his opinion thus: "The failure was mainly due to re-liance on inaccurate information regarding the ground to be traversed to the position held by the Boers, to the employment of too small a force, and to the men being tired out by a long night march before they came in con-tact with the enemy. When it became evident, shortly after midnight, that the guides were leading the column in the wrong direction, I consider Gat-acre should have halted and endeavored to find a proper road, or should have fallen back on Molteno rather than have risked the safety of the entire force by following a route which brought the troops into difficult ground commanded on both sides by Boers." "EX-PRESIDENT" STEYN BUSY. London, March 17.-President Steyn since his arrival at Kroonstadt is issuing counter proclamations and striving to rally his troops to the defense of the republic, but unless all signs fail his forces are rapidly disappearing from the field. The old order of government has lost its political center with the surrender of the capital, but a new order of administration has been created under the British flag. Apparently Lord Roberts' main work during the next fortnight will be one of pacification and elaboration of order. He has paymasters who will buy supplies for his army of 50,000 men, and he has also his disciplinarians, who will en-force respect for private property. With gold to pay out and soldiers under rigorous discipline Lord Roberts is likely to prove a successful politician

will in an increasing measure continue to result, in material benefit to the mother country and Canada, and which has already alded in welding together the ties which now bind them, and desires to express its amphatic approval of such British preference having been granted by the Parliament of Canada."
