BY ACCLAMATION.

In addition, 11 Nationalists and 3 Irish Unionists were elected yesterday by acclamation.

The proportion of net gains by the Unionists yesterday was larger than or Saturday, but the seats won are normally Conservative, and gave relatively small majorities for the Government in 1906. The results indicate that Scotland will again go overwhelmingly Liberal, while there can be little Of These, the Liberals Held 52 in Last Parliament, Unionists 18, doubt that the Government will make another clean sweep in

SCOTLAND'S IMPOSING VOTE.

The Ministerialists are amazed at their own successes in Scotland. Even their abnormal vote in 1906 has been exceeded in six of the seven ridings heard from. Churchill has a lead of 6,408 votes over the nearest Unionist, compared with a majority of 2,709 in the by-election of 1908. Central, East and South Edinburgh give an aggregate Liberal vote of 20,595 and a Unionist total of only 8,988. The Unionists hold West Edinburgh by 450 majority, against 306 in 1906 and 1,535 in 1900. The Unionists may do better in the counties, where the landowning interests are a power.

Churchill's majority is a reward for his strenuous services as a campaigner. He is credited with much of the Ministerial success in Lancashire, to which he devoted most of his attention, speaking twice a day for a fortnight just before polling. UNIONIST HOPES.

The great majority of the English counties are to be heard from, and the Unionists expect greater gains in these because of the powerful influence of the nobility and great landowners in the rural districts. The Ministerialists say that the Covernment is sufficiently secure to stand considerable losses in the counties.

TWO MINISTERS DEFEATED.

The first members of the Ministry to be defeated are Colonel Seely, under colonial secretary, who vesterday lost his seat in the Abercromby division of Liverpool, and R. K. Causton, paymaster-general, who failed in Southwark West. Ministerialists, and a seat will probably be found for him later.

Sir William Robson, who is re-elected in South Shields, was the attorney-general in the last cabinet. He is one of the most effective debaters and speakers in his party.

Alfred Lyttelton, re-elected in the fashionable district of St. George's, Hanover Square, London, was colonial secretary in the Balfour Government and an Opposition front-bencher was the election of William O'Brien, Laborites, 118; Irish Nationalists, 42.
