

OVER-EXERTION IN CYCLING. Dr. Albu recently made an interest-



ing communication to the Berlin Medi-cal Society on certain effects produced on the heart and other internal organs by over-exertion in cycle races. His conclusions were based on the condi-tion of twelve professional cyclists whom he had examined both before and after races lasting from five to thirty minutes. The strain thrown on the heart was shown by well-marked dyspnoea, and by the strong pulsation of the heart and arteries, but the most remarkable fact was an acute dilation of the heart, especially of the left ventriels. dyspnoea, and by the strong pulsation of the heart and arteries, but the most remarkable fact was an acute dilation of the heart, especially of the left ventricle. This dilation is, of course, temporary, disappearing when rest has been taken and returning on the occasion of the next race. When overexertion is frequent this dilation may become permanent, and in a heart that was previously weak an irreparable injury may occur. Another symptom was the presence of albumen and casts in the urine, caused by the kidneys being irritated by the effort of cycling.
