W.P.A. Financial Report

This Report Covers a Period From September 1st, 1918, to date, Feb-ruary 25th, in all Practically Six

On September 1st, when our fifth began, we had on hand a balance of \$15,289.04. Since that time our \$22,123.46, making in all \$37,412.50. Our expenditures have amounted to \$17,557.25, so that there is a balance on hand of \$19,855.35, with no outstanding bills.

When we began operations in Sep-

tember we, in common with the rest of the community, looked forward to the continuance of hostilities for many months. In view of this and of the continued increase in prices, we materials to last us for some months. The sudden termination of the war The sudden termination of the war left us therefore with large stocks on hand, and the problem of disposing of them gave us considerable anxiety. Our first thought was to sell them back, even at a reduced figure, to the people from whom they were bought, but our cable to our purchasing agents elicited the reply that there were hundreds of organizations similar to our own in Canada and Ameri-, who found themselves in exactly the same position, and, that not only could he not repurchase the goods, but that he could not undertake to dispose of them for us. We then took the advice of a gentleman, whose business experience justified us in relying on his judgment, namely Sir Michael Cashin, and on that advice we tried to dispose of them locally. We received an offer for our Red Cross material which we have accepted. To arrange for a sale of the other goods we have asked two gentlemen, Honorable John Harvey and Mr. L. E. Emerson, to see f some means could be devised.

After consultation they decided to entrust the sale as a business proposion to a broker in St. John's and so far he has been so successful that we expect shortly to hear that everything has been sold. When this has been accomplished the proceeds will be added to our funds.

Since September 1st the books have not been closed and consequently it FINED. - A short while ago two is not possible totake a detailed statement of our position. If it should be decided to bring an end to our activtiles, a full detailed statement will be given you.
