Keeping Time in Holland.
"Railroad time, as we generally understand the phrase in the United States is a little ahead of the 'town' time, but in The Hague, the quaint old capital of Holland, all private and unofficial clocks and watches are kept twenty minutes fast," said Gerald Watfall.

"When it is noon in the railway station, postoffice and other Government buildings of The Hague the timepieces in the shops and the watches of the sturdy burghers show 12.20 p. m. Just what reason there is for this I don't know, although I asked enlightenment in many quarters. It seems a custom that has been handed down for generations, and the Dutch are too conservative to change the ways of their progenitors there, without some mighty inducement."

OVER \$3,000.
Subscriptions For Relief of Adana Christians.

Subscriptions for the relief of the Christian refugees in Asia Minor are over the \$3,000 mark and coming freely. The need is very great, as the following cable from the Associated Press representative in Turkey indicates: "Messina, Sunday night.—The conditions in the refugee camps are pitiable. Many thousands are huddled there and lack food, shelter and medical aid. The authorities are making efforts to improve the situation and send the refugees back to their farms. Many Armenians are quartered at the missions, and most of them decline to leave because of their lack of confidence in the protection offered. The greatest danger is from epidemic in the overcrowded camps and missions. Malaria, typhoid and cholera are already present. It is urgently necessary that the refugees be dispersed as soon as possible. Many contributions are greatly needed."

Late Millionaire Burn Not Remembered in Melbourne.
Globe: Millionaire Burn is said to have made his money in Pittsburg, and to have been stricken with a mortal seizure in Melbourne, Australia. Before death came, however, he is said to have made a will leaving these great gifts to Mr. Kidd; [Burn was said to have left an immense sum of money to Mr. David Kidd, of Toronto, to build a mission in that city.] The Globe wired the Pittsburg Dispatch for information regarding the deceased. In due course a reply was received, and the name of the man, millionaire or otherwise, was known there, and yet he is credited with amassing his great fortune in the place.

Still not entirely satisfied, the Globe continued the search of knowledge of Mr. Burn, and yesterday Mr. E. S. Cunningham, editor of the Melbourne Argus, one of the visiting delegates to the Imperial Press Conference, was questioned on the matter of the millionaire's death in the antipodean city. "I have lived in Melbourne for forty years," said Mr. Cunningham, "and I can run over the names of practically all the millionaires in Melbourne or Australia, but Burn was certainly not one of them. Had a millionaire died in our town, we as newspaper men would certainly have heard of it. But I cannot recall any such case. I'm sorry I cannot help you out in any way, but you can take it for granted that Millionaire Burn did not die in Melbourne or in Australia, either."

NOT KNOWN.

St. Catharines Chief of Police Hands in His Resignation.
(Special Despatch to the Times.)
St. Catharines, Ont., May 18.—St. Catharines is to have a new Chief of Police in the near future. Chief Richard Parnall, who has held that office for five years, and who has been on the force 22 years, has resigned, and his resignation will be dealt with at a meeting of the Police Commission, called for to-morrow afternoon. It is said that it was reported to the Commission through an anonymous letter and by telephone messages that the Chief had been seen intoxicated on duty recently. He was called before the Commission and, it is alleged, admitted his guilt, but asked for leniency. His resignation was asked for, and as it was not forthcoming on Friday, when the next meeting was held, it was again requested. It was received by the secretary of the Commission this morning. It is likely that a man from out of town will be engaged, although a number of local names have been mentioned for the position. Friends of the present Chief are circulating a petition praying for leniency on the part of the Commission.

STRUCK BY AUTO.
Paris, May 18.—The automobile in which Thomas P. Thorne, the American race horse owner, now in Paris, was driving to the Maisons LaFite track this morning ran into a workman and inflicted injuries that probably will prove fatal. Mr. Thorne and the chauffeur each sustained slight injuries.

BIGAMIST PLEADS GUILTY.
(Special Despatch to the Times.)
London, Ont., May 18.—Aubrey W. Ward, arrested in Detroit yesterday on a charge of bigamy, preferred against him by John Kilpatrick, of this city, appeared before Magistrate Love this morning and pleaded guilty, and was remanded for a week for sentence, as the police wish to investigate the case further.

SEAMEN'S STRIKE.
Detroit, May 18.—Representatives of the Board of Arbitration in six States bordering on the great lakes met here to-day in an effort to bring about a settlement of the marine strike on the lakes.

Bees and Sparrows Fought for Tree.
A fight between a half dozen English sparrows and a swarm of bees for the possession of an old tree on the lawn of the Serrill house, Main street, was witnessed to-day by a number of interested spectators. The colony of bees swarmed around the tree, and discovering a hole about forty feet from the ground, flew in. The first of the army, which filled the air like a miniature cloud, had hardly entered the hole before the sparrows came out ruffling their neck feathers and chattering with anger.

There were six sparrows living in the tree, and for five minutes they put up a gallant fight for the possession of their home, but the bees were too much for them, and after a time they slowly flew off, fighting to the last.—Derby correspondent Philadelphia Press.

GERMAN SCARE.

Stories That Make the English People Look Silly.
Story About a German Liner and a Depot in London.

London, May 18.—The "German scare" grows apace, and no sooner is one wild rumor laid at rest than another appears to try the nerves of the English people. Last week there was the story of a big German liner filled with troops which it was alleged had entered the Humber, surveyed the possibilities of making a landing, and departed without being sighted by the British warships, with which the North Sea is supposed to be closely dotted, which to-day Sir John Barlow, a Liberal member of the House of Commons and a well known merchant, startled the country with the sensational suggestion that the Germans have established a depot of arms containing 50,000 Mauser rifles in the centre of London, together with 7,500,000 rounds of ammunition, for the use of 60,000 trained German soldiers now employed in various capacities in England.

As an evidence that Sir John attaches some credence to this remarkable story, he has notified War Secretary Halasde of his intention to question him concerning it in Parliament.
