### Through Rail Service—Atlantic To Pacific

Canadian National Railways Furnish Direct Connections With Famous "Continental Limited" Out of Montreal.

The finest train service to the Pacific Coast is afforded by the Canadian National Grand Trunk "Continental Limited" now leaving at 9:00 p. m. daily from Bonaventure Station, Montreal. The route of this finely equipped all steel train to the coast is via Ottawa, North Bay, Cochrane and via the Transcontinental to Winnipeg, and by Grand Trunk Pacific to Saskatoon and Edmonton, and via Canadian Railways to Vancouver—the finest of scenic routes through the Rockies and over the smoothest roadbed.

From Maritime Provinces points there is connection by Ocean Limited with the Continental Limited daily, and by the Maritime Express daily except Sunday. The Maritime arriving daily in Montreal at 7:40 affords the most direct connection, but passengers by the Ocean Limited will have the advantage of a day spent in Montreal. The Maritime arriving at Levis at 1:50 p. m. affords connection with Train No. 11 leaving Quebec daily for Cochrane at 5:00 p. m. This train makes connection at Cochrane with the Continental Limited, so it will be seen there is really a choice of two distinct routes.

There is also the through service to the Pacific Coast by train leaving Toronto daily at 10:30 p. m., via Sudbury, Port Arthur, Fort William and Winnipeg. Connection for this is made by the Ocean Limited to Montreal, and the Grand Trunk International Limited to Toronto.

### Legislative Assembly.

Prince Edward Island Rules Relating to Private Bills. 86 All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment. 87 No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill, and such petition must be signed by the said parties. 88 A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members of whom three shall be chosen to be denominated The Private Bills Committee to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such Committee has reported thereon to the House.

89 So soon as the Committee has reported any Bill, such Bill together with any amendments that may be suggested by the Committee, shall be printed at the expense of the parties who are suitors for such Bill and printed copies thereof delivered to the members before the second reading if deemed necessary by the Committee. 90 No Bill for the particular interest of any person or persons, Corporation or Corporations or body or bodies of people shall be read a second time until all fees be paid for the same into the hands of the Clerk of the House. 91 No Bill having for its object the vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body corporate the title to any tract of land shall be received or read in the House unless at least four weeks notice containing a full description of the land in question has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this Province of the intention of such person or persons Municipality or Body Corporate to apply for such Bill.

### Sermons On Catholic Worship

The appended is the seventh of a series of Sermons on the general subject of Catholic Worship. This sermon was prepared by the Rev. James G. Tongas, Pastor of St. Helena Church at Maderville, Mont.

### THE GLORIA AND THE COLLECTS.

Last Sunday you listened to an instruction on the Introit and the Kyrie. Today we shall speak of the Gloria and Collects.

When Jesus was born in Bethlehem an angel of the Lord announced His birth to the shepherds of the neighborhood, who were keeping the night watches over their flocks, and suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to men of good will." (Luke 11, 13, 14) These are the first words of the Gloria, which is recited in all Masses of a festive character. They signify that the birth of the Saviour gives glory to God, who dwells in the highest heavens, a glory befitting God's infinite majesty. They signify, too, that the birth of the Saviour brings peace to earth, to a sin-born world, to men who because of their sins were children of wrath, but who now, because of Christ the Saviour, are well beloved of God. These initial words, "Glory to God and peace to men," constitute the theme of the entire hymn.

WORDS ADDED BY THE CHURCH.

The other words of the Gloria were added by the Church. They are an outburst of praise, thanksgiving and supplication—a fitting response to the angelic anthem which called them forth. "We praise thee," that is, we acknowledge and proclaim thy infinite perfection. "We bless thee," that is, we acclaim thee as the author of all good and fountain head from which all blessings flow.

"We adore thee," that is, we render to thy supreme majesty the worship which belongs to it alone. "We glorify thee," that is, unservedly we devote ourselves and all we have to thy glory, serving thee in holiness and justice, and leading others to thy love and service. "We give thee thanks for thy great glory," that is, we thank thee because thou hast vouchsafed to reveal thy infinite perfections, thy power, wisdom, justice and mercy, in wondrous ways, especially by the work of our redemption through the incarnation of thy only begotten Son—a work which alone renders thee the infinite glory which is thy due, and is, at the same time, to us the source of all blessings.

IN PRAISE AND PRAYER.

After this the Gloria goes on in praise and prayer, addressing in turn each of the three Divine Persons: O Lord God, Heavenly King, God the Father Almighty. In these words the power of the Father is exalted as well as His supreme dominion over every creature, whether in heaven or upon earth. O Lord, the only begotten Son. These words signify that the Son is not less God than the Father, that He is His only Son, the brightness of His glory and the express image of His substance, and as such, perfectly equal to Him. But the Church does not stop here when she addresses the Divine Son who

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became her bridegroom through the incarnation. She accumulates words and arguments to manifest her love for Him and to obtain His grace.

She calls Him "Jesus Christ," because he is our Saviour, and Christ, or the Anointed, because He divinely anointed His humanity at the moment of the Incarnation, and this made Him the High Priest of the New Covenant. She calls Him "Lord God," because He is both God and man, and as man, the Lamb of God, a victim of propitiation alone pleasing to God. She calls Him "Son of God" in whom the Father is well pleased. She begs of Him "Who taketh away the sins of the world" to have mercy on us and to receive our prayers. Because He sitteth at the right hand of God, our advocate, she again begs of Him to have mercy on us, and to direct our minds with His Father.

AFTER THE SUPPLICATIONS.

After these supplications the Church again exalts the divinity of her spouse, Christ Jesus, proclaiming Him "to be with the Father and the Holy Ghost the one only God who alone is holy alone is Lord, alone is Most High."

You may not have observed that the priest bows his head several times while reciting the Gloria, but you will not fail to notice that he makes these bows and uncovers his head during the singing of the Gloria by the choir.

He bows not only when the Sacred Name is pronounced, but also at the words: "We adore thee," "We give thee thanks," "Receive our prayers," because these words call to his mind the four purposes for which the sacrifice of the Mass is offered, namely to adore God, to thank Him, to ask for pardon and grace.

At the conclusion of the Gloria the priest, having greeted the people with the words, "The Lord be with you," goes to the epistle side of the altar and recites or sings the Collect—a short comprehensive prayer adapted to the Mass of the day. Collect comes from the Latin word colligere, to collect or gather, and is so called because it is recited in the gathering or assembly of the people, and because the priest is the representative of the people gathers as it were their prayers and presents them collectively to God.

THE PRAYER OF ALL.

To impress the people with the fact that he is about to say the prayer of all and for all, the priest first says "Let us pray," and at the end to show that it is their prayer, as well as that of the priest, the people say "Amen" or "So be it."

The priest recites the Collect with extended and upraised hands in imitation of Moses, who prayed thus on the mountain while Israel was fighting Amalek on the plain. (Exodus XVII, 11); also, to express his earnest desire to obtain his request.

The Collect is invariably composed of three parts: The recital, the petition and the conclusion. These three parts may easily be distinguished in the Collect of the Epiphany, which is said in the Mass today: "O God, who by the leading of a star didst on this day manifest thy only begotten Son to the Gentiles, mercifully grant that we who know thee now by faith may be brought to the contemplation of thy glorious majesty. Through the same Jesus Christ our Lord, thy Son

THE COLLECT.

The Collect is usually directed to God the Father, because He is the first person in the Blessed Trinity; because the Mass is the representation of the offering which Christ makes of Himself to the Father; and because Christ so taught us to pray: "If you will ask the Father anything in my name He will give it to you." (John XVI, 23)

The Collect concludes with the words: "Through Jesus Christ our Lord," to teach us that Christ is our mediator and advocate with the Father, and that thus we fulfill His injunction to ask the Father "in His name."

The conclusion also contains a solemn profession of faith in the Blessed Trinity, the three Divine Persons being referred to in the words: "Who with these and the Holy Ghost, liveth and reigneth, world without end."
