FATALLY BURNED IN GASOLINE EXPLOSION

Berlin Woman Was Filling a Stove When Accident Happened.

BABY WAS SCORCHED

Its Clothes Caught Fire as Woman Ran Screaming Past It Out of the House.

Berlin, June 2.—An exploding gasoline stove fatally burned Mrs. Henry Reinhardt, and badly scorched her infant grand-daughter, Margaret Ferrier, at their home on Ahrens street, today.

The woman died at the hospital this afternoon. The child is expected to recover.

Mrs. Reinhardt was filling the tank of the gasoline stove, while it was burning, which resulted in the explosion. Almost instantaneously her clothing and hair was a mass of fire. Running from the house, she called for help and threw herself upon the grass in an effort to extinguish the flames. Neighbors who came to her assistance stripped the clothing from her body, which was then terribly burned. The child was seated in a chair near the stove, and while Mrs. Reinhardt was passing it upon leaving the room its clothing caught fire. The neighbors, after rendering assistance to the woman, found the child almost totally wrapped in flames. The interior of the house was slightly damaged. Mrs. Reinhardt, whose age was 48, leaves a husband, three sons and two daughters. The mother of the child, Mrs. Laura Ferrier, was at church when the accident occurred.

ROOSEVELT HOLDS A COUNCIL OF WAR

May Show Up Himself at Convention If He Feels Unfair Tactics.

Oyster Bay, N. J., June 2.—The Roosevelt line of battle for the Republican national convention was formed yesterday. At a "council of war" on the top of Sagamore Hill, which lasted most of the day, there was mapped out a campaign which, it is hoped, will result in the capture of the convention.

The first step is to be organization of the Roosevelt forces throughout the country. It is planned to send to Chicago a week or so in advance of the convention an executive committee from every state in which Roosevelt delegates have been elected, or in which there is a contest. By this method it is expected to mobilize and drill an organization which will act as a unit on every matter which comes before the convention.

As a part of this plan the Roosevelt delegates in every part of the country will be canvassed as to their views on the temporary chairman, ship, that a harmonious agreement may be reached. Although Col. Roosevelt had decided to oppose the selection of Senator Root, and had asked Governor Hadley, of Missouri, to be his candidate for the place, he indicated today that he would waive his objections if it seemed wiser to his supporters to reserve their fire for the more important contests.

May Be There.

Whether Col. Roosevelt will go to Chicago to lead the fight in person is now an open question. The colonel is virtually served notice on his opponents that under certain circumstances he might go. He said he did not intend to go "unless some grave emergency in the shape of unfair play should arise."

"If there is unfair play I may show up," he said to Robert McCormick, of Chicago, one of his visitors today.

Two other points were agreed upon. Every effort is to be made to have the hearings before the national committee to settle contests for seats held publicly. And the Roosevelt supporters will fight to obtain what they deem an equitable distribution of tickets to the convention. Col. Roosevelt said he had been told that some of his delegates felt that the action of the national committee "inspired a deliberate purpose to use 10,000 or 12,000 tickets to stuff the gallery with shouters who will try, by clamor, to overawe the convention."

BLAME NOW PLACED ON NAVAL AUTHORITIES

British Scientific Journal Says the Lack of Searchlights Doomed Titanic.

New York, June 2.—A London cable says: The scientific journal Nature calls attention to the fact that the non-use of searchlights by merchant ships is due to the action of the British admiralty.

The great value of searchlights for navigation was reported to the lords' commissioners of the admiralty by Admiral Sir Beauchamp Seymour in 1876. Dr. Henry White, F. R. S., had previously submitted certain inventions to the admiralty, and a number of battleships were equipped with searchlights. When attempts were made later to establish searchlights on merchant ships, the admiralty intervened and claimed the exclusive right to the use of searchlights on the alleged ground that their brilliancy interfered with the navigation of none of the Atlantic liners are equipped with searchlights.

In a paper read before the Literary and Philosophical Society, Dr. White said, referring to the loss of the Titanic: "It was repeatedly stated in evidence that at the time of the collision, and for some hours afterwards, the atmosphere was perfectly clear, so much so, that the stars were seen brightly on the horizon. If, therefore, the Titanic had been equipped with an efficient searchlight, the iceberg would have shown up in reflection at a distance of several miles (visible to all persons on deck), minutes later."

CADETS ABROAD.

London, June 2.—The Canadian Cadets left here Friday evening to encamp on Waterloo battlefield. A cablegram announcing this has been dispatched to the Adjutant-General at Ottawa. Rex C. Merrick, of Toronto, won the Strathcona Cup and gold medal. In the grand aggregate Merrick was also third, and wins a bronze medal. Fox was fourth, Huggins ninth, Heakes fifteenth, Matthews thirty-fourth.

KINGSTON BANK MAN CANNOT BE FOUND

Teller in Merchants Bank Has Been Missing Since Thursday.

Kingston, June 2.—The authorities of the Merchants' Bank are concerned over the absence of Harold G. Arthur, teller. He worked on Thursday, but his desk was vacant on Friday. Inquiries at his boarding-house resulted in the knowledge that he had not been stopping in his room since Saturday last. Arthur had told his landlady that he had been transferred to Edmonton, and that he was first going to Montreal to visit his parents. Manager Hague said the young man was a good worker, and that his cash is all right. He was last seen on the streets at 10 p.m. Thursday.
