With a total of 18,330 returned soldiers given employment up to June 30th, the C. P. R. has achieved a record which its officials consider the best record in the history of the Company. When any C. P. R. man sailed for voluntary service overseas, he carried with him not only credit for six months pay, but also the promise of a position awaking his return, of equal value to the one he left. That promise was more than kept for the C. P. R. scale of pay was raised during the war to correspond with the increased cost of living, and re-employment in the same position in most cases meant re-employment at a higher wage or salary.

Moreover, not only was the door thrown wide open to C. P. R. returned men, but for all new openings preference has been given to returned men in general—so that whereas the Company's moral obligation covered only the seven thousand who applied for re-instatement, its actual record has been the employment of over eighteen thousand ex-service man—or more than twenty per cent, of the total payroll.
