KING LOST HEAVILY ON C. P. R. OPERATIONS

His Majesty said to be out \$100,000 Through Recent Slump

A cable to the New York Tribune from London says:—Heavy losses suffered by King George in the recent big slump of the stock market, were the occasion of a prolonged audience between Sir George White, the King's private solicitor, and the King on Tuesday morning after Derby Day. The consultation was to arrange for the realization on certain securities held in trust for the King by Lord Stanfordham and another member of the household, and the queen took part in the conference. The King's losses are understood to have resulted from extensive operations undertaken on his behalf in Canadian Pacific stock. Last week that stock declined 14 points in the London market, and the King's loss is stated to be \$100,000. Lord Revelstoke is the King's private financial adviser, but the operations in Canadian Pacific were undertaken contrary to that banker's advice.

SAYS GERMANY CAN'T STAND A LONG WAR

Would be Unable to Bear Financial Strain of Long Campaign

A Paris despatch says:—Some startling figures were given by Deputy Andre Lerepere as to the financial position of the triple alliance, composed of Germany, Austria-Hungary and Italy, and of the triple entente, composed of Great Britain, France and Russia in the course of a speech in favor of three years' service in the active army for French, delivered on Thursday. He said:—"Germany is unable to afford a long war. The banks of countries forming the triple alliance possess only \$741,600,000 in gold, with \$1,600,000,000 in circulation, while those of the triple entente possess \$1,587,200,000 in their vaults and \$2,600,000,000 in circulation. Everything points to Germany relying on a sudden, overwhelming attack, should war be declared. Therefore France must always have a large army on the frontier."
