"Mrs. Ryder is working against practically four-fifths of the inhabitants of Havana and the island, in her efforts to bring about better treatment of animal life," said Mrs. Carr yesterday. "From the Americans she receives scarcely a thought, and despite this fact she is accomplishing great reforms in humanitarianism.


