# Strikers Demands

## Portuguese Royalists Losing--National League Approaching Completion--Bolshevists Take Kiev.

**STRIKERS' DEMANDS.**  
 DUBLIN, Feb. 2. The Congress has been summoned to meet in the next week to demand a small sum of money. The owner can have same by proving property.

**ADDRESSES MEETING.**  
 LONDON, Feb. 2. The Premier Asquith addressed a meeting at Albert Hall in the evening. He said that the League of Nations had a great ideal and that it was necessary to bring it into practice. It was a world-wide organization, he said, and it had to be supported in principle by the League of Nations. **GREECE'S CLAIMS.**  
 PARIS, Feb. 3. Premier Venizelos, of Greece, was before the Supreme Council of the Peace Conference at its session this morning and made a statement on the claims of Greece. The appearance of the Greek Premier before the Council was announced in the official statement given out after the session. Premier Venizelos will continue his presentation of the case of Greece at tomorrow morning's session of the Council. The Czech-Slovak delegates will also again be heard at tomorrow's session.

**CONDITIONS IN MOSCOW.**  
 STOCKHOLM, Feb. 3. Conditions of living in Moscow are described as frightful by French refugees who have arrived here. A cup of milk there costs fifteen rubles and a pound of bread twenty-five rubles. Typhus is causing a great number of deaths and the gates to the cemeteries are crowded with people desiring to bury their relatives. The dead are covered with a paper shroud owing to the lack of coffins.

**SEPARATE NATIONS.**  
 PARIS, Feb. 3. The much discussed question whether the British dominions shall have separate representation as national units in a society of nations is understood to have been settled favorably as far as Great Britain is concerned. Numerous conferences have been held between representatives of the dominions and the British Government, and it is said a complete agreement has been reached that the self-governing dominions are entitled to place in the society as any other nation. The final decision rests with the Peace Conference but the representatives of the dominions anticipate no objection there in as much as Great Britain is supporting them.

**LORD BISHOP'S OPINION.**  
 LONDON, Feb. 2. The Bishop of London speaking at a Canadian meeting to-day said that the present strikes were a reaction of war and the result of a natural desire of the people for a fuller and better life. It seems strange to some, he added, that men who had suffered the horrors and hard work of the trenches should want to strike as soon as

**NOW IN KIEV.**  
 WARSAW, Feb. 3. (By wireless via Vienna by the A. P.)--Kiev has been taken by Bolshevik troops, General Petura's troops partially going over to the enemy.

**RAILWAY STRIKE IN SWEDEN.**  
 COPENHAGEN, Feb. 3. A serious railway strike has broken out in Sweden. Workmen last night stopped work on nineteen different lines. Railway traffic in Southern Sweden is hampered greatly and the government is making efforts to maintain the flow of food supplies to the larger towns.

**RUSHING LEAGUE OF NATIONS.**  
 PARIS, Feb. 2. At the meeting of the commission on a society of nations this afternoon there was a general agreement to push the deliberations as rapidly as possible. An official statement says that the definite programme was formulated and that an agreement was reached to begin detailed discussion on Tuesday.

**HOTEL WORKERS STRIKE.**  
 LONDON, Feb. 3. The British Cabinet held a session to-day to discuss the Labor situation. It is said however that the government is still against any intervention. The seriousness of the strike situation in London was further increased late to-day when the hotel workers at a meeting decided to go on strike. About eight thousand men and women are involved.

**TO PREVENT CONFLICT.**  
 PARIS, Feb. 3. A commission of control will be sent immediately to Teschen, Austrian Silesia, to prevent a conflict between the Czechs and the Poles in the region of Teschen, and also to enquire into the basis for a frontier decision at the Peace Conference.

**BOXING RESULT.**  
 LONDON, Feb. 3. Joe Lynch, bantamweight of New York, beat Tommy Noble the British bantam-weight, on points in twenty fast rounds to-day. Lynch does not win the championship as the fight was not held at the National Sporting Club and as the Lonsdale belt was not at stake.

## Canned Music.

Have you ever thought, when listening to your favorite phonograph record, of the multitudinous and complex processes it has gone through from start to finish before being sold to you? In making a record, the singer or instrumentalist sings or plays into a tin horn. When a hand record is being made, the players sit on chairs of varying heights, with the lowest one nearest the horn and the highest one--six feet tall in some cases--at the rear of the semi-circle, so that each instrument will focus on the horn without interference of any sort.

Should there be a discordant note the wax record is ruined and work must start all over again. Once in a while, in the middle of a selection, a sneeze or cough breaks out triumphantly, and no matter how much time may have been expended on the record up to that point, it is now wasted work and must begin again. Briefly, what actually happens in the making of canned music is this. The sound-waves entering the large end of the specially-devised horn are brought down and intensified as they approach the smaller end. Here they strike upon a diaphragm which vibrates in response to their impulses. Connected with the centre of this diaphragm by a delicate lever is a fine cutting tool, which, moving in response to the motion of the diaphragm, cuts a groove in a revolving disc of soft wax, which groove corresponds in configuration with the outline of the sound-waves entering the horn.

The first wax record is a so-called test record, and corresponds to a printer's proof, being read and corrected by the musical director. Afterwards, when mistakes have been rectified, the master record is made, and this, after going through various hardening and electrotyping processes, is passed as correct. From this is then moulded the hard-rubber record, which is sold by the thousand for the phonographs of the world.
