For the Current Year Amount to \$3,729,716, Including \$941,276 Revote.

Ottawa, April 9.—Supplementary estimates for the current fiscal year amounting to \$3,729,716, of which \$941,-276 was a revote, were submitted to the house today. The main estimates for 1900-01 amounted to \$56,611,085, and Mr. Fielding in his budget speech estimated that the total expenditure on consolidated fund and capital account during the current year would be a trifle over \$57,000,000. The main estimates for the next fiscal year approximate \$50,398,823. This is several millions below that of the current year, but further supplementaries for next year still remain to be tabled, which will increase the amount to be voted for 1901-02. The following are the chief items of interest in the sup-
