The General Elections.

Mr. Foster, the Tupper Apologist, Has a Stormy Reception at St. John.

The City Will Join Others and Go Liberal This Time.

Sir Charles Tupper to Speak in London Next Thursday.

B. B. Oiler, Q. C., Enters the Campaign Against Dr. Montagu.

TUPPER IN LONDON.

It is announced that Sir Charles Tupper will speak in London on Thursday evening next.

GLENCOE'S TRIBUTE.

A Wyoming correspondent writes: "I saw by your issue of today that you report the attendance of the two demonstrations for Laurier (Glencoe and Chatham) at 15,000. Now, incredible as it may seem, the mass of people in the park at Chatham numbered 15,000, besides 1,000 of Mr. Laurier's supporters in the Opera House. Several of us on the grand stand counted a given square, and from it estimated the mass, and all agreed there was over that number."

THEY FEAR DEFEAT.

Montreal, June 8.—A more dejected lot than the members of the Dominion Cabinet can scarcely be imagined. During the past few days they have been in and out of the Windsor Hotel with an air of depression which they seemed unable to shake off. Notwithstanding all their boasts they have the appearance of badly beaten men. On Friday there was a meeting of the Council, at which Sir Charles Tupper decided to try to make himself solid in New Brunswick and the eastern end of Quebec by announcing that the Government intends to take possession of the Grand Central Railway, and a number of local railways in New Brunswick, and add them to the Intercolonial system. On Saturday morning Sir Charles Tupper was making desperate efforts to raise a campaign fund. It is common talk that one Senator has undertaken to raise \$500,000 on condition of being knighted in case of success.

Sir Charles Tupper went up to Ottawa today to address a meeting there in the evening. He has not accepted any date yet for a Toronto meeting.

KING DODDS AT A DISCOUNT.

Mr. E. King Dodds wasn't carried around on people's shoulders in British Columbia to which he went on a Tupperian mission, and his canvass in the west had much of the bed of roses about it. In some places people would listen to him, and in others people said mean things of him to him. A leading citizen, who, up till now has been a Conservative, writing from Vancouver city says: "Much has been said and more thought about Mr. E. King Dodds' failure to obtain a hearing in the Market Hall. Those who are unacquainted with the actions of a disgraced meeting and who, willingly or unwillingly, shut their eyes to such evidence, would do well to read the account of the Market Hall incident in the 'Daily Star' of June 1st. It is a man utterly devoid of political principle or prestige, for we forget his actions with regard to the Dunkin' and Scott Acts? A person whose platitudes and subterfuges are a by-word and whose oratorical powers are sold to the highest bidder."

"MISERABLY STUBBORN" THIS

An Amherst, N. S., telegram says: A gentleman who arrived in town by last night's express sat in the seat directly behind Sir Charles Tupper. He noticed the young knight had a melancholy and dejected look. The cause was explained on arrival at Amherst. Nova Scotia's greatest politician, acrobat, got on board and sat beside the knight. During the conversation Sir Hibbert remarked that he was all up in Picton, that he could do nothing with those miserably stubborn Scotch Presbyterians.

THE NEST OF TRAITORS.

Halifax, Nova Scotia, June 8.—Prof. McMechan, of Dalhousie University, a Conservative, announces his conversion to Liberal principles. In one part of his interview, published in the Chronicle, he said that he had condoned the conduct of that portion of the ministers who in the crisis of last January behaved so treacherously to Sir Mackenzie Bowell. I would not even by a single vote appear to sympathize with the men who were guilty of that conduct and who seemed prepared to go to any lengths in order to retain power. Mr. Foster was one of the Ministers who "behaved so treacherously" toward Sir Mackenzie Bowell. He was one of the "nest of traitors" as the late Premier so forcibly described the men who betrayed him. Mr. Foster refused to explain his "raid" to a Toronto audience, and he has never referred to it in his York campaign. Traitor is not a pleasant term to be applied to any man, and that is what Sir Mackenzie called Mr. Foster and his gang of conspirators.

COERCION CONDEMNED.

Winnipeg, June 8.—The Methodist Conference of Manitoba and the Northwest Territories on Saturday morning reaffirmed the former strong position against any interference from Ottawa. The conferees were instructed to check off in the discussion, as opinion was practically unanimous, and it was useless to waste time in talking.

Rev. Dr. Carman, of Toronto, before the matter was postponed, said: "Brethren, it is not merely a matter of politics, it is also a matter of religion. When an attempt is made to coerce a man or a people against the freedom of a citizen or of Britons, that is religion."

Mr. M. Aikens, who espoused the Tupper view, was so wroth at the re-

sult that he rose and left the conference. Following is the resolution, moved by Rev. Mr. Turk, and passed: "That this Manitoba and Northwest Conference of the Methodist Church reaffirms its former expressions, touching the school question, and again indorses the deliverance of the General Conference, touching the question of civil and religious liberty."

"That we desire to place on record our belief that the interest of the citizens of this Province will be best served by the maintenance of a non-denominational public schools; that while we deprecate any legislation by this Province or Dominion which will have the effect of restoring any such denominational school system as existed before the passing of the Public Schools Act, we are in favor of such amendment of our present school law by our Provincial authorities as will remove any just cause of complaint on the part of our Roman Catholic fellow-citizens, to whom we are most willing to accord every right and privilege in relation to education, and who are now, through the action of the Government, being deprived of any special privileges beyond those we, as Protestants, are entitled to possess, we distinctly deny."

OATS IN EVIDENCE.

Mr. Wm. Hutchison, one of the Liberal candidates for Ottawa, speaking the other day on the subject of oats, remarked that from his long experience in the milling business with the C. W. Company, he was in a position to say that not in 30 years have the farmers been selling oats at the low prices that prevail over the Province now.

A PROPHECY LIKELY TO BE FILLED ON JUNE 23.

Mr. Edgar Maurice Smith, in Munsey's Magazine for June, has an article on Canada's strong men. He groups among them the political leaders of both parties, Lord Mount-Stephen, Sir Donald Smith, G.C.M.G., Sir William Dawson, C.B., Prof. Goldwin Smith, Sir William Van Horne, Mr. Charles M. Hays, Major-General Gascoigne, and others. Quoting incidentally, and as the writer's remark, that Mr. Mackenzie Bowell has shown a somewhat unexpected grasp upon the Premiership to which he succeeded on the sudden death of the late Sir John Thompson a year ago last December. The seven Cabinet conspirators, with Mr. Foster at their head, are now in the hop. George Tupper, their chief, when their little game matured on the arrival of Sir Charles Tupper, just prior to the famous session of Parliament. Nothing of these details of Sir Mackenzie's strength appears in Munsey's. Speaking of Mr. Wilfrid Laurier, the article says: "Laurier has been the lot of his Liberal antagonists, at whose head Wilfrid Laurier has stood since Mr. Blake's withdrawal. The Liberal cause about to be held may possibly, and for the first time in eighteen years, place the Reformers on the treasury benches. In such an event Laurier's accession to the Premiership will be significant, owing to the fact that heretofore Canadian has ever held that important office. His friends predict that his very broad ideas, and particularly his fearless stand he took upon the Anglo-Saxon element from his own countrymen. Though his career has been the rocky path of opposition, while others, perhaps less deserving, have luxuriated in the rose-scented ways of power, Laurier has remained in the most respected personalities in the Dominion. His most notable gift is that of oratory, which has won for him the title of 'the Englishman's English' in the English tongue than any of his Anglo-Saxon rivals."

MR. FOSTER AND HIS OATH.

Halifax, N. S., June 8.—Attorney-General Blair is doing great work for the Liberals, speaking almost every night to large audiences. The other day he addressed the electors of the north end of the city, and in dealing with the Manitoba school question charged the Government with treachery. Referring to Mr. Foster's statement that his oath of office compelled him to support coercion, Mr. Blair said: "The Government is to be understood as in any way charging Mr. Foster with a violation of his oath, but I wonder where was the binding and solemn oath that Mr. Foster took when Mr. Foster and his five colleagues were dancing around Ottawa trying to undermine the leader of the Government? Upon his oath he had taken a solemn oath to stand by, which oath is to act with his colleagues truly, honestly and above board. To constitute a member of Cabinet or against the leader is hardly in harmony with the oath, and while I would be long to see Mr. Foster in a position to make use of the oath for an impracticable purpose, when it could have been very much more efficiently used for a private own mind," which was the gist of his remarks.

WILL VOTE LIBERAL.

Toronto, Ont., June 8.—At a meeting held in St. Paul's Hall the other night in the interests of Mr. H. R. Frankland, Liberal candidate for East York, Mr. Hugh Blair, ex-president of the Board of Trade, announced himself as on the Liberal platform for the first time in three general elections. He said that all patriotic citizens must work to put out of office the Tupper regime.

A TUPPERITE ALLY.

Ottawa, June 8.—The Tupperites are circulating a Conservative Bishop Lafleche's sermon, in which he denounced Mr. Laurier as a Liberal, and not a Conservative, as a campaign literature. Over a hundred thousand copies will be printed for the Province of Quebec.

DEMAND FOR LAURIER BUTTONS.

A prominent member of one of the largest wholesale houses in this city dealing in the campaign buttons informed our reporter that the Laurier buttons were in great demand in comparison with the Tupper buttons, which could hardly be sold in the country.—Montreal Witness.

FOSTER LOST HIS TEMPER.

St. John, N. B., June 8.—The Foster meeting here Saturday night was a noisy affair and at the time the Minister of Finance had much difficulty in getting a hearing. The institute was crowded, but many were by means satisfied with the Government's policy, and hisses and interruptions were frequent. Eight hundred people attended Mr. Foster's speech here, and he tried soft words to smooth over the opposition of former friends. Hisses were the order, Foster was interrupted and hissed. When he made the statement that the Liberal party was "un-British

and un-Canadian," he was met with cries of "No, no," and hisses. It was some minutes before Mr. Foster could be heard, and then, through the storm of derision, could be heard Mr. Foster saying there was "a reptile that crawled" that acted like that. Still the hisses went on. Someone taunted him about the sale of the Harris estate, and Mr. Foster lost his temper. At the top of his voice he shouted out: "You are the same crank as your leader, Laurier." This was met by hisses. When the storm subsided, Mr. Foster said it was the first time he had designated Mr. Laurier a crank. Mr. Foster next tried to deal with the independents, and wanted to know what their policy was. This was the signal for an outburst of derision, and he was told they were going to look after the interests of St. John. Mr. Foster pointed to the two Conservative candidates and said they would address the electors of Haldimand at Dunville tomorrow evening.

Mr. Laurier will speak at the Massey Music Hall, Toronto, on Friday evening next.

Mr. B. B. Oiler, Q.C., is billed to address the electors of Haldimand at Dunville tomorrow evening.

Mr. Patterson, of Brantford, addressed a crowded meeting in Brockville on Saturday night.

George Talton, a staunch anti-coercionist, has taken the field against Laurier in Provence, Manitoba. If he gets the solid English vote, he stands a good chance of election.

At a large meeting in Center Toronto last week, presided over by Mr. C. C. Van Norman, well-known manufacturer of boots and shoes, Mr. Lount, the Liberal candidate, was enthusiastically received. Mayor Fleming is giving him able support.

TOWN AND COUNTRY.

Arthur Lean, son of the late Charles Lean, died at Belmont, Thursday, from the effects of double pneumonia. Deceased went to Aylmer, Quebec's Blanche, on the train, and pneumonia ensued. He was a young man of about 20 years of age. He has a sister named Mrs. Ecker, of South Chicago, and a younger brother and sister at home. He was a nephew of Dr. Linton, of St. Thomas.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Walker, Belmont, was the scene of an interesting event Wednesday evening. It was the occasion of the marriage of their daughter, Lottie Catherine, to Mr. Campbell, of Belmont, a well-known young farmer of North Dorchester. The bride, beautifully attired, was supported by her sister, Minnie, and the groom, Campbell's brother, Colin, discharged the duties of groomsmen. The marriage ceremony was performed by the Rev. J. Currie, of Belmont.
