Annual Gathering at Chatham.

Chatham, N. B., Dec. 21st - A well attended and enthusiastic meeting of the Northumberland County Liberal Association was held in the Town Hall Thursday afternoon.

The president, W. S. Lupton, M. P., was in chair.

After the minutes of the last meeting were read by Secretary James McTroy and approved by W. S. Lupton, M. P., gave a short speech and stated the object of the meeting, viz., to attend the annual gathering of the Canadian Liberal Association to be held at St. John on the 27th instant, and then spoke of the missing link in the Maritime and the missing link in the Maritime Branch Railway also referred to the proposed rail service between Chatham and Bayview.

Moser Haynes of Newcastle followed with an address urging the League to do everything in its power to hasten the completion of these matters so the country may benefit by the consequences of the same.

He also addressed the meeting and the following officers were appointed: Mayor F. W. C. Winslow, J. D. B. F. MacKenzie, P. J. McIntyre, George Stothart, Chatham; Mayor George Jones, M. J. Tracy, T. W. Corcoran, Newcastle; McCann, A. J. and Woodward, James and St. John, and Mr. Thomas Littleton, Bayview, Mr. W. Russell, Mr. Blake, Upperville, John Sullivan, Mr. Neal, Louis Abbott, Argyle, James Steverick, Colchester, St. John, South Hero, Husky, West Dover, East Dover, New Carlisle, Port Williams, and Mr. F. J. Wood, Hermon.

Mr. Winslow, in his speech, said he will remain for some time. He expects to return to the Maritime provinces about June and will stay Chatham during the new year.

At this time, Mr. Lupton had returned and Foreman announced that a verdict in quality had been given.

The annual meeting of the Association was then opened and carried by moving the motion made by Mr. Smith of Newcastle.
