Salonica, June 1. - A letter from Monastir, written by an agent of the British and Foreign Bible Society, who was an eve-witness of the fight at the Bulgarian village of Mogil, six miles north of Monastir, on May 21, between the imperial forces and insurgent bands, says that seventeen komtajis, who were in the village when it was at-tacked, having fired all their cartridges and seeing that resistance was useless killed themselves. The number included three Bulgarian officers of high rank. The letter adds: Our position here is very wretched. We live in great fear. God have pity on us and bring peace to these regions!

DIVORCES INCREASE Official Figures of Marriage Separa-

tions in England. New York, June 1.-The Sun today has the following from London: Offi-cial statistics just published of what might be called marriage failures for the year 1901 show a big increase in separation and divorce cases. In 1893 the court granted 825 separation orders, which was at the rate of 2.77 for 100,000 of population. In 1901 7,330 orders were granted, which is at the rate of 22.47 per 100,000. The divorce petitions numbered 750 in 1901. Of this number 491 were filed by husbands and 259 by wives. There was a striking diversity in the number of separations in the various counties and towns. In London the percentage was 18, in Lancashire 40, and in Durham 48 per 100,000 of population. In Rutlandshire there were no petitions. In the towns of Blackburn and Bolton the percentage per 100,000 was 98, in Leeds 62 and in Liverpool 38.
