suppose, not be changed. —Summerside Progress.

NOVA SCOTIA DROWNED.—Capt. Holden, of the brig "Abby Watson," at New York 29 ult., from Fernadina, reports: Sept. 17, had a heavy gale; lost and split sails; Bartlett Adams, seaman, aged 35 years, a native of Nova Scotia, was washed overboard and lost.

PUGWASH ITEMS, Oct. 2.—Several cases of diphtheria here, but none as yet have proven fatal.—The store of Mr. A. Wilson was broken into last night, and some goods were stolen.—A small shop owned and occupied by Mr. C. E. McNutt was also surreptitiously entered last week, and a wallet, containing about \$11 in cash, and some valuable receipts and notes of hand were taken, no clue to the robbers.—Mr. C. E. McNutt had again leased the "Hotel," formerly kept by Mr. C. Farrington.

In his charge to the Grand Jury at the opening of the Kent County Court, Judge Fisher, the "Gleaner" tells us, dwelt at considerable length on his recent visit to the Centennial and the pleasure it afforded him to witness the exhibit made at the Grand Exposition. Comparing the many buildings, ancient and modern among the surroundings at the Centennial. His Honor suggested the propriety of the people of Kent sending their Court House to Philadelphia as a relic of what such buildings were in this Province one hundred years ago.—Freeman.

OTAWA, Sept. 28.—Yesterday Mr. Fraser, as representative of the Manufacturer's Association of Ontario, had an interview with the Hon. Messrs. Cartwright, Scott, Barpee and Smith, with reference to the development of Australian trade. Mr. Fraser represented that the manufacturers were desirous of sending more than mere samples to the exhibition at Sydney, and that they would prefer that the Government should pay the expenses of a Commissioner to enquire into the feasibility of opening up trade relations with Australia than that they should merely pay the freight on Canadian exhibits.

A CANOE VOYAGE DOWN THE MIRAMICHI.—Lt. Col. Maunsel, in company with Mrs. and master Maunsel and cousin, arrived at Newcastle on Saturday, having made a trip from the upper water of the Miramichi in a Millicote canoe. The voyage lasted ten days, and Col. Maunsel managed the principal canoe himself during that time, the luggage canoe being in charge of an Indian. The voyagers found both fish and fowl plentiful, and they killed a number of salmon and trout, as well as ducks on the way down. The canoes were started from a point in the upper part of York Co., far above Burnt Hill, and the distance made in the trip had been nearly 200 miles. We believe Col. Maunsel's expedition is the first that ever made the whole length of the river from its upper waters to Newcastle in small Millicote canoes. Owing to some mishap, baggage forwarded by rail to meet the party at the end of their voyage was miscarried, so that they appeared to their friends here in their expedition suits, which were not at all unbecoming.—St. L. Advance.

RAILWAY ACCIDENTS.—A coal train getting off the track near Dorchester, N. B., delayed the Intercolonial express Monday, which was two hours late in arriving at Richmond port. Two cars of a freight train got off the line near Wellington Station yesterday, and while the passengers by the delayed Pictou express for Halifax was watching the operations of the men in getting the cars back on the line, Mr. Thomas A. Salter, of Halifax, was felled to the ground by a large beam, which swung violently up into the air (the iron hook attached to it having broken) and in falling struck Salter on the head, and threw him violently down, he had striking against a post, inflicting a severe wound—so that he was wounded on both sides of the head. Conductor Birmingham did all he could to make the wounded man comfortable, and telegraphed to North Street for a doctor to be at the station on the train's arrival. That this plan failed was no fault of his. At latest accounts Mr. Salter lies in a very precarious condition, and is not expected to live through the night.—Halifax Reporter.

The Boardman quarries are shipping largely of their stones, and are anticipating good time in the coming spring.
