Twenty Million Russians in Starving Condition.

Distress Aggravated by the Approach of Winter

Epeculators Profiting by the Poverty of the People—A New Navy Being Built.

No London, Oct. 24.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Standard says the approach of frost has caused a renewal of cries of distress. The Novoe Vosti estimates that 20,000,000 people are without food. Statistics prove conclusively that in many places speculators get extortionate prices. Corn merchants and village koolacks, or usurers, are charged with responsibility for the extortion. A Samara paper declares that Jews are angels compared with the koolacks, who are in the habit of reducing those in their power to the lowest state of poverty.

A poor woman, of Rachino, on returning home from a neighboring village, whither she had gone to try to purchase food, found all her children dead and a post mortem examination being made their stomachs were found filled with rags and earth. The Government will acquire possession of the entire naval shipbuilding industry of the country and establish another naval port besides t Cronstadt—one not liable to be blocked by ice or blockeded by an enemy.


