Prince of Monaco, realizing that one  
must go inside the Casino in order  
to lose one's head, ordered the sen-  
tence commuted to life imprisonment.

Referring to the recent contest in  
Centre York, the Montreal Star, the  
banner Conservative paper, says: If  
the same spirit exists throughout  
Ontario, it betokens a wonderful lack  
of enthusiasm and party organization  
in the banner province of Conservatism.  
Liberal predictions of further gains  
in that province at the next general  
elections are not so hard to under-  
stand after the Centre York result.

#### THE BROWNVILLE CASE.

For obvious reasons it is well that  
a suit has been begun in the United  
States District Court in New York by  
a colored soldier, discharged because  
of the Brownville riot, to test the  
right of the President to take such  
summary action as was taken in that  
case. There has been no end to the  
controversy over that affair, it was  
dragged in as a false issue in the  
municipal campaign in Boston for  
the purpose of taking the colored vote  
from the Republicans, and it would  
have been made an issue in the next  
presidential campaign. Now, however  
it goes out of the hands of the politi-  
cians into the hands of the courts. It is said to be  
the first action of its kind ever  
brought. The final decision, undoubt-  
edly, will be the United States Su-  
preme Court. The suit is brought in  
the name of Oscar W. Reid, a private  
in Company E, Twenty-fifth Infantry,  
and the United States is made the de-  
fendant in the sum of \$122,000, which,  
according to Reid's contention, is due  
to him as his pay since his discharge.

which, of course, he contends, was il-  
legal. According to Reid's lawyer  
"certain gentlemen to New York  
who believe in that equal right to all  
before the law, are behind the suit."  
Those gentlemen are to be congrat-  
ulated upon their course. It is time  
for a definite decision upon a warm and  
unsatisfactory controversy. That de-  
cision will be given in due season.  
Meanwhile, those who believe that the  
President was right and those who  
insist that he was wrong should keep  
cool. There is abundant evidence in  
other cases that the United States  
courts are not controlled by the Pres-  
ident.

#### TELL-TALE COMPARISONS.

The following cogent comparisons  
between the results of the financial  
administration of the late Conserva-  
tive Government and the present Lib-  
eral Government is found in the Lon-  
don Advertiser:—In 1897, after the  
Government of Sir Wilfrid Laurier  
had been in office about nine months,  
Hon. Mr. Fielding, as Finance Minis-  
ter, introduced the new tariff, em-  
bracing the British preference and  
the Opposition critics predicted in-  
dustrial demoralization. Instead,  
however, under the general scheme of  
the reduction of duties, the country  
entered upon an era of prosperity  
such as it never before knew, and  
which has continued during the  
whole period of eleven years of Lib-  
eral administration. Now these same  
critics are turning to the national debt  
and charging the present Government  
with the most reckless extravagance.  
What are the facts? In the last  
eleven years of Conservative govern-  
ment the aggregate surpluses amount-  
ed to \$9,594,000, against which were  
deficits totalling \$12,594,000, which  
meant an annual deficit over the eleven  
years of \$249,000. In his first bud-  
get speech Mr. Fielding announced the  
first and only deficit during the eleven  
years the Liberals have been in of-  
fice, amounting to \$519,000. Since then  
the record has been one of surpluses,  
and substantial ones too, every year,  
the total amounting to the enormous  
sum of \$94,145,000. If from this is de-  
ducted the one solitary deficit of  
\$519,000, there remains the total for  
ten years of \$93,626,000, or for the  
whole eleven years an average annual  
surplus of \$8,511,454 during the Lib-  
eral regime. Is it any wonder that  
the comparison with the annual deficit  
of \$249,000 during the preceding eleven  
years is anything but palatable to  
the Opposition critics? Of course,  
there are expenditures which have to  
be made on capital account, and it has  
been the policy of the present govern-  
ment to devote these surpluses to  
meeting such necessary capital ex-  
penditures, and thus preventing them  
from becoming an addition to the na-  
tional debt. As Mr. Fielding pointed  
out in a recent speech in the House,  
these special expenditures in the last  
eleven years of the Conservative govern-  
ment amounted to a little over  
\$50,000,000 above the ordinary charges.  
The Conservative Government  
had to provide for these moneys, and  
did so by charging \$62,300,000 of the  
\$30,000,000 to the public debt account  
of the country, and left that \$62,000,-  
000 to bear interest for future years.  
In its eleven years of office, the present  
Government has had charges of that  
character; it has had to provide  
for capital and special expenditures  
amounting to \$127,000,000 out of the  
sum over and above the ordinary ex-  
penses of the country, and it has to  
provide out of its daily receipts every  
dollar of that except \$5,000,000. When  
the Conservative government with  
\$30,000,000 of capital expenditure had  
to charge \$62,000,000 to the public debt  
and when it is found that the present  
Government with \$127,000,000 capital ex-  
penditure has only added \$5,000,000 to  
the public debt, it must be admitted  
that the record is one to which the  
Liberals may reasonably refer with  
pride.

The house of Thomas St. Onge on  
Andrew street was quarantined, for a  
time Saturday on account of a small-  
pox suspect who had stayed there  
during the week.

On Tuesday night last Wm. St.  
Onge reached Campbellton from Say-  
abec where he had been working.  
He put up at Thos. St. Onge's and re-  
mained there until Christmas night  
when he left for his home in Maple  
Green. Saturday Dr. Martin was  
summoned from Campbellton to  
Maple Green to attend St. Onge who  
had become suddenly ill. Dr. Martin  
drove down and after examining the  
man concluded that he had smallpox.  
The doctor returned to town and no-  
tified the local board of health. The  
house of Thomas St. Onge was promp-  
tly quarantined. Saturday evening  
it was thoroughly fumigated and  
the quarantine removed.

Dr. Ferguson of Dalhousie, who is  
the chairman of the county board  
of health, was notified of the case and  
is believed to have driven to Maple  
Green yesterday.

Dr. Martin when seen by a report-  
er for the Graphic last night declar-  
ed emphatically that the case was one  
of smallpox, but he did not think it  
was of a very severe type.
