Watch Germany.

The warning of General Foch will bear repetition to-day, in view of certain incidents reported in the foreign despatches, showing that German propagandists and terrorists continue their activities, which have not ceased since the signing of the armistice over a year ago, and the acceptance of the Peace Treaty in June past. Foch said in an interview at Paris, "Germany will start war again, when she is able to do so. The spirit of Germany is not dead: it will re-awaken." The civilized world, therefore, must be on guard. Germany's ambitions have not been crushed: they have been merely checked for a time, and will blossom forth again, when the season is ripe. The action of the Peace Conference Council in making so many modifications in the Treaty, at the instance of Germany, is regarded only by that country as a sign of weakness, and an encouragement to make other demands. Really it looks as though Germany won the war and not the Allies.

Dr. John Bates Clark, Professor of Political Economy at Columbia University, and head of the Division of Economics and History of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, says that another world war is lurking on the horizon. Here are his exact words: "Over the entire future there seems to hang the shadow of another world war that is possible and even probable. It will be modern in its fighting instruments, but prehistoric in its practices. It will be bloodier than the war which has bled the nations white. Before the Peace Treaty has been ratified there have been signs that the giant is beginning to make some preparations for the rising. Do we realise under what a vast inducement to renew war Germany finds herself? If this view of the German attitude and purpose is true or half true, it means the necessity for a very strong league of Western nations as the sole hope for peace with freedom."

Let us ask ourselves if there is any hope for such a league? Obviously the four Western nations to form this league are Great Britain, France, Italy and Belgium, with a possibility of the entrance of the Scandinavian countries and perhaps Spain and Portugal. Even should these join in, the burden would still have to be borne by the four first named nations, which would have to become the policemen of Europe, and maintain armaments on land and sea sufficiently strong to keep the peace. Eastern Europe is in a seethe of unrest. Russia is in chaos, and grave danger of a mighty conflict, breaking out at any moment is imminent. Germany is boastfully acclaiming her war leaders, and her people do not realise that their armies have been vanquished. Internal Germany did not have, or was not given, as it should have been, an opportunity to view the victorious armies of the Allies, marching in endless columns through their towns. The might of the conqueror was not exhibited to them, consequently they continue to have faith in "Deutschland uber alles," and are behind their rulers in every demand made for modifications in the Peace Treaty. Occurrences in Germany point to a growing sentiment in favor of the restoration of the Hohenzollerns. This, if nothing else, should be an amplification of the warning of Foch.

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Labor Goes With Opposition.

William Linegar to Represent Workmen in Bye-Election in St. John's West—Other Opposition Candidate not yet Selected.

The working committee of the Workingmen's Political Party met last night in the L.S.P.U. Hall, some 100 members being present. Great enthusiasm was manifested and every man seemed to be deeply interested in and concerned with the fortunes of the Workingmen's Party. Mr. William Linegar, Leader of the Workingmen's Political Party in the late General Election, reported on the meeting which had taken place the previous night between the special deputation appointed by the Working Committee and Sir M. P. Cashin, Leader of the Opposition. The report was to the effect that Sir Michael was prepared to take one workingmen's candidate but could not take two.

Big Meeting at Bay Roberts.

From private sources we learn that Mr. A. W. Piccott held a highly successful political meeting at Bay Roberts last night. Mr. C. E. Russell was Chairman, and many popular manifestations were shown the chief speaker. This meeting opens the Opposition campaign against Hon. Arthur Barnes, the new Minister of Education, who has to seek reelection by the district.

Hidden Treasure Discovered.

How long this amount had been lying there will forever remain a mystery, but as it evidently belonged to the Hagerty family it was handed over to them, and thus they have secured a handsome and welcome Christmas Box. It may be that further particulars may be brought forth in the course of events, as to the name of the party who secreted the money in the improvised savings bank, and we shall be then in a position to give our readers full details of the mystery of the latest Hidden Treasure.

Supreme Court.

(In Chambers; Before the Chief Justice.)

In the matter of the Insolvency of Ingham W. Martin, of Hickman's Harbour, General Dealer.
Mr. C. E. Hunt for petitioning creditor calls I. W. Martin, who is examined by him. Cross-examined by Mr. L. E. Emerson for certain creditors; further cross-examined by J. A. Winter, E. S. Piment and John Higgins for other creditors; further cross-examined by Gibbs, K. C. Solicitor for alleged insolvent.

It is ordered that I. W. Martin be declared insolvent, and that Rt. Hon. Sir William Lloyd, K.C., be appointed trustee of the estate of insolvent. Further ordered that the costs of petitioning creditor and attaching creditor be paid out of estate.

Mr. L. E. Emerson asks for adjournment in order that charges of fraud be preferred against insolvent. It is ordered that further hearing be adjourned till to-day at 11 a.m. The liabilities of the insolvent were sworn at \$67,800.00 and his assets at \$28,350.00.

"Dellecna" Enquiry Continued.

The enquiry into the loss of the steamer "Dellecna" was continued before the Marine Court of Enquiry yesterday afternoon, when Messrs. James Black, Lloyd's Surveyor, and F. J. Doyle were examined. The enquiry was then postponed until Saturday.

A Newfoundland-lander's Work.

JOHN VINCENT, BRILLIANT YOUNG TERRA NOVA, STARS IN FAMOUS AMERICAN PUBLICATION.

A late number of the Architectural Review, of New York, contains many pages of the masterly work of the brilliant young Newfoundland artist, John Vincent. Having been presented with a copy of this famous American publication, we were enabled to examine the many drawings by our clever countryman, and were more than pleased to find there some very interesting topical sketches of the fishing phases of Newfoundland national life. These, which were drawn from

life from different vantage points on the Waterfront, are strikingly realistic and true to life, for the very atmosphere of the subject has been cleverly reproduced, and, as the Review says, "Mr. Vincent always makes any figures he introduces into his drawings seem part of the scene, so much so in fact that they provide the desired suggestion of human life and give the scale while they do not attract attention to themselves." Besides many splendid reproductions of drawings made by Mr. Vincent originally on stone or copper, there are eight full-page drawings on India-tint paper, these being of famous cathedrals, churches and buildings.

An accompanying article in the same issue gives warm praise to the

work of Mr. Vincent, and it is evident that this clever Newfoundland holds an important place in the Art world of America.

Mr. Vincent was educated at the Methodist College before leaving Newfoundland, but since that has studied in Europe and the New World. He has travelled extensively, and is thus all the more enabled to produce good work. He is married to a Newfoundland girl, and at present is the special architectural artist for Warren and Wetmore, of New York.

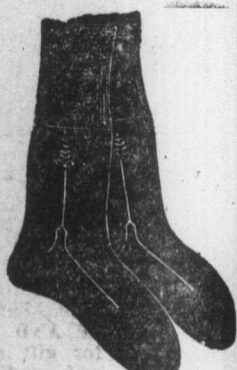
