## MORE PAY FOR FIRE CO.

Resolution Adopted at Meeting of Town Council Thursday Evening.

### HAVE EXTRA DUTIES.

Ald. Williston to be Town's Delegate to Ottawa in Missing Link Matter.

The regular monthly meeting of the Town Council was held in the Council chamber Thursday evening.

There were present the Mayor and Aills, Ritchie, Lawlor, Russell, Desmond, Williston, Wyse and McMurdo.

Applications for the position of Electrician were read from Hubert McQueen, New Glasgow, B. S. Holmes, Amherst, H. Y. Gilbert, Oxford, Norman McDonald, Port Hood, Jas. Alexander, Sydney, and G. N. Gardner, Yarmouth. The applications were ordered filed with previous applications.

A petition was read from a number of ratepayers in the vicinity of the I. C. R. station asking that the water and sewerage be extended up Prince William street and along Station Road thence down Jane street to connect with services on Highway. The petition was referred to Light and Water committee.

Application of Ernest Maltby for position of fireman at Power House was read.

A petition, and an application for water was read from Mr. J. W. Davidson. This petition asked that the sewer on Prince William Street be extended so that he could take advantage of it. Referred to Board of Works.

Ald. Lawlor reported that the Light and Water Committee had agreed to place two lights on the public wharf for Mr. D. Doyle at \$10 of the season of navigation or \$15 for the whole year. This report was adopted.

Ald. Russell from the Park and Fire Committee reported as follows:—

Newcastle May 17th, 1905. We the Fire and Park Committee beg to submit the following report with reference to the petition or resolution of the Fire Co. for increase of salaries. We recommend that the Captain's salary be increased from \$25 to \$40, Lieutenant \$20 to \$30 and the rest of the Fire Company from \$15 to \$25 providing certain duties be added to the existing contract.

1st. That the company have full control and responsibility of keeping in readiness, running order and cleanliness of the steam and hand engines.

2nd. Full control, management and responsibility of all Fire apparatus stored in the engine room.

3rd. To keep the inside of the building in a respectable condition.

4th. That the Chief of the Fire Company be wholly responsible to the Fire Committee of the Town Council for all fire apparatus stored in said buildings.

5th. That the steam engine be tested at least four times in each year.

This report was adopted provided the Fire Company was willing to enter into a contract.

Ald. Desmond reported that the Board of Works wished authority to make a survey of fire sewer could be extended out to low tide mark.

Ald. McMurdo, moved that the Board of Works be authorized to have survey made if found necessary. Carried.

Ald. Lawlor, from Light and Fire committee, reported that Mr. Waddie had left and that Mr. J. A. Follansbee, had taken charge. Also that Mr. Barnes, Chief Engineer of the Teelin road, was overhauling the plant and would report to the committee at a later date.

## ENGINEERS AT WORK

### SOME REPAIRS NEEDED.

Pump Found to Need Some Slight Repairs and Adjustments

Chief Engineer Barnes of the S. S. Teelin Head and an assistant have been busily engaged for the past week in overhauling the pumps, boilers, engines and dynamos at the power house and expect to complete their work this week when they will make a full report to the Water and Light Committee.

The Advocate learns that nothing serious has been found wrong with the plant, but that it needed just such an overhauling to put it in first class shape.

The engineers think the plant is a first class one and thoroughly adapted for the Town's needs.

A full official report of the work will be published later.

The military camp from June 25th to July 31st inclusive, at Sussex, N. B., this year promises to be the largest in the history of the province. It is the intention of the Militia Department to train the entire force. The following corps will carry out their annual training at that place:—The 8th, King's Co., Hussars; 10th, Field Battery of Woodstock; 12th Field Battery of Newcastle; No. 1 Field Company Canadian Engineers, Woodstock; No. 2, Company Canadian Army Service Corps and No. VIII, Bearer Company, St. John. The 12th Infantry Brigade composed of 67th Reg. "Carleton Light Infantry," 71st York Reg., 73rd Northumberland Reg., 74th Reg., Sussex. The department has directed that the service rolls of the active militia all over Canada, must be completed one month prior to the date set for training. So all members of the above named corps and those who contemplate joining should have their names in by May 27th inst. The 12th Field Battery has received a complete new outfit of clothing. It is also reported that this Battery will carry out target practice with the other artillery units, at the new range at Patuxent, west of Ottawa.

Ald. Desmond moved that the town pay the legitimate expenses of the delegates. Carried.

The following accounts were passed: C. B. Morris, oats, \$75.00; Fairbanks Co., 79.00; Jas. Waddie, salary, 42.50.

Ald. Ritchie asked permission of the town for Mr. W. A. Hickson to bore a well alongside his old one at his mill as the old one had become clogged with gravel. Permission was granted with the understanding that the well dug to be not deeper than 125 feet.

The police and appointment to office committee were given an extension of time to prepare list of town officials.

Ald. Russell said that the Marine Department were having the slip in rear of Town Hall dredged and as Harbor Master he wished to notify the town that dumping of refuse at rear of hall would not be permitted until such time as a crib work was built.

A committee of three was appointed to look into matter of crib work.

Ald. Desmond called the attention of the council to the gasometer in the old gas house. This was greatly in the way and should be removed to allow room for storage of town machinery.

Ald. Russell explained that a junk dealer R. Rich had a contract to remove this. The town clerk was asked to notify Mr. Rich to fulfil his contract at once.

Council adjourned.

## SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

Not as Many Delegates as Should Have Attended This Meeting.

### VERY INSTRUCTIVE.

Meetings Were Very Interesting to Delegates and S. S. Workers. Fine Singing.

The County Sunday School Convention which met here on Friday and Saturday of last week was not so largely attended nor were the different sections of the county so well represented as last year. The meetings however were of deep interest and the different subjects brought up for discussion were handled in a masterly manner by the speakers.
