#### Asquith Upheld.

The probability that Asquith's appeal to the electors on the Lord's Veto Bill would be upheld has been growing daily since the first election returns came in on Saturday night. They are decisive. The Government allies have 152 members returned against Balfour's 147. This is a majority of 5 on 299 seats, and if the results of the remaining 371 seats showed the same mathematical uniformity of gain, this would give the allies a majority of 11 over the Unionists. The outlook, however, is more favourable to Asquith than the figures would indicate, judging by the statement in the news message that these 299 seats give one member more to the coalition groups than they had in the last Parliament from the same constituencies; in other words, Balfour has met with a net loss of one on these 299 seats, and he would have to make a net gain of 83 on the next 371 seats in order to make a tie with the coalition groups.

#### Numidian in Collision.

Messrs. Shea & Co. received a message yesterday to the effect that the Numidian was delayed in sailing owing to a collision which she had with another vessel on the voyage from Liverpool to Glasgow. She did not sail owing to the effecting of necessary repairs, until Monday and is due here Tuesday next.

#### The Ingeborg Lost.

Word was received in the city yesterday that the Danish Schr. Ingeborg on a voyage from France to Grange-mouth recently, sprang a leak and was abandoned by her crew who were picked up by a passing steamer and brought into Leith. This vessel was well known here. She ran ashore at Beaverton last year, was towed off and was repaired here. The whaler which towed her off billed for salvage which was disputed and she lay here at Duder's wharf for a long while. Eventually she was laden with seal oil by Bowring Bros. and sailed for Glasgow the past spring.

#### POLICE COURT NEWS.

To-day Sergt. Olyphant summoned 6 person for keeping unlicensed dogs. Two destroyed the animals, and the others paid up. James Fleming of Torbay summoned Marcia Fleming for breaking a pane of glass in his residence recently having a brawl between them. The matter was settled out of court.

Mr. Curtis, Walter Crosbie, Rev. Daws, J. Miller, M. Andrews, and 30 Harbour Main men who had been working on the Bonavista Branch.

Steamers Arrive.

S. S. DURANGO. Capt. Chambers, arrived here this morning at 5 o'clock from Liverpool after a passage of 10 days. For a few days on the first part of the voyage the ship experienced fine weather, but after that had heavy westerly gales with a high sea, while the weather was very cold after she reached the Banks. She brought 400 tons cargo and 15 bags and 21 hampers of mail matter but no passengers. Two days ago the ship sighted the s.s. Empress of Ireland, bound from Halifax to Liverpool.

S. S. FLORIZEL. The s.s. Florizel, Capt. Clarke, arrived from New York via Halifax at 8.30 this morning. She left the former port Tuesday, at 2 p.m., and arrived at Halifax Sunday forenoon. Leaving there at 2 p.m. Monday she had fine weather all the way. The winds were from the west and she had some snow flurries yesterday. She brought a three-quarter cargo and these passengers: Miss Power, Mrs. Smyth, L. B. Moore and 16 second class. The ship passed the Rosalind off Cape Race bound from Holyrood to Portland, Me., at 3.30 a.m. to-day.

S. S. FOGOTA. The s.s. Fogota, Capt. B. Barbour, arrived from the northward at 9.45 this morning. The ship left here at 1.30 p.m. Thursday last, had a good run north and made all the ports of call, reaching the Island Monday morning at 2 o'clock. She left to come south at 8 a.m. It blew hard on the way and was very frosty, while considerable snow fell. She could not reach Elliston owing to a heavy sea running. She had a half cargo and brought the following passengers: Mrs. Oke and 3 children; Dr. Whiteaway, Mrs. Geo. Barbour, C. Norris, E. Blackwood, Const. Stimpson, W. Weeks, C. Savage, H. J. Rendell, Mrs. H. T. Rendell, Mrs. Hogan, Miss E. Hogan and 35 steerage. She had 100 passengers on the round trip.

#### Burned by Matches.

#### Trestle Collapsed Under Weight of Train

Sydney, N.S., Nov. 29.—A railway accident which was most peculiar in that its effects were not very much more serious, took place this morning at No. 2 Colliery. No. 3, known as the "small trestle," gave way beneath the coal train engaged in hauling to the bank, and two men were injured. As the locomotive, which was passing over the trestle about eight o'clock, the men in the cab became aware that the trestle was sinking beneath the weight. If they had stayed by the locomotive they would have been uninjured, but they accepted the warning and jumped. They had before them a fall of twenty-six feet. Charles McCutish, a brakeman, evidently tumbled on some hard object, for his jaw was fractured. The other man injured was Joseph Mullins, foreman of the coal bank, who had an ankle sprained.

The men, of course, expected the trestle would collapse completely and that the locomotive and cars would be piled in a confused heap beneath. As luck would have it, however, the trestle did not give away completely, and the locomotive was left hanging by the wheels. It had not been removed at noon.

The accident is supposed to have been due to the weakening of the trestle by the recent rains.

#### "A Rummy Cove."

An old Chelsea bus-driver once gave an amusing description of Mr. Holman Hunt, the well-known artist, who has just died. When he was painting his famous picture, "The Light of the World," it was his custom to work from eight o'clock at night until four in the morning, and then go out for a run before bed. Said the old bus-driver, after giving an account of Carlyle and his methods: "But there is a rummy cove on the first floor round the corner, who has something standing all night at one window, while he sits down at the other, or stands, and seemingly is a-drawing of it. He does not go to bed like other Christians, but stays long after the last bus has come in; and, as the peritote tells us, when the clock strikes four out goes the gas, down comes the gentleman, runs down (heyne Walk as hard as he can pelt, and when he comes to the end he turns and runs back again, opens the door, goes in, and nobody sees no more of him."
