BOER GENERALS TALK TO JOSEPH

Botha Presents Their Case to
Mr. Chamberlain.

PROPOSALS FOR BETTER TERMS

British Traders Are Too Slow, Los-
ing Bulk of the Trade With
South Africa.

London, Nov. 12.—At the conference at the Colonial Office yesterday between Mr. Chamberlain and Generals Botha and Delarey, General Botha presented Mr. Chamberlain with a written statement of the general's case for the betterment of the Boers under the peace settlement, and explained verbally their proposals. He expressed the hope that Mr. Chamberlain, in the course of his visit to South Africa,

SPECIAL MEDAL.
A special medal has been struck in recognition of the extreme efficiency with which the officers of the British mercantile marine conducted the transport of troops to South Africa and China. It is the intention of the King that a medal shall be granted in future wars to the officers of the mercantile marine serving in troop transports, whenever a war medal has been granted to the troops engaged.

CARGO OF COFFINS LOST.

The British steamer Ventnor, bound for China, has foundered off New Zealand. The crew was saved. The cargo included 500 coffins, containing the remains of Chinese for reinterment in China. Four hundred and sixty coffins were insured at £10 each. The steamer was wrecked. The crew was landed at Hokitanga. The Ventnor was a steel screw steamer of 8,961 gross tonnage, built at Port Glasgow in 1901.

THREE BOATS MISSING.
The steamer Zealandia has picked up 70 persons on one boat and two rafts from the British steamer Lingamite, which was wrecked Sunday off the coast of New Zealand and three boats from the Eltingamite are still missing.

FAMINE IN FINLAND.
The St. Petersburg paper, Viedomski, publishes a distressing account of the famine in Finland. The barley and oat crops in the north have been ruined by frosts, following an extremely cold

THE NORTH GREY ELECTION TRIAL

An Unintentional and Techni-
cal Violation of Act.

TRIAL LASTED VERY BRIEF TIME

Voters Were Carried in a Hired
Livery Rig the Day Before
the Election.

As briefly mentioned yesterday the North Grey election trial, held here, at Owen Sound, before Mr. Justice Macdennan and Mr. Justice Macdennan, was short, lasting less than half an hour, and resulted in the election of Mr. A. 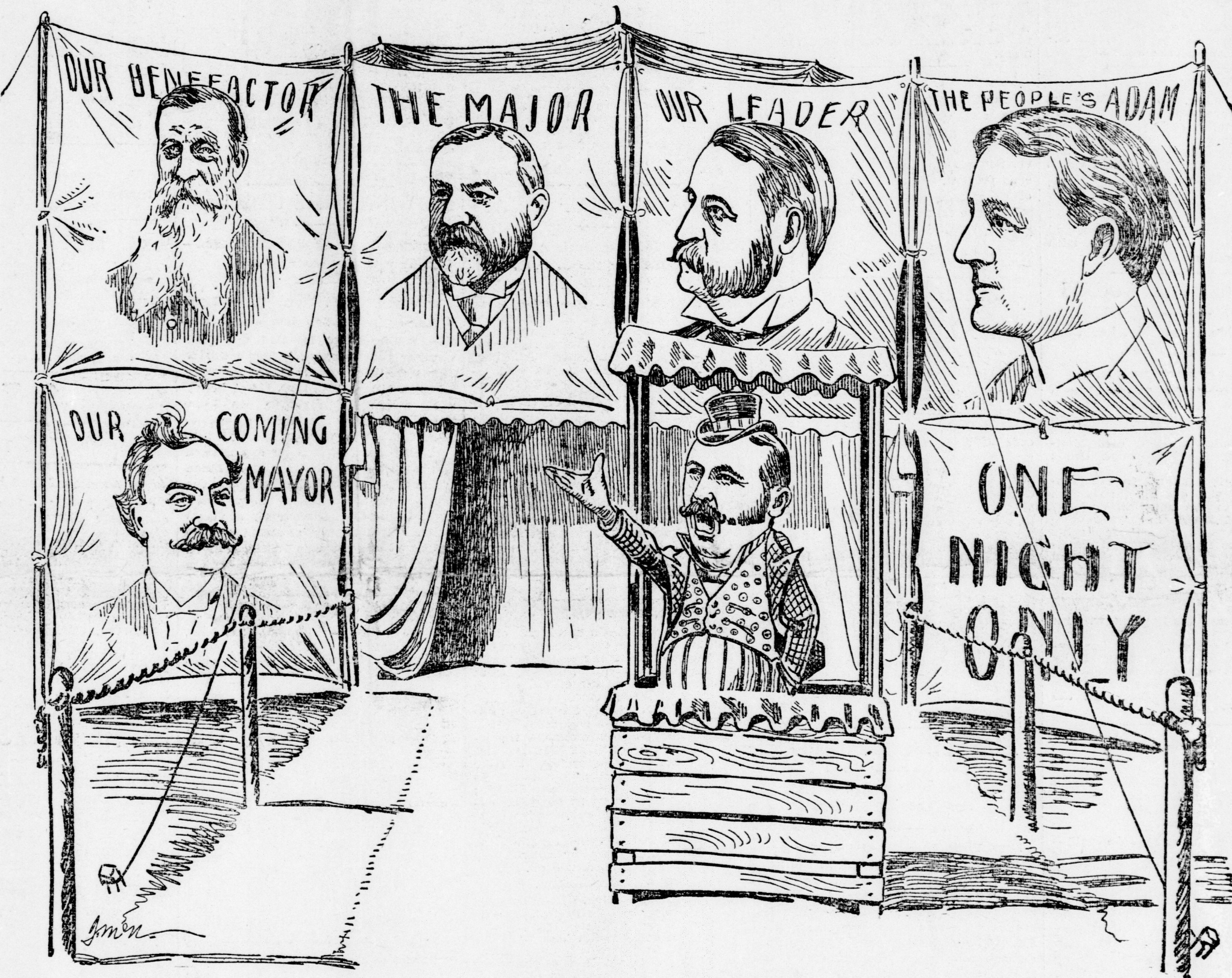

The Colonial Secretary promised to give the matter his attention.

WILL RUSH EDUCATION BILL.
Premier Balfour's motion to apply automatic closure by compartments to the Government Educational Bill, was agreed to in the House of Commons by 22 votes to 103. Following this method the bill must be passed by Nov. 23.

A vigorous amendment to the motion, made by Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, the Liberal leader, which drew fighting speeches from Colonial Secretary Chamberlain, Mr. Balfour, Mr. Asquith and many others, was defeated by 234 to 112.

BRITISH TOO SLOW.
The report of the commissioners sent to South Africa by the South African Trade Committee to investigate trade conditions confirms the previous statements of the progress of American and German exports at the expense of the British. The latter yet hold the bulk of the trade, but the enormous enterprise and energy of their rivals are enabling them to make rapid headway. The report, speaking generally, is a new sermon on the old text of the dilatoriness and conservatism of British manufacturers and exporters, whose goods, nevertheless, are often preferred, owing to their excellence of construction. The variety, cheapness and lightness of the American and German machinery are among the principal causes of its success. The engines, however, sometimes err in over-lightness, resulting in collapse. The extent of the field for enterprise in one direction only can be gathered from the commission's prediction that the Rand alone will consume in the

summer, and the damage has been increased by great floods swamping the fields before the harvest was in. Thousands of families are suffering from starvation and attendant disease. In one village in the Province of Ulster, 200 persons are in a state of destitution, and 300 are living from hand to mouth. In many places the peasants have been forced to sell everything they possessed to obtain food, and are eating bread made of trees.

AROUSES INDIGNATION.
The Victorian ministry is deliberating a bill depriving public servants of votes in ordinary constituencies, but allowing them to elect two special representatives in the Legislative Assembly and one in the council. This measure is proposed in order to minimize the political influence of public servants. Disclosure of government's intention has aroused intense indignation among public servants.

RADICAL REMEDIES NEEDED.
A Rome correspondent says Baron Sonnino, the well-known economist and leader of the constitutional opposition in the Italian Parliament, in an address on the miserable condition in Southern Italy, proposed drastic and radical remedies. The baron described the reduction of the peasantry by emigration, saying that more than 100,000 persons had left Naples this year. He told of the ravages caused by deforestation, and spoke of excessive taxation and usury which peasants suffer in addition to losses caused by the outbreak of phylloxera. The speaker deprecated reliance on public relief works. He proposed a reduction of the land tax and of interest on southern land mortgages, the introduction of perpetual leaseholds of small holdings at low rent in order to break up huge uncultivated estates, and a reform of agricultural labor contracts in favor of peasants.

He deposed that he had been active in the election of Mr. Mackay, that in May 28, the day before the election, he had brought several voters from Meaford to Owen Sound in a hired livery rig, that it was contrary to the law, and that it did not know at the time, he said, that it was contrary to the law.

Mr. W. J. Hatton, who was Mr. Mackay's financial agent, was then called and stated that he had paid the bill of the Meaford liveryman without knowing that the conveyance had been hired for the purpose of carrying voters. He had no knowledge, he asserted, of any other wrongful act in connection with the election.

Mr. Mackay, the successful candidate, was the only other witness. He said that in going over the accounts he had passed the one in question, supposing the rig to have been used, as it was not on election day, for legitimate election work by the Meaford Association. He explained that Meaford had an organization of its own, and that it was only three weeks ago he had become aware of the irregularity in this instance. Asked if there had been any such carriage with this knowledge in respect of other voters, he stated positively there had not been. He stated further that after interviewing 80 per cent of the people charged in connection with this protest, he had found no trace of wrongdoing.

Mr. Geo. H. Watson, K.C., who appeared for Mr. Mackay, then addressed the court, and said there had been no doubt an unintentional but technical violation of the act. It had been stated in the beginning that Mr. Mackay's majority was five, and as there were five or six of these improperly carried voters, the effect was necessarily to void the election.

Mr. Cassels said that in face of the small majority it would be hopeless to attempt to uphold the election, and he deemed it in the interest of both par-

ties that the election be declared void without the expense of a long trial. Mr. Watson said he was confident the other charges would be dismissed if the trial went on.

Mr. Justice Macdennan said that under the circumstances the court thought the election could not be sustained, and therefore declared it void, without costs, and dismissed the other charges. The cross-petition was also dismissed.

Considerable attention was directed to North Grey shortly after the election by the accidental discovery during the re-count of four Boyd ballots from polling subdivision No. 9, St. Vincent, that bore other very light marks on the face of them. Mr. Boyd and his assistants raised a great outcry, but not the slightest proof of corrupt intention on the part of anyone was proved.
