SHORT WEIGHT CONSPIRACY TRIAL

Trump Card in Prosecution of Chas. S. Heike Played On Monday.

SPITZER ON THE STAND

Was Serving Time for Underweighing—Pardoned Probably So That He Could Testify.

New York, May 23.—The trump card in the prosecution of Charles R. Heike, secretary of the American Sugar Refining Company, the so-called "Man higher up" was played at the opening of the sugar trust underweighing conspiracy trial today, when Prosecutor Henry L. Stimson called as the Government's first witness Oliver Spitzer, superintendent of the Williamsburg docks, who some months ago was convicted of underweighing, and sentenced to two years in the Federal penitentiary at Atlanta.

Spitzer was accompanied into court by Chief Flynn, of the secret service. When he took the stand, Lawyer John T. Stanchfield, for the defence, claimed that under the Federal statute Spitzer, as a convicted man, could not testify.

A sensation, The sensation of the trial was then created by the declaration in court that Spitzer had been pardoned by President Taft.

As Spitzer testified to the underweighing frauds on the docks, it was developed that President Taft granted him an unconditional pardon on May 19, 1908.

Spitzer went back to the years 1904 and 1905, when he said that an investigation he made developed the fact that the checkers were affecting the weights on raw sugar by placing small bags of lead on the beams of the scales, causing the recorded weights to drop below actual, often as much as 40 pounds on each draft.

Steel Corset Springs. In addition to the bags of lead placed on the beams to affect the weights, he added that when Deputy Surveyor of Customs Vail took office these devices were abandoned and the use of steel corset springs instead was begun and continued.

Spitzer testified freely about the frauds by which the Government was robbed of millions of dollars. He said the use of the steel springs was stopped after the sugar trust had paid its rebate to the Government as a result of the federal suit.

Signal Lights. "Did you arrange a system of signal lights in the scale houses?" suddenly asked the prosecutor. "Yes, sir," replied Spitzer, who then related that the signals were used to warn the weighers of any sudden danger.

"How were the lights worked?" "By a switch in my office," replied Spitzer, who said that the switch was turned whenever a Government official was seen to approach.

Use of Lead. Spitzer demonstrated in court the use of the bags of lead. He walked over to the sample scale, which is one of the Government's exhibits, and indicated on the beam the place where the bag was suspended. The jury, the defendants and everybody in the court room followed his demonstration with the closest attention.

Testifying regarding the use of the steel spring which superceded the bag of lead, Spitzer said that two styles, a heavy one and then a spring considerably lighter in weight.

Spitzer's testimony regarding the newspaper under the scale was a new development. Heike listened to Spitzer's testimony with tense interest.

The Charges. Heike is on trial in the United States circuit court, with five former employees of the American Sugar Refining Company, on the charge of conspiring against the Government by underweighing cargoes of sugar imported into this country.

Witnesses have testified to the discovery of fraudulent devices on the sugar docks, whereby it was alleged employees of the so-called sugar trust manipulated the scales so as to bring about a false weight. On evidence of Richard Peter, a Government inspector, who made a raid on the sugar docks in November, 1907, and others, Spitzer, who was the dock superintendent at the time, and for some years previous, was convicted with four checkers employed under him, of connection with the conspiracy to perpetrate frauds whereby the Government was cheated out of millions of dollars in sugar duties. The four checkers were sent to the Blackwell's Island Penitentiary for a year. Spitzer got two years in Atlanta.

Men "higher up" were sought, and Heike, the secretary of the trust, and Ernest W. Gobracht, the refinery superintendent, were indicted.

PRESSMEN VISIT NEW ONTARIO

Nearly Two Hundred Representatives Travel as Guests of Two Railroads to Far North.

RICH AGRICULTURAL LAND

Banquetted by North Bay and New Liskeard Citizens and Treated Royally by Cobalt Mining Camps.

On Wednesday evening, May 18, the most important excursion of its kind ever held in the history of the Dominion of Canada left the Union Depot, Toronto, at 10 p.m. via the Grand Trunk Railway. The train of nine cars was composed of five Pullmans, two G. T. R. dining cars, baggage car, and the official car of the Ontario and Northern Ontario Railroads. The excursion was a tour of Northern Ontario to the Canadian Press Association who had been meeting in Toronto the 17th and 18th, and the Grand Trunk and Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railroads provided the transportation facilities for this large party of pressmen, and to both railroads the Canadian Press Association is under a debt of gratitude for the care taken from beginning to end.

At North Bay. The party arrived at North Bay on Thursday morning at seven o'clock. The train was there taken to in charge by the accompanying trainmen. Arriving at Cobalt about 11 a.m., the pressmen assembled at once in the Opera House where the mayor of the city read an address of welcome. Guides were appointed to take from ten to twelve newspapersmen to the mines, and in this way the party had the opportunity of inspecting the various silver mining camps. The train departed for Haliburton at three o'clock, but a large number remained in Cobalt going to Haliburton by electric cars. Haliburton is one of the prettiest cities that it would be possible to locate. It borders on the beautiful Lake Temiskaming and is growing very rapidly. Transportation was afforded the newspapersmen to New Liskeard by boat, where a banquet was held in the evening.

Mayor George Taylor, an old ex-mayor of London, was the chairman. The toast list was long and varied, covering the following subjects: "The King"; "The Canadian Press Association," proposed by J. H. Brown, of the Herald, New Liskeard; responded to by J. P. McKay, of Toronto; "The Temiskaming," proposed by Senator Robert Jaffray, responded to by R. T. Shillington, M. L. A., "New Liskeard," proposed by W. S. Dingman, responded to by W. McGladery and Wesley McKnight, "Temiskaming Press Association," proposed by Sir Mackenzie Bowell, responded to by W. A. Roebuck, New Liskeard, and H. S. Browning, "The Farms," proposed by Prof. A. W. Creelman, responded to by E. F. Stevenson, "The Forests," proposed by H. B. Donly and A. McKelvie, "The Mines," proposed by W. Bengough, and responded to by Mayor Laing, of Cobalt, and Mr. Young, of Haliburton.

The Junction Point. The train left New Liskeard at 2 a.m. Friday and arrived in Cobalt, the junction point of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railroad and the National Transcontinental. This place is bound to be a very prosperous railroad centre, the site of the station and a number of frame stores and houses are erected. Two banks are already located in the place. A year ago in April this part of the country was entirely unsettled. The pressmen were treated to a very patriotic speech when 175 children marched to the train, and on a rising lumber pile listened to addresses by J. A. McKay, of the Globe, Sir Mackenzie Bowell, and Mr. Tarte, of La Patrie. The schoolhouse was the first building erected in Cobalt, and by public subscription. The children answered a number of questions, and the train was put to them by Mr. McKay, and in honor of the occasion the Canadian Press Association will send a Canadian flag to hoist over the schoolhouse, and Mr. Tarte also promised to send them several presents.

The train was then taken in charge by the construction engine of Messrs. E. F. and G. F. McKay, who are large contractors of the G. T. Pacific, 35 miles from Cobalt, is the Mattagami River, which is a very wide and swift-running stream. Temporary bridges are erected over the streams, and at this point the construction gang is located. The party were dined by the officials under the tent. Mr. McKay, chief engineer, promptly at 3 o'clock, out respect to the late King, a short service was held in the camp. An address was given by Dr. J. A. Macdonald, manager of the Ontario and Northern Ontario Railroads, and Rev. B. Spencer, after which the hymn "Nearer, My God, to Thee" was sung.

A Run-Off. The party then took the train back to Cobalt, and remained there for a few moments, and then continued south. At Matheson a delay of some twelve hours was caused on account of an accident thirty miles further south by a run-off. Fortunately no one was seriously injured. The track had to be laid around the wreck to enable the press train to continue, after twelve hours delay. The train stopped at the experimental farm, where already a large acreage is under cultivation. They were shown over the place by the officers in charge. At Englehart the party were photographed in front of the beautiful green-house close to the station. At Temagami a photograph was also taken at the wharf. It was the intention to spend Saturday in a tour of the lakes at Temagami, but on account of the accident the train continued on to North Bay, arriving there at 7:30. After visiting several of the important places, a banquet was given the visitors by the citizens.

Bishop Scollard and others addressed the audience and the pressmen later at the Opera House. Mr. J. D. McDonald, district manager of the Grand Trunk; Superintendent Black, of the Temagami and Northern Ontario Railroad, and Mrs. J. S. Gorman, chief of the dining car department, were presented, respectively, with a silver service, a grandfather's clock, and a beautiful mantel clock, by the Press Association, for their kindness and interest shown throughout the trip. The trainmen on both roads received \$150 among them.

The newspapersmen arrived in To-

ronto at 7:30 Sunday morning, delighted with the outing. They are one of the most pleasant events in the history of the association.

Immense Publicity. One result of the trip will be the immense publicity that will be given to the country by the newspapersmen. There were many expressions of delight at the agricultural opportunities above New Liskeard, as far north as the train proceeded. The soil is known as the clay belt. The land is densely covered with spruce and poplar; it is easily cleared and New Liskeard vegetables of all descriptions were shown to the party that were grown last year. The wheat and produces a very large number of bushels to the acre, surpassing even Western Ontario in its production. The pine region does not seem to extend much beyond the height of land, but the spruce and poplar are invaluable for pulpwood, and will prove a valuable asset to Ontario. The climate in this northern district presents no obstacle to successful agricultural settlement. From information given the press it is an erroneous impression that the winters are severe, and the summers too short to enable crops to mature. The great area of water surface also assures the country against the protracted droughts.

Among the Londoners met on the trip were ex-Mayor Taylor, at New Liskeard, ex-Policeman Rowell, who is chief of police at North Bay, Nickle at Cochrane, son of Detective Nickle, who has a section of the Grand Trunk Pacific to build; Jos. Durkin, engineer on the T., and N. O. Railway, and many others.

Among the railroad officials who accompanied the party were: J. D. McDonald, D. P. A., of the Grand Trunk; Superintendent Black, of the T. and N. O.; Road Foreman Douglas, and Master Mechanic Allan, The T. and N. O. commissioners, D. Murphy and Fred Dane, and Secretary-Treasurer McKee, were with the party continuously. Mr. Geo. Ham, of the P. R., was also a member of the party.

It was a big undertaking for the railroads, and they succeeded in winning the goodwill of every newspapersman of the party for the future success of Northern Ontario.
