New Way to Thread Needles.

Oyster Recipe.

Oyster Recipe. It is possible that an oyster soup served on two successive weeks might pail on some appetites, for there is nothing so conducive to appetite as variety, but as there are many different kinds of oyster soup it need not be served twice alike in the same month. Scald a dozen large oysters in their own julce; lift out with a skimmer, chop fine and pound on a mortar; return to their liquor, and a quart of thin veal broth, a small sliced onion, a stalk of celery and some parsley, and simmer half an hour; rub an ounce of flour with one of butter, ounce of flour with one of butter, add it to the soup; boil up for a add it to the soup; boil up for a moment, strain and press through a sieve; return to the fire, dilute to the right consistency with hot cream, and finish the seasoning with cayenne, white pepper and a dash of nutmeg.



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
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
