SAW LONDON GROW TO CITY.

Interesting Life of L. C. Leonard, Who Died Yesterday.

Was Born in 1813 and Had Lived the Greater Part of His Life in London.

Mr. Louis C. Leonard, of Queen's avenue, eldest brother of the late Senator Elijah Leonard and the late Lyman Leonard, died yesterday after a lengthy illness. Mr. Leonard had seen London rise from a mere village to its present proportions, and in the early history of the city was one of the most energetic and influential merchants. He served on the board of aldermen as representative of No. 4 ward in the years 1873-4 and 5, and during the two latter terms officiated as chairman of the finance committee, a position he filled with great acceptance and profit to the city generally. He was not what might be termed a public man, but on municipal matters was exceptionally well posted. He was born in the village of Geddes, near Syracuse, N. Y. in 1813, and engaged in a small way for several years in the development of salt, relinquishing his connection therewith in 1850, in which
