

He was made a captain of the Eighth United States in December, 1852, was transferred to the pay department in 1858, and while on leave of absence in 1861, resigned from the service of the United States to accept a brigader-general's com-mission in the Confederate army. He commanded a brigade at the first battle of Bull Run, and it has been said that it was owing to his generalship that the Union forces were defeated. Having been promoted to a major-generalcy, he took part in the seven days' battles around Virginia, and at the second battle of Bull Run, when in command of the first corps of the army of Northern Virginia, came to the rellef of Stonewall Jackson when he was hard pressed by Pope's army, and by a determined charge in the flank, saved the day for the Confed-erates. 
