TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

CANADA'S BUDGET SPEECH.

OTTAWA, May 12.—The Hon. W. S. Fielding in delivering his seveneenth budget as Minister of Finance announced a 10% extension of the British preference, except on goods which were now dutiable at less than fifteen per cent. and on condition that the extension should apply only on goods entering through Canadian ports. Mr. Fielding said it was most essential that the House give some assurance to the country along the lines of tariff stability and he would like to convey the impression to manufacturers and business men that they were to enjoy a reasonable opportunity of carrying on their business without fear of disturbance. Continuing, he said the present tariff was moderate but was not low enough to suit the Progressives and not high enough for high Protectionists. The changes announced by to-day's Budget were mostly downward. Mr. Fielding in his speech moved a resolution authorizing negotiations between representatives of the two governments with a view of making a commercial agreement between the United States and Canada. The resolution stated that if the President of the United States, under the authority of the United States Tariff Act, determined to reduce by fifty per cent. duties on Canadian wheat, flour, and on barley, potatoes, onions, turnips, hay and fish. The Governor in Council may by Order in Council make such reductions on similar articles imported into Canada from the U.S. as may be deemed reasonable by way of compensation. The Finance Minister said that the last paragraph was a direct appeal to the President of the United States notifying him that Canada was ready to meet him on fair ground if he should be willing to enter into an agreement with this country.

U. S. AMBASSADOR TO BRITAIN ARRIVES AT NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, May 12.—Conditions in Great Britain are rapidly improving, said Ambassador Harvey, arriving here to-day. Credit has been re-established and unemployment is decreasing at the rate of twenty thousand weekly. Harvey said he knew nothing of the reports of his resignation regarding changes of being pro British. Harvey said, "He was an American but not a damn fool."

RADICAL OFFICE RAIDED.

SYDNEY, May 12.—Silby Barrett, formerly a member of the International Board of District 26 of the United Mine Workers, accompanied by his brother Tom, last evening visited the office of the Radical Maritime Labor Herald, at Glace Bay, and after a stiff fight chased the staff into the street. It was stated that warrants would be issued for the arrest of the two Barretts on charges of assault and of damaging property. The raid followed attacks on Barrett by the Herald, as Barrett is regarded chief of the Conservative faction in the District, while the Herald is the organ of the more Radical Party.

REPUBLICANS CAPTURED.

DUBLIN, May 12.—Large captures by the irregular troops in the South and West are reported in the Official Army communication issued last night. The communication also reports the seizure of ten thousand rounds of Thompson Gun Ammunition.

Japs to Study Canadian Lumber Methods.

TOKIO—A Japanese lumber mission to visit British Columbia and the Northwest States is now being organized here by Y. Yuki, a prominent lumber merchant of Kobe. The mission plan to spend about two months in Canada and the United States, and will sail late in May. Japan was recently visited by a party of American silk merchants, who made a thorough investigation of the conditions in the silk industry here. The Japanese lumber mission plans to make a similar survey of the lumber industry and its activity will be largely in accordance with the example set by the silk men. The Japanese foreign office and the department of agriculture and commerce have commissioned members of the party to make reports concerning various business conditions in Canada and the United States. Thirteen lumbermen from Kobe and Nagoya have so far expressed their intention to join the party. The lumber trade here is facing problems similar to those in the raw silk industry—mainly a disparagement between American lumber mill prices and Japanese buying offers. The Japanese market has been lagging behind the Vancouver and Seattle market all winter.

Physician Says Smoking is Harmless.

The danger to smokers from nicotine poisoning is declared by Dr. E. P. Rodger, of London, to be "so small as to be almost negligible." This should be tidings of comfort and joy to many smokers in America, where, according to despatches received there something like a crusade is underway against "My Lady Nicotine." She is there denounced as a "disipated jado who is responsible for much that is injurious to health." Dr. Rodger's opinion is based on experiments conducted by himself to determine the action of fire on the tobacco consumed. He has just published an account of them with the conclusions he has reached.

He first took ten grains of tobacco steeped in alcohol and water in order to extract all the nicotine. He said the solution was strong enough to kill a dog weighing four stone.

He then took a similar quantity of the same tobacco and burned it in a pipe so constructed as to retain the whole of the smoke produced. The liquid resulting was found to have no worse effect on a dog than to trouble his indigestion. The dog was of the same weight as the dog on which nicotine had been used with fatal effect.

Dr. Rodger's said he found that combustion destroys the nicotine, or rather transforms it into creosols, phenols and other substances which if they are rather irritating are nevertheless antiseptics. The pipe or cigarette-holder, he says, should be kept clean, but with that danger guarded against there is no other. "In these conditions," he states in conclusion, "tobacco may be even good for the health."

Riots Due to Fright.

An extraordinary situation prevails at Poona (the summer capital of the Bombay Presidency) where the superstitious Mahrattas forming the bulk of the population believe that, reviving a centuries-old custom, dark-skinned Madrali workmen are kidnapping boys and burying them alive beneath a dam under construction near the city to propitiate the local gods.

The population has started a campaign against all dark-skinned strangers, some of whom have been murdered or assaulted.

Two servants of a visiting landowner are among those killed. Recently a crowd pursued and badly beat a coolie who was accused by two boys of having attempted to drug them.

The authorities have succeeded in slightly allaying the fears of the superstitious Mahrattas, and have restored comparative quiet.

Commenting on these outbreaks of mob violence, the Times of India says they represent an instance of how an Indian mob may be incited by an ungrounded rumor.

New Trans-Atlantic

AT A COST OF \$1,000,000

NEW YORK, May 7.—A new trans-Atlantic cable to operate between New York and London, is to be laid at a cost estimated at ten million dollars. The new link will be the electric cable laid down since 1902, and the new line, according to the officials, will be a battery cable, copper averaging about 1,100 of copper per mile as against the heaviest existing cable.

The route mapped out for the cable as disclosed to-day, will follow along the coast for 1,000 miles to Nova Scotia. At that point the new cable will reach across the Atlantic, making a total of 1,800 miles of cable to be laid on the ocean.

At the Azores the line will be laid with a cable already in use, and a new cable of 320 miles will be laid from Ireland to England, with a book up with the new system.

3,000,000 pounds of copper will be used in the conductor.
