BURGLAR'S TRAGIC FATE

His Dead Body Found Among the Debris Caused in "Blowing" a Safe.

Hutchinson, Kansas, Nov. 20.—The safe of the Missouri Pacific Railway depot here was blown by robbers yesterday. Afterward a man, believed to have been one of the robbers, was found dead with a bullet hole through his head. The supposition is that the dead man was stunned by the explosion, and the others, thinking he was too badly crippled to get away, shot him. The money left in the safe was all found under the debris.

MURDERED AND MANGLED.
Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 20.—The dead bodies of A. H. Wilcox, his wife and two-year-old son were found in their home at Downey, twelve miles from this city yesterday. All the bodies were horribly mutilated. Wilcox and his family had been shot, and then literally cut to pieces with a knife. The woman had been shot while carrying a plate from the stove to the table. The baby lay in the middle of the room, while the disemboweled body of the father was stretched near the door. No clue.

CORPSE TO FIGURE IN TRIAL

Jeffersonville, Ind., Nov. 20.—The corpse of the man Goodman, with whose death Newell C. Rathbun is charged, will figure in the latter's trial. The body has been shipped from Little Rock. An analysis of the contents of the stomach will be made. Rathbun's trial may go over until the February term of court.

HIS BRAIN TICKS LIKE A WATCH

Syracuse, Nov. 20.—One of the most peculiar cases ever encountered by the medical profession came up in police court here, when a lad was discovered who had a brain which ticked like a watch. He is Alex Jenni and is 15 years old. He has been working on a farm at North Syracuse, his parents being dead. He has been at St. Joseph's Hospital, where he was examined by the physicians. By placing the ear close to the head a ticking can be heard. His intellect is not impaired.

CHILDREN CREMATED!

Three Little Ones Burned to Death in Their Home.

Essex County Farmer Attacked by a Sow—Lad Killed to Death by a Horse.

Antigo, Wis., Nov. 20.—The farm house of John Sewitzke, in Lagladow, was destroyed by fire Monday. Three children, ranging from three months to five years, lost their lives, and their bodies were almost entirely consumed. MOTHER AND BABY BURNED TO DEATH.

Xenia, Ill., Nov. 20.—Mrs. Mary Manning and her four-year-old daughter Edith, were burned to death here yesterday.

ATTACKED BY SAVAGE SOW.
Andover, Ont., Nov. 20.—John Hager, a Sandwich South farmer living near Planting Bros' mill, narrowly escaped being disemboweled by a ferocious sow, which he disturbed in the woods while it was making a bed for its litter. The animal knocked him down and ripped a cut in his abdomen that required thirteen stitches to close.

SCHOOL BOY'S SUICIDE.
Wilkesbarre, Pa., Nov. 20.—For failing to attend school regularly, Mrs. Emanuel Smallstreet, of this city, pushed her 12-year-old step-son, Hal, the last week upstairs to a medicine chest, and procured a bottle of carbolic acid. He gave his brother William some of the contents, and then drank the rest of the bottle. William is still in a critical condition, but it is thought he will recover. Hal died last night.

DEAD ALONGSIDE THE TRACK.
Chatham, Ont., Nov. 19.—This morning west-bound C. T. R. freight at between 7 and 7:30 o'clock brought the news into the city that the body of a man had been seen lying alongside the track, apparently lifeless. The man wore blue overalls over a pair of fairly good black trousers. His coat is that of a laborer. There was no address on the coat, and no identification by. Presumably he is a farm laborer about 24 or 25 years of age.

RECEIVED 600 VOLTS.
Hamilton, Nov. 20.—Mr. Wm. Pickard, a lineman employed by the Hamilton Electric Company, narrowly escaped being electrocuted while repairing wires near the James Street Incline Railway. He accidentally caught hold of a live wire and received 600 volts through the body. Pickard was brought to terra firma and attended by Dr. Rennie.

INJURED BY STREET CAR.
Hamilton, Nov. 20.—Mr. Thomas Hirst, Murray street, was painfully injured in the East End sheds of the street railway company. He was in a place, while crossing the street, a pit under a car, and was run over by the car. He is now in the hospital.

KILLED BY A WABASH TRAIN.
Belleville, Mich., Nov. 20.—Richard Hope, a well-to-do citizen of this place, while crossing the railroad south of this village, was struck and instantly killed by the St. Louis fast express on the Wabash road.

AMERICAN, N. Y., Nov. 20.—Mrs. Henry C. Miller was killed yesterday at Tribes Hill by being run over by a Central Hudson train. Her husband was very ill with typhoid fever, and Mrs. Miller, while temporarily deranged from grief and watching, wandered on the railroad and was killed.

FATALLY KICKED.
Little Britain, Ont., Nov. 20.—While leading a horse to a pasture, Andy Neely, the eldest son of Wesley Perrin, was kicked in the head. He died of his injuries Monday night.

WIDOW SHOTS TWO MEN.
Creston, Ia., Nov. 20.—Mrs. Charles Edwards, widow of Andy Neely, who she claims, was attempting to prevent her from occupying a leased farm where the shooting occurred. Neely may die. She occupies the premises.

KILLED BY ROLLING LOG.
Iron Mountain, Mich., Nov. 20.—John Vandever, aged 18, was caught by a rolling log in the camp near here and crushed to a jelly.

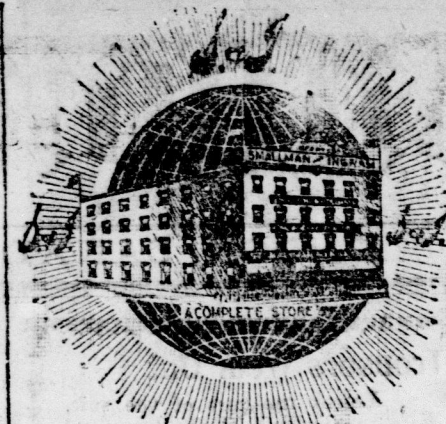
LOEO

SET AFIRE BY FISH GLOBE.
Lyons, N. Y., Nov. 20.—Luther B. Lake's house has twice been set on fire by means of a glass globe containing kerosene. The globe recently was placed on a stand and set on the sunny side of the house, where it was left all day, while Mr. and Mrs. Lake went on a visit. When they returned there were holes burned in the side of the house. The fish were again placed in the neighborhood, and a few hours later a neighbor passing the house gave the alarm of fire. Clouds of smoke came from the side of the house. Upon examination it was found that the sun's rays struck the globe, which in turn set the kerosene on fire. The globe was set on fire in three places.

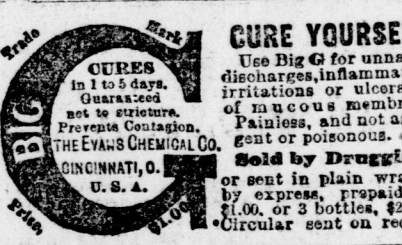
