Obituary

REINHOLD BARTER.
 (DIED APRIL 6, 1925.)

Reinhold Barter, of the rites of the Catholic Church of which he was a most exemplary and practical member, Reinhold Barter rendered his soul to Him who gave it last evening, in the 75th year of his age. Mr. Barter was living in St. John's, and was a resident of this city for his entire life, except for a year he spent in Boston, U.S.A. At an early age he entered his apprenticeship with Mr. Campbell, carpenter and joiner, who conducted a large business on Theatre Hill in the latter part of the past century. The deceased also worked for some years with the late Mr. George Davey, father of Hon. John and Fred Davey. As a carpenter and skilled mechanic, Reinhold Barter had few equals and no superior in this country. His work has been seen to-day in its work place, in the lighthouses, north, east, south and west over the country; and many of the most prominent private residences and churches, at which he labored during his long life, stand as lasting memorials to his ability as a skilled mechanic. In the days of our more romantic maritime, the services of Reinhold Barter were always availed of for approving and beautifying the ships and performing such other artistic work that could only be performed by the master hand of the thorough craftsman. In the home he was the devoted husband, a kind and gentle father, and the community at large, through his honest and loyal, and a highly respected citizen. Sprung from one of the oldest and most respected families in St. John's, he combined the characteristics of the Saxon and Celtic races in an eminent degree, and the dry wit and humour with which he related reminiscences of the past to his companions and associates, readily proclaimed his Irish descent to the nearest side. He was a man of strong Catholic faith, which may be crystallized in a few words—no new teachings of Holy Church had been practiced through life. He loved his country with more fervent love than did Mr. Barter and his familiar expression of his was "after all there is no place on this island like Newfoundland!" He took the deepest interest in the political affairs of the country, as well as the civic affairs of St. John's, and in the old days was a most enthusiastic and patriotic supporter of the old Liberal Party, under the leadership of Mr. W. V. Whiteaway. He was a great lover of all many sports, especially our Annual Regatta, and in years gone by he rowed on the pond at Mill Pond, also on the waters of the river, and being a man of splendid physique and herculean strength, always managed to render a good account of himself. He was a man of the old school—a man of exceptional character of heart, honest and conscientious, and a staunch and pious Catholic. His unstinted devotion to home and family, his quiet and

patient disposition endeared him to all who knew. The exemplary life led by him will always live in the hearts of those he left to mourn him, viz., wife, four daughters, Mrs. Murphy, Miss Louise of St. John's, May and Annie in Boston, one sister, many relatives and hosts of friends. Several brothers and sisters predeceased him, amongst whom was the saintly Sister Rose of the Presentation Convent, Harbor Grace.—Resqueleat in Pace.

SHOOTING AFFAIR IN BELLEVILLE DRUG STORE.

BELLEVILLE, Ont., April 7. Clayton McWilliam, aged 29, and his friend, John McGie, aged 28, of this city, were shot to death in Latimer's Drug Store, where the former was employed as a clerk, late to-night, and Arthur Moon, aged 35, is held by the police on the charge of killing them. The shooting was witnessed by Miss Barlow, aged 18, employed at the refreshment counter of the store. The men were shot through the left breast while conversing, dying almost immediately. No motive could be learned to-night.

BANK OF FRANCE EXCEEDS LIMIT OF CIRCULATION.

PARIS, April 7. The Bank of France, it was said in official circles to-day, has already exceeded the legal limit of its circulation by more than 1,500,000 francs, so that it became imperative to regularize the situation by increasing this limit by law for the regulation of the financial position of the country, which the Government will propose to Parliament this afternoon.

TOLL OF THE TORNADO IN FLORIDA.

MIAMI, April 6. Four persons were killed and many injured when a tornado swept down from the Everglades yesterday and caused \$150,000 property damage before it disappeared in the Atlantic. The greatest damage was done at a dairy farm six miles from here. Buildings were carried away, trees uprooted, and houses unroofed.

A CHANCE FOR THE DOUKHOBORS.

NEW YORK, April 7. Opportunities for homesteading in Soviet Russia are offered farmers in an announcement made on behalf of the Russian Government to-day by the Central Bureau of the Society for the Technical Aid of the United States and Canada to the Union of the Socialist Republic Organization affiliated with the Moscow Government. The farms may be run as individual enterprises and not co-operatively, as the Soviet has insisted hitherto. The Society says arrangements will be made to accept as many as 25,000 immigrants from America who will be given such inducements as low railway rates on the Russian railways, cheap lumber and credits. Repatriation of former Russians and the development of modern farming methods in Russia are the purposes behind the Soviet's plan, the officials of the local Society said.

FRANCE'S CAPITAL LEVY.

PARIS, April 7. The Cabinet finally agreed this morning on the details of a capital levy or forced loan which will be proposed in the Chamber this afternoon by M. Demessie, Minister of Finance.

KURDISTAN RISING SPREADING.

LONDON, April 7. An Exchange Telegraph despatch from Constantinople reports that the Kurdish insurrection movement has spread over the Turco-Persian frontier and that therefore, the despatch says, the Teheran Government has sent troops to the locality.

Proceedings at the Legislative Council

OFFICIAL SYNOPSIS.
 MONDAY, April 6.

The Council met pursuant to adjournment.

The House resolved into Committee on the Terra Nova Sulphite Co. Bill. Hon. Mr. Bishop in the chair.

The Committee read and reported the Bill with an amendment. This report was received, and it was ordered that the Bill be read a third time on to-morrow.

HON. MR. PRESIDENT read a message from the House of Assembly that they had passed the amendments sent down in and upon the Bill sent up entitled "Egress to Churches, Theatres, etc.," without amendment.

HON. MR. MORINE in moving the adjournment said that the Government had decided to obtain independent advice concerning the condition of the Dock and the desirability of improvement, and are seeking to obtain the most disinterested advice available. Enquiries were now taking place with regard to the securing of an engineer who could have no possible connection with a contract or hope of contract, and who would therefore be free from suspicion. He said that no expenditure was to take place meanwhile. Hon. Mr. Morine felt sure the hon gentlemen would be pleased to know that their unanimous attitude on this matter had made a deep impression on the government.

HON. DR. MOSELL congratulated the Government on taking this step, and felt sure that all the hon. members were gratified, that as a result of their deliberations, the government had been induced to follow this line of action. He also congratulated the hon. leader of the Government on behalf of the members of the Legislative Council for the manner in which he had assisted in bringing this about.

The House then adjourned until Monday, April 13th, at 4 o'clock.
