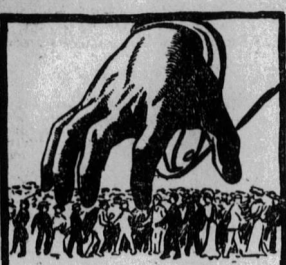

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of the family, or by a single man, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister of an intending homesteader.

An application for entry or inspection made personally at any Sub-Agent's office may be made by the local Agent or Sub-Agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the Agent applied for in vacant receipt of the program such application to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.

In case of "personation" the applicant will be summarily cancelled and the entry will be forfeit all principle and claims.

An application for inspection must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for inspection will be received from one person until that application has been disposed of.

A homesteader whose entry is in good standing and not in arrears, and who is subject to approval of the Sub-Agent, may be approved in favor of his father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister, eligible, but to no one else on filing declaration of intention.

Where an entry is summarily cancelled, or voluntarily abandoned, subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for inspection will be entitled to prior right of entry.

PROTECTOR OF THE EAST COAST

Will Germany Look After It During the Pacific Adventure.

Now that it has been officially announced that the American battleship fleet will sail from the United States on its long cruise to the Pacific about the middle of next December, the question that a great many people ask is, What is the nature of the understanding that exists between the President of the United States and the German Emperor? It is a question more frequently asked by naval officers than any other class, although the public at large is not inquisitive. But the naval officer interprets all politics and statesmanship in the terms of naval strategy, and the first lesson instilled into the embryo Nelson or Farragut is never to give an invitation to a possible enemy by offering a temptation to assault. Naval officers are too modest to think that they have ability enough to make successful Presidents or Secretaries of State, but no naval officer can conceive that any President or Secretary of State would leave the Atlantic coast at the mercy of even a second rate naval power unless there were one or two rational explanations; either the Pacific coast is in greater danger than the Atlantic coast, and it is the less desperate hazard to leave the eastern coast defenceless; or else the Atlantic coast, stripped of its battleships, is still protected—protected by the fleet of a friendly power ready to throw its whole naval force to guard the eastern seaboard of the United States in case of necessity. Which is the power?

Obviously there are only two powers to whom the United States could turn in case of emergency. One is Great Britain, the other is Germany. When the navy learned that the fleet was to go to the Pacific it was first assumed that some sort of an understanding had been arranged between the United States and Great Britain. It seemed rational, England had withdrawn her ships from the western continent under the tacit agreement that the United States would safeguard British interests and do the sort of police work in those waters that England had long done for the benefit of the whole world. What more natural than that the United States should, finding her fleet more necessary elsewhere, ask the neighborly assistance of England? But further re-

Tommy Atkins' Clothes

A change is to be made in the system of clothing in the army, but the soldier will not benefit peculiarly therefrom. The idea is to substitute a simple and easily comprehensible method for the present system, and under the new arrangement men will know the precise amount to which they will be entitled.

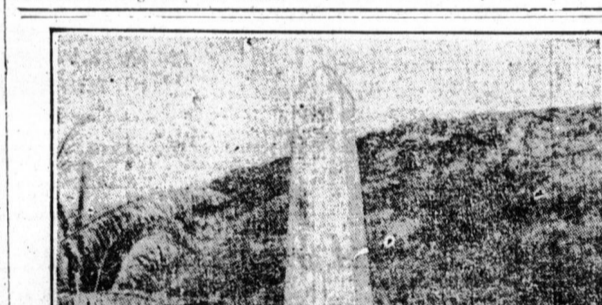
It will result in men being more careful of their clothing by the fact that the balance of their quarter's allowance will be credited forthwith to their pay account instead of being held over to their next enlistment anniversary. Under the system that now obtains a complete outfit is given on enlistment, with annual issues afterward, composition to soldiers for garments suitable for three months' further wear and twopence a day for upkeep.

In future the complete outfit will be given on enlistment and a quarterly clothing allowance granted after the first year's service to purchase clothing. The twopence a day for upkeep being added to the allowance and paid quarterly in advance. Four special clothing days are to be appointed, and the company commander will be responsible for his men providing themselves with necessary clothing out of their allowance.

AMERICANS UPON ENGLISHMAN'S GRAVE.

BEAR ADMIRAL VERY, UNITED STATES NAVAL COMMANDANT AT HONOLULU, HAS RECENTLY SENT THE NAVAL TUG IROQUOIS TO KEALAKEKUA BAY, IN THE ISLAND OF HAWAII, A DISTANCE OF 17 MILES, FOR THE SPECIAL PURPOSE OF RENOVATING THE MONUMENT ERECTED IN THAT PLACE TO THE MEMORY OF CAPTAIN COOK, THE GREAT ENGLISH CIRCUITNAVIGATOR OF THE GLOBE.

All the undergrowth in the inclosure was cut down, the monument repaired, the lettering of the inscription blackened, and the cannon and chains surrounding it repainted by the blue jackets of the Iroquois, under the direction of Lieut. Commander Carter, U. S. N. Formerly the monument was kept in order by crews of British men-of-war which visited the spot from time to time for the purpose; since the annexation of the Hawaiian islands, however, the United States Navy has undertaken the task. Captain Cook met his death in 1779 at the hands of a native chief named Noaah. The fight arose owing to the stealing of a ship's boat by the natives. Captain Cook endeavored to remove the king on board in order to hold him as a hostage, when he was struck down from behind.

Toronto Live Stock.

Receipts of live stock at the city market since Tuesday, as reported by the railways, were 123 carloads, composed of 2644 cattle, 2271 hogs, 250 sheep and lambs, 228 calves and 1 horse.
The quality of the cattle in all classes was fair to good, many of the heavier classes a very small percentage of what could be called good.
Considering the heavy deliveries there was a fair trade at lower prices, especially for the stockers and feeders of poor quality, which sold at 20c to 25c per cwt. lower than at any time this season.
Exporters—Strictly speaking, there were none on sale, outside of a few bulls, which sold at \$2.25 to \$2.75 per cwt.
Butchers—Best butchers, 1000 to 1200 lbs., of which there were few, at \$4.15 to \$4.30 per lb. for good butchers and steers, 500 to 1000 lbs., at \$3.65 to \$3.85; medium light huffers, 800 to 900 lbs., at \$3 to \$3.25; good cows, \$3 to \$3.50; medium cows and steers, \$2.10 to \$2.40; common cows, and bulls, \$1 to \$2 per cwt.
Feeders and Stockers—Best feeders, 1000 to 1200 pounds, \$2.20 to \$2.70; best stockers, 800 to 1000 pounds, \$2.50 to \$3; medium stockers, 700 to 900 pounds, \$2.10 to \$2.40; common stockers, 500 to 700 pounds, \$1.50 to \$2.00.
Milkers and Springers—For good to choice milkers and forward springers there was a better demand. Two choice cows sold at \$69 each but 12 some of the best cows would sell around \$45 as an average price. Medium and common light cows were slow sale at \$25 to \$35 each.
Veal Calves—As usual, there was little change in the market for calves, neither as regards quality or price, which ranged from \$3 to \$2.50 per cwt. the bulk selling at \$1.50 to \$3.50 per cwt.
Sheep and Lambs—Receipts were very large the quality in many instances being poor. Export: ewes sold at \$1.25 to \$1.40; rams and culled at \$3 to \$3.50; lambs sold at \$4.25 for culled and \$4.50 for best lots.
Hogs—Deliveries of nearly 3000 hogs sold at unchanged quotations. Mr. Harris sold a few of the best at \$5.75 per lb. for select and \$5 to \$5.25 for all that did not grade up to the select standard.

ISOLATION IN TYPHOID FEVER.

E. P. Joslin and C. L. Overlander believe the time has come when typhoid patients should be treated in separate wards in our hospitals, with their own attendants, who should not mingle with other patients. They note that the present method of mixing them with other diseases leads to a spread of the infection, quoting Schuber to the effect that 23.10 per cent of all typhoids are the result of hospital infection.
Nurses frequently contract the disease. Statistics collected from six Boston institutions over a period of four years, and showing nearly 3,000 cases of typhoid show that for every 114 cases treated in one place, supplies will be made and procured in bulk and thus many duplicate cases saved. The concentration plan of nursing typhoids should easily lessen by one-half the number of days of a nurse's exposure to the disease. Separate nursing eliminates the chief dangers to which other patients are exposed as the "go between" are eliminated. A given case may have a fellow typhoid from proximity, but the danger is far less than that of giving the disease to a neighbor weakened by some other malady.
Isolation of typhoids was made compulsory in Germany two years ago. The knowledge of a nurse that she is detailed to care for a typhoid patient, her to be far more careful as to precautions for her own protection.—Boston Medical and Surgical Journal.
