



(From the Christian Herald.) The Rev. J. F. Dickie, pastor of the American Church in Berlin, when in Augsburg, Germany, a few weeks ago, found a little city in the heart of the city, that was shut in all by itself with two gates and is called the 'Fuggerei.' It is so called because the 106 houses within it were all built with money left by Fugger, the wealthy sixteen century banker. When he died he directed that these 5.30 p.m.

houses should be built and then given to poor aged families for 4 marks and 12 pfennigs rent a year, that is exactly one American dollar. They have four rooms and kitchen, with a little front garden and a little garden behind.
