A \$750,000 Annual Subsidy To Be Voted for a Steamship Line-Prerogation Expected About Wednerday

OTTAWA, July 11 .- In the public accounts committee this morning Mr. St. Louis, the contractor for labor on the Curran bridge at Montreal, was examined, and professed his ignorance of everything wrong, and even contradicted his sworn evidence given before the commission in Montreal, where he swore that he himself destroyed his books and papers. Today he swore they were used by the servant in his house to light the furnace. His reason for destroying his cash books used in connection with the bridge job was that he did not want to show what he had paid in election subscriptions to the Conservative party. He denied all knowledge of the falsification of his sheets that he sent to the Government and drew pay on. Frigon, his timekeeper, who "peached" on him yesterday, was, he said, a deliberate liar.

In the House of Commons Mr. Daly introduced a bill allowing the C. F. R. to choose the balance of their land subsidy in one block. The bill was read a first time. Mr. Daly also secured a first reading for bill amending the Dominion lands act.

On the orders of the day, Sir Richard Cartwright, in a bantering mood, asked the Government if they intended asking the House to mark in some fitting manner a certain recent auspicious and happy event in the family of the reigning sovereign. He made the suggestion because he knew that the Government had been busily engaged of late in celebrating the victory of the High Commissioner over certain malapert Cabinet Ministers who at long last had been taught their place. Another section of the Ministry had been busy whitewashing one of their friends after the fashion of the late lamented Tweed, but without being overtaken by his fate. The Ministry had also been busy with a tariff which made it more difficult for Canadians to purchase British goods. Now, however, Sir Richard continued, sending a sardonic smile across the floor at the First Minister, the Ministers were at leisure. They had eaten leek and applied the whitewash, and he would assume they were willing to move the adoption of an address of congratulation to the sovereign on an occasion which must have given great pleasure to that illustrious lady. It was a rare event for a reigning severeign to see

no less than three direct heirs to the throne. Sir John Thompson fell into the snare laid for him by Sir Richard Cartwright, and was seized with sudden anger. He sarcastically congratulated Sir Richard on remembering after many years of forgetfulness that he was a British subject. There was no victory of the High Commissioner, no exclusion of British goods, and instead of a whitewash they had simply endeavored to protect the member of the House from a blackwashing, applied not in the interests of the country, but in the interest of "low party intrigue." The Premier uttered these ast words with that emotional quiver in his voice so familiar to the House as in-

dicative of intense angry feeling. Mr. Laurier rallied the leader of the House on his failure to emulate the cheerulness and good humor of the member from

South Oxford and the incident ended. The House went into committee on the bill ratifying the French treaty. A desultory discussion on the precise effect of the treaty on toreign wines brought Mr. Foster to his feet several times in explanation. From all he said it appeared that the treaty did not oblige them to give France preferential treatment. 
