Something New.

The lecturer has further made arrangements with the Superintendents of Education, for the lecture to be given during the afternoon of Monday, beginning at 4 o'clock, for the benefit of the older school children in the city. These are the coming employers and employees, and the benefits which they will derive from the illustrated business talk to them will be of inestimable value in the shaping of their futures.

W.P.A. Financial Report

This Report Covers a Period From September 1st, 1918, to date, February 25th, in all Practically Six Months.

On September 1st, when our fifth year began, we had on hand a Balance of \$15,263.04. Since that time our total subscriptions have amounted to \$22,128.46, making in all \$37,412.50. Our expenditures have amounted to \$17,857.25, so that there is a balance on hand of \$19,855.25, with no outstanding bills.

When we began operations in September we, in common with the rest of the community, looked forward to the continuance of hostilities for many months. In view of this and of the continued increase in prices, we laid in a stock of Red Cross and other materials to last us for some months. The sudden termination of the war left us therefore with a surplus on hand, and the problem of disposing of them gave us considerable anxiety.

Our first thought was to sell them through a broker in St. John's, and so far he has been so successful that we expect shortly to hear that everything has been sold. When this has been accomplished, the proceeds will be added to our funds.

Since September 1st the books have not been closed and consequently it is not possible to state in this report our position. If it should be decided to bring an end to our activities, a full detailed statement will be given early in the next year. If we decide to continue in some other sphere of usefulness, the usual audit will take place on August 31st, the results of which will be laid before you in due course.
