STUNG TO DEATH

Farm-Hand, Attacked by Bees—Dies of His Injuries.

Lockport, June 19.—John Alert, who was stung about the head by bees on the farm of Charles James, near Midway, died Monday, of his injuries. Alert was plowing when attacked by the bees, which also stung his horses, causing them to run away. Alert was hurt in the runaway, but it is said that death resulted more from the bee stings than from any injuries received in the runaway. His head was swollen until scarcely a semblance of features remained. He was unconscious until he died.

DUEL WITH RAZORS.

Between a Colored Man and an Englishman at Toronto.

Toronto, June 19.—Between 6 and 7 o'clock yesterday morning a desperate affray took place at a mission and lodging house at 210 King street east, between a colored man named James Johnson, and an Englishman named Michael Burk. A razor was used by both men with terrible results. The row started by Johnson throwing a bench over on Burk. The latter, after some words, drew a razor, with which he proceeded to slash his dusky foe. One sweep cut through the negro's left arm to the bone, another inflicted a long gash between the ribs; a third laid open the flesh on his back. Johnson finally managed to wrest the blade away from Burk, and went at him furiously. With one lunge he nearly cut Burk's windpipe, and with another he slashed his back. Here loss of blood caused him to drop, and the police being called in, Burk was arrested and Johnson removed to St. Michael's Hospital.

THE ASCOTT HEATH MEETING.

London, June 18.—At the fourth day's racing at the Ascott Heath meeting today, Mr. Leonard Brassy's bay colt, Bay Ronald (four years old) won the Harwich stakes. This race is for 2,000 sovereigns added to a sweepstake of 10 sovereigns each, second horse to receive 10 per cent and the third horse to receive five per cent of the whole stakes. Six horses ran, Lord Cadogan's b. f. Lowly was second and Mr. H. Bass' The Novelist third.

The Workingham stakes was won by Mr. Martin B. Rucker's bay horse El Diablo, this race is a handicap of 15 sovereigns each and 5 sovereigns forfeit, with 200 sovereigns added, for three years old and upwards, the second horse to receive 100 sovereigns out of the stakes.

Nineteen horses ran over the last three-quarters of the New Mile. Mr. H. I. Hikam's ch. c. Foston was second, and Mr. J. Ryan's b. h. Chassur third. Mr. Richard Crocker's b. h. American ran second in the race for the Queen's Stand Plate, Prince Solihull's b. h. Wooltherpe being first. Mr. Rucker's Red Heart was third. This race is for 800 sovereigns added to a sweepstake of 10 sovereigns each, second horse to receive 100 sovereigns, and the third horse to receive 50 sovereigns, for 2-year-olds and upwards.

The Alexander Plate was won by Mr. W. Low's b. c. St. Bris. Mr. Hamer Bass' Queen Wood was the only other horse running.

TIPS.

INTERNATIONAL FOOT RACE.

Boston, Mass., June 12.—The international foot race, one mile, purse \$250, between Geo. B. Tindler, of England, and Pat Carol, of Waltham, at Apollo Garden, was an easy victory for the Englishman. Carol made the pace for the first three-quarters of a lap, when Tinkler passed him, and was never headed thereafter. Time, 4:53.

WALKING ON WATER.

Pittsburg, Pa., June 19.—Robert Cook, of Boston, is in Pittsburg arranging to perform the remarkable feat of walking from Pittsburg to Guelph, a distance of 400 miles. Cook is the inventor of a pair of water shoes. He says that with the use of them he can make as good time as a man walking along an asphalt street. While in Chicago, Cook walked a distance of 400 miles in 14 days, and did it easily. This was taken by John Leopold. He is now in the hands of a responsible stakeholder. The start will be made on Sept. 1, at noon. After completing his journey, Cook will go into training on Lake Pontchartrain, La.

WHEEL.

THE CHATHAM MEET. The Detroit bikers are going to take in the Chatham meet in style. They will go in private yachts, starting on Friday and returning on Saturday. The Chatham management has been advised of July 25 other excursions. Besides the Detroit and Walkerville clubs, at least a dozen others are making preparations for special trains for the first day.

CENTURY RIDING.

A large number of entries have been made for the century ride from Woodstock to Chatham on June 20, including a party of 25 from Woodstock and a number from Guelph, Palmerston, Ingersoll and other towns in that neighborhood. The start will be at 8 a.m., the centaurs getting breakfast at London and dinner at Wardsville, finishing at Chatham at 3:30 p.m. The party from Toronto will leave Woodstock on Tuesday night, June 20.

The Delaware bicycle club held a road race last night in which the crackjacks of the village competed. The start was made from the Wharfcliffe Inn, the destination being Delaware and the distance nine miles. Detroit, June 19.—The Detroit Cycle Track Association has raised the prize in the one-mile open professional race on July 5 to \$75, the first prize. A great company of American and Canadian champions have consented to enter, and requests for entry blanks are numerous. Many of the riders from the C. W. will meet at Chatham on July 1, 2 and 3, and will enter the races here on July 5.

A BICYCLE BACK REST.

A bicycle "back rest" consists of a broad strap, which passes behind the shoulders and is attached by a cord to a hook on the handlebar. As for the "long-felt want" which this rest is said to supply, it is claimed that the device enables the rider to sit upright or to lean back and rest the back and shoulders while riding, and to open the ordinary driving power by bringing the full weight of the body, as well as the muscular force of the back and shoulders, to bear upon the pedals.—[Sketch.]

OVER-EXERCITION IN CYCLING.

Dr. Albu recently made an interest-

ing communication to the Berlin Medical Society on certain effects produced on the heart and other internal organs by over-exercition in cycle races. His conclusions were based on the condition of twelve professional cyclists whom he had examined both before and after racing lasting from five to thirty minutes. The strain thrown on the heart was shown by well-marked dyspnoea, and by the strong pulsation of the heart and arteries, but the most remarkable fact was an acute dilation of the heart, especially of the left ventricle. This dilation is of course, temporary, disappearing when rest has been taken and returning on the occasion of the next race. When over-exercition is frequent this dilation may become permanent, and in a heart that was previously weak an irreparable injury may occur. Another symptom was the presence of albumen and casts in the urine, caused by the effort of cycling. Dr. Albu believes that cycling in moderation is for most persons a very safe form of exercise, and he explained that the dangers he had described were only incurred by professional riders competitors at matches.—[London Lancet.]

HOW TO STEER.

Good saddle horses in the east are taught to guide by the reins instead of a pull on either rein. The best of the riders, who are still more sympathetic to their riders' wish, and are guided by an inclination of his body in the direction he is desiring to go. It should be the same way with a bicycle. Steering should be accomplished by a slight swaying of the body rather than by any sudden jerk or thrust of the handle bar. The instinct of the bicycle for guiding is incredibly fine, and, as previously said, inversely. The riders with a cultivated sense of balance can approach perfection in steering.

SPOKES.

Eddie Bald won the mile open professional race at Cortland, N. Y., on Thursday. Cooper did not get a place in the final.

Jimmy McNeill defeated McDuffie in the 15-mile paced match race at Cambridge on Thursday, and established a new record of 23:15. McDuffie led all two weeks of the race, but on Thursday, when his pacemakers gave out, and Michael, behind a fast triplet, took the lead and won by 100 yards.

London, June 19.—The Canadian oarsmen (Winnipeg crew), who will compete at the Henley regatta on July 14 and the following days, have arrived at Henley, and had a short spin on the river yesterday afternoon.

THE OLYMPIC CLUB CARNIVAL.

San Francisco, Cal., June 18.—Steve O'Donnell, the Australian heavyweight, knocked out Alex. Greigains, of San Francisco, in the eighth round. Bill Ellner, the pugilistic actor, knocked out Jim Ryan, of Cincinnati, in the eighth round. Jimmy Lawler, a clever local bantam, fought a ten-round draw with Jimmy Anthony, the Australian champion bantam-weight. These were the results of the Olympic Club's boxing carnival in Merchant's pavilion last night. There were 5,000 spectators, among them two scores of women. O'Donnell won his fight by good management. In the first three rounds Greigains was on the work, and had all the better of the contest. In the fourth round O'Donnell improved in his work, and Greigains began to get the better of the fight. Greigains fought at the body entirely, punching the chest and ribs of his opponent. The chance was in the eighth. In the two previous rounds O'Donnell punished Greigains totally with his right jab, opening a wound under the right eye an inch or more in length, from which the blood trickled down Greigains' body. In the seventh O'Donnell caught Greigains on the nose with a left jab, cutting a deep gash across the bridge. After these cuts Greigains vacillated fast. In the eighth, after a minute's sparring, O'Donnell hit Greigains on the nose with his left jab, and brought him to the jaw. Greigains fell as if shot, and never moved until his seconds carried him to his corner.
