England, who is at present in the
city in connection with the Palestine
Exhibition. Miss Schor will wear a
costume that is similar to those worn
in the early days in the Holy Land.
A number of selections will be re-
ndered by the First Hussars Band and
Rev. Mr. Norwood will open the con-
cert with the Lord's Prayer, and will
superintend the program. Messrs. J.

MAY NOW COMPETE

IN MILITARY EVENTS

Hon. Adam Beck Is a Colonel,
But He Is Without a
Regiment as Yet.

Hon. Adam Beck is now an honorary
colonel, but up to the present time
he has not been attached to any reg-
iment in Canada. The Militia Depart-
ment has created a number of such
officers. Hon. Clifford Sifton, Sir
Thomas Shaughnessy and others are
among them. It will be noticed that
the majority of the men so honored
are expert horsemen with large strings
of the hunters and jumpers.

Owing to a regulation at the various
horse shows, the military events gen-
erally the most valuable on the card,
are not open to civilians. The ap-
pointment will enable the gentlemen
mentioned to compete in the military
events at the Olympic Show in Lon-
don, in New York, and various other
centres. This is a decided ad-
vantage to Hon. Adam Beck, as he
could have won a number of military
events with his string at the last half
dozen big shows.

Mr. Beck will have to be attached
to some regiment. It is understood
that one honorary colonel is all that
a single regiment can have, with the
result that Mr. Beck is barred from
such a position with the Seventh.
The First Hussars have Mr. T. S. Hobbs,
ex-M. P. P., as their honorary colonel.
Mr. A. E. Somerville has been recom-
mended to the position with the
Twenty-sixth Regiment. At the pres-
ent time it is rather hard to discover
just where Mr. Beck will be placed.

TECHNICAL HIGH SCHOOL NOT INCLUDED

This Is a Question Which Will
Come Up in Near Future,
Says Mr. Inkster.

The report of the special committee
of the board of education on school ac-
commodation, etc., did not take into account
the possibility of the erection of a tech-
nical high school. Rev. J. G. Inkster,
the chairman, stated that this did not
come within the purview of the com-
mittee.

"That is a question which will have
to be settled later," said Mr. Inkster.
"We could not dispose of it owing to the
fact that we had not sufficient data to
go by. It is a possibility within the
near future."

"The question of a technical high
school should be taken up when the
matter of a new collegiate is being dis-
cussed," said Inspector Edwards. "It is
certain to come before many years, and
we should take it into account when sit-
ting up the whole question of school
accommodation."

The report will create a debate at the
meeting of the board of education this
afternoon, but it is thought that it will
be laid aside for some time. The
trustees can discuss it to their heart's
content. The members have not
been asked to take any action on the
report, to form any opinion on the
question.

LONDON SENT SYMPATHY

Lieut.-Col. Hendrie, of Forty-Eighth
Highlanders, Sends Reply.

LONDON IS MOST WHOLESOME CITY

Medical Officer Reports That
Health of People Was
Never So Good.

MARKETHOUSE IMPROVED

Board of Health Find That It Is Now
Up to the Standard—A Meet-
ing on Tuesday.

London is in an enviable position
among other municipalities in the mat-
ter of health, according to a report
presented by Dr. T. V. Hutchinson, M.
O. H., at a session of the board of
health held at the city hall Tuesday
afternoon.

During the month of October but one
case of diphtheria developed, while
four other patients who were quaran-
tined as a matter of safety proved to
be suffering only from sore throat.
There are three cases of scarlet fever,
but these patients are now convales-
cing, and will be relieved of quaran-
tine within a few days.

London has not had a case of small-
pox in the last three years, a record
that few cities in Canada can point to.
Dr. Hutchinson, the medical officer
of health, is guarding carefully against
disease in all quarters.

The Market House.

The market, fire and light commit-
tee of the city council, under Ald. Ash-
plant, having proceeded with improve-
ments to the basement of the market
house, no further action will be taken
by the health board. Sanitary condi-
tions have been brought up to the re-
quired standard.

Dr. Hutchinson analyzed samples of
city water, which had been sent to him
because of discoloration. These he
found to be absolutely pure, the
reddish tinge being due to iron rust
from the mains.

The board passed up one sewer re-
commendation from the city council,
but sent two others back with a re-
quest for further particulars.

MR. HAYMAN WILL SELL HIS SITE TO THE CITY

But It Must Be For a City Hall
and He Will Sell to No
One Else.

The Eccles property may yet be
secured as a site for the city hall. In
conversation with Mr. John Hayman,
who recently purchased it, he informed
The Advertiser that he was willing to
do business with the council.

"I purchased the land for my own
uses," he stated. "No person except
the city of London can buy it. I am
willing, however, to exchange it for
the Spencer Block, provided the city
will permit me to erect a new building
on the site. The Spencer Block is not
the proper site, and I think the Eccles
property to be preferred. The best of
the lot, to my mind is at the corner
of Waterloo and Dundas, where plenty
of room could be secured at a reason-
able cost. I am willing to do business."

The city hall committee will meet
in a week or two, when this matter
will probably be discussed.

NIAGARA POWER RECEIPTS

Mr. Pocock Produces a Statement For
the Month of September.

Chairman Philip Pocock has issued
the statement of the finances of the
electrical department for the month of
September.

The receipts from all departments
for the month were \$10,331.12. This
is a large increase over the month of
September, 1911, when the sum of
\$3,955.10 was paid into the depart-
ment.

"Business is increasing rapidly,"
said Mr. Pocock.

MARKS WINDOWS

Police Looking for Youth Who Writes
on Store Fronts.

Some person with a perverse sense
of humor is responsible for unusual
activity along the window cleaners
on Richmond street, from Fullarton
street north to the C. P. R. depot, a
cake of soap having been used by the
culprit, who is being sought by the
police, in marking the plate glass
fronts of practically all of the stores
on the west side of the thoroughfare.

The windows have been marked for
several days, some streaked and
dabbled, but in other spots the funny
individual falls into verse and records
portions of popular songs. As a result
of his depredations merchants have
been compelled to wash their windows
daily.

young man, tall and slim, who through
a pair of rimless spectacles saw the
humor of his own conduct Monday
night about 9 o'clock.

BOARD OF EDUCATION WILL PAY SALARY

Trustees Decide to Continue
Assistance to Playgrounds
Movement.

MORE MONEY IS WANTED

City Council Will Be Asked to Issue
\$7,000 for the Industrial
School.

At the regular meeting of the board
of education, held on Tuesday after-
noon, the big problems now causing
the trustees some worry, namely,
those contained in the report of the
special committee on the city schools,
in which an expenditure of \$100,000
is recommended, and the suggestion
is made that single sessions of the
kindergarten be resumed, were not
discussed by the trustees. So much
time was taken up in matters of
minor importance that it was decided
to call a special meeting next week
to dispose of both questions.

A deputation from the Palestine
Exhibition appeared before the board,
and asked that the school children be
allowed to attend the exhibition on
Thursday, and the matter was refer-
red to Inspector Edwards and Trustee
Strong to arrange.

The Playgrounds Grant.

Another deputation from the Play-
grounds Association, headed by Mr.
George S. Gibbons and Mr. A. J.
Taylor, asked the board to continue
the grant of \$125 for some months.
When Mr. Schott resigned the grant
was withdrawn. Motion of Trustee
Dennis it was decided to pay the
amount to Mr. Schott's successor, Mr.
Taylor, until the end of the year. The
board had no power to go anything
further.

A communication was received from
the Playgrounds Association, protest-
ing against the statement of
Inspector W. W. Gammage, that the play-
grounds were causing a great deal of
trouble. The association thought
that Mr. Weir should retract the
statement or prove it. No commit-
tee will deal with the matter at its
next meeting.

School Debentures.

Trustees W. W. Gammage, A. M.
Hunt and John M. Gunn will intro-
duce the city council regarding the
issuing of \$7,000 debentures for the
Industrial School. It will be remem-
bered that when the estimates were
struck this amount was struck out of
the board of education figures, the
council agreeing to issue debentures.

However, City Solicitor Meredith
has discovered that the council can-
not issue debentures, and the board
of education must carry the amount
mentioned as an overdraft. Some of
the members of the board do not
look with favor on this, and the
deputation will endeavor to induce
the council to hand over the money
necessary to meet the expenditure.

Trustee Strong presented the report
of the special committee named
to inquire into the condition of
the schools, but on motion of Trustee
Inkster the matter was laid over for
a special meeting.

Single Sessions.

Trustee Strong also asked that his
motion to resume single sessions of
the kindergarten lay over for a spe-
cial meeting also. It was intimated
that the board would meet early next
week to dispose of this business.

Trustee Dennis presented an interim
report of the conditions of the com-
petition for plans of the proposed
Aberdeen School, and the board in-
structed No. 2 committee to call for
competitive plans at once.

"We want the best plans possible for
a school constructed," said Mr. Dennis.
"In this way I think we can secure
them. The competition will be lim-
ited to local architects."

The conditions are to be revised,
and will be
