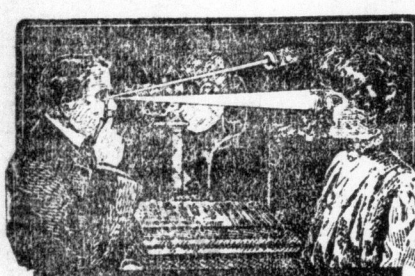

RELIEF FUND WILL BE AVAILABLE FOR ALL THOSE IN NEED

Will Not Be Limited to Dependents of Volunteers.

\$30 FOR SOLDIERS' WIVES

That Amount To Be Paid Monthly, With Additional Sum for Children.

At a joint meeting on Saturday of the relief committee of the London and Middlesex war relief association and the trustees of the fund which has been raised, a final decision was reached to apply the war fund to the relief of general distress arising out of unemployment as a result of the war, as well as among actual dependents of men who have gone to the front. Opinion was divided to some extent as to the wisdom or otherwise of this course, but the wider policy was generally favored.

The fund will be dispensed on what is known as the Connaught scale in the case of soldiers' dependents. This provides for the payment of \$30 per month for the wife of a soldier on full service and an additional amount for each child, varying according to the ages of the children.

Approved Scale.
This is the scale approved by the trustees of the general Canadian relief fund trustees and the one they recommend for adoption throughout the country.

Where a man assigns a part or the whole of his pay to his wife, the amount so assigned, as well as any pension money paid by the Government will be deducted from the amount paid out of the patriotic fund.

In the case of persons not dependents of soldiers, but who are in distress as a result of the war, special provision will have to be made.
Up to the present no payments have been made out of the fund, but several applications for relief have been received and are being investigated. In the meantime interim relief has been given by the city where investigation showed it to be necessary. These cases now are turned over to the patriotic association.

Separate Collection List.
Various municipalities throughout the county of Middlesex are preparing separate collection lists and these will be turned over to the general fund as soon as possible. Lambeth has signified its intention of raising \$300, if possible, and a meeting has been called at Glencoe for the purpose of raising a fund there.

The amount collected by the Boy Scouts yesterday has not been definitely ascertained up to the present, but it was in the neighborhood of \$70. Other contributions from individuals who were not reached by the team workers are coming in all the time, and the fund is expected confidently to reach \$150,000 eventually.

Open Relief Office.
The newly-organized London and Middlesex patriotic association also met on Saturday under the chairmanship of Colonel Gartshore and formally adopted the constitution as drafted by Sir George Gibbons and a committee. William Spencer announced that an office had been opened over the Huron and Erie Loan Building for the purpose of receiving applications for relief.

RESERVE INCREASED.

(Canadian Press.)
NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—The statement of the average condition of clearing house, banks and trust companies for the week shows that the cash reserve increased \$2,064,300, leaving a deficit of \$35,065,000 below legal requirements.

RUSSIAN BRUTALLY ATTACKED

Nelson Street Man Seriously Injured by Three Assaults.

Ivan Palovski, a Russian, residing on Nelson street, was the victim of a brutal assault Saturday night at the corner of Simcoe and Waterloo streets when, it is alleged, he was attacked and beaten by three other Russians.

Palovski was proceeding eastward on Simcoe street when met by his three assailants who, without warning, it is said, attacked him, inflicting three deep gashes in his head. Neighbors, hearing his cries for help, rushed to his assistance, but were too late to effect a capture, the three assailants having made a hurried departure. Palovski walked to Victoria Hospital, where his wounds were dressed, several stitches being required to close them. The victim is aware of his assailants' identity, and police court proceedings will likely follow, it is claimed.

"In this time of stress of nations and danger to our Empire, this executive committee of the diocese of Huron, believing that the cause of Britain is just and that with the cause of Britain is bound up the future of democracy and Christian civilization, hereby expresses its conviction that it is the duty of all the members of the church to uphold the cause of Britain to their utmost power by the offering of themselves and their means to her service, indorses the steps already taken by the Government and people of this Dominion towards that end, and urges all to pray earnestly that God may soon give us a righteous and abiding peace.

PROF. SAUNDERS DIES AT HOME IN THIS CITY

Was Director of Dominion Experimental Farms for Quarter of Century.

WAS FAMOUS CEREALIST

Originated Marquis Wheat, Worth \$2,500,000 to the Canadian Northwest.

ACCORDED HIGH HONORS

Father of Sons Distinguished in Field of Science and Education.

Dr. William Saunders, C. M. G., F. R. S. C., F. L. S., for a quarter of a century director of the Dominion experimental farms, and originator of Marquis wheat, estimated to have increased the value of Northwest lands by \$2,500,000, died yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock at his home, 355 Dufferin avenue, to which he had been confined by illness since August, 1913.

Dr. Saunders went to Europe in 1911, hoping to improve his failing health, but returned but little benefited in 1912 to this city, after an absence of 26 years. He was born in Crediton, Devonshire, England, in 1826.

Came to London in 1848.

When he was 12 years of age, his parents, with a family of nine other children, the sole survivor of which is now Mrs. Wylliam Saunders of this city, came to Canada, settling in London, after making a trip from Hamilton by stage over the old corduroy road. At 19 years of age he entered business for himself.

In 1855 he had begun his scientific career. When he was apprenticed to Dr. Salter, a pioneer chemist of the city, in 1857 he became interested in entomology. A few years later he took up the study of botany. In 1862, with Rev. Dr. Bethune, then of Port Hope, and now of Guelph, Dr. Saunders founded the Entomological Society of Ontario, of which a few years ago was removed to Guelph, and which this year celebrated its semi-centennial anniversary. From botany Dr. Saunders became interested in horticulture and agriculture, and in 1869 purchased his first farm on Dundas street, east of the Hospital for the Insane, where he devoted chiefly to experimental purposes. In 1873 he relinquished a smaller property near Mount Pleasant Cemetery, which he used entirely for horticultural and agricultural experiments.

Internationally Famous.
By his accomplishments in the science of horticulture, botany and entomology, Dr. Saunders had received recognition abroad as well as at home, by his appointment as Fellow of the Linnean Society of London, England; corresponding member of the Royal Botanical Society of London; Fellow of the Entomological Society of London; a director of the Fruit Growers' Association of Ontario, and an honorary member of the Highland and Agricultural Society of Scotland. In addition, he was the recipient of many other honors and distinctions. In 1905, by the pleasure of the late King Edward VII, he was appointed to be a Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George.

For two years following his appointment as director of experimental farms in 1886, Dr. Saunders made a careful study of experimental farms in other countries. He was intrusted with the selection of officers and the location of branch farms at Nanpan, N. S., Brandon, Man., Indian Head, Sask., and Agassiz, B. C.

Founded Drug Company.

Previously Dr. Saunders had founded the large wholesale drug company, which is now conducted by his son, Percy Commissioner, and ex-Minister of Agriculture, W. E. Saunders, under the firm name of W. E. Saunders & Co.

For several years he was president of

the American Pharmaceutical Association, and before going to Ottawa was successively for a number of years director and president of the Huron and Erie Loan and Savings Company.

Four Sons Are Scientists.

Dr. Saunders was married in 1857 to Miss Sarah Robinson, daughter of Rev. J. H. Robinson, who was stationed in London for many years. Besides his wife, Dr. Saunders is survived by one daughter, Miss Annie, at home; and five sons, W. E. of this city; Henry S., a leading Toronto musician; Dr. Charles E., cerealist at the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa; Dr. A. Percy, professor of chemistry and dean of Hamilton College, Clinton, N. Y.; and Dr. Fred A., professor of physics at Vassar College, Poughkeepsie, N. Y.

Marquis wheat, which is one of the greatest achievements of the late Dr. Saunders, ripens a week to ten days earlier than Red Fife, and has won first prizes at great international exhibitions at New York, Lethbridge and in Oklahoma. In the first instance,

Seager Wheeler, of Rosthern, Sask., was awarded a prize of \$1,000 offered by Sir Thomas Shaughnessy for the finest bushel of wheat exhibited, receiving back the exact amount which he had paid to the C. P. R. company for his farm a short time previously. Dr. Saunders also originated the Pyrus Bassata, a hardy variety of apple, the first capable of withstanding the severe climate of the Northwest.

The funeral will be held Tuesday to Mount Pleasant Cemetery. Dr. Charles R. Flanders, of the First Methodist Church, will conduct the services.

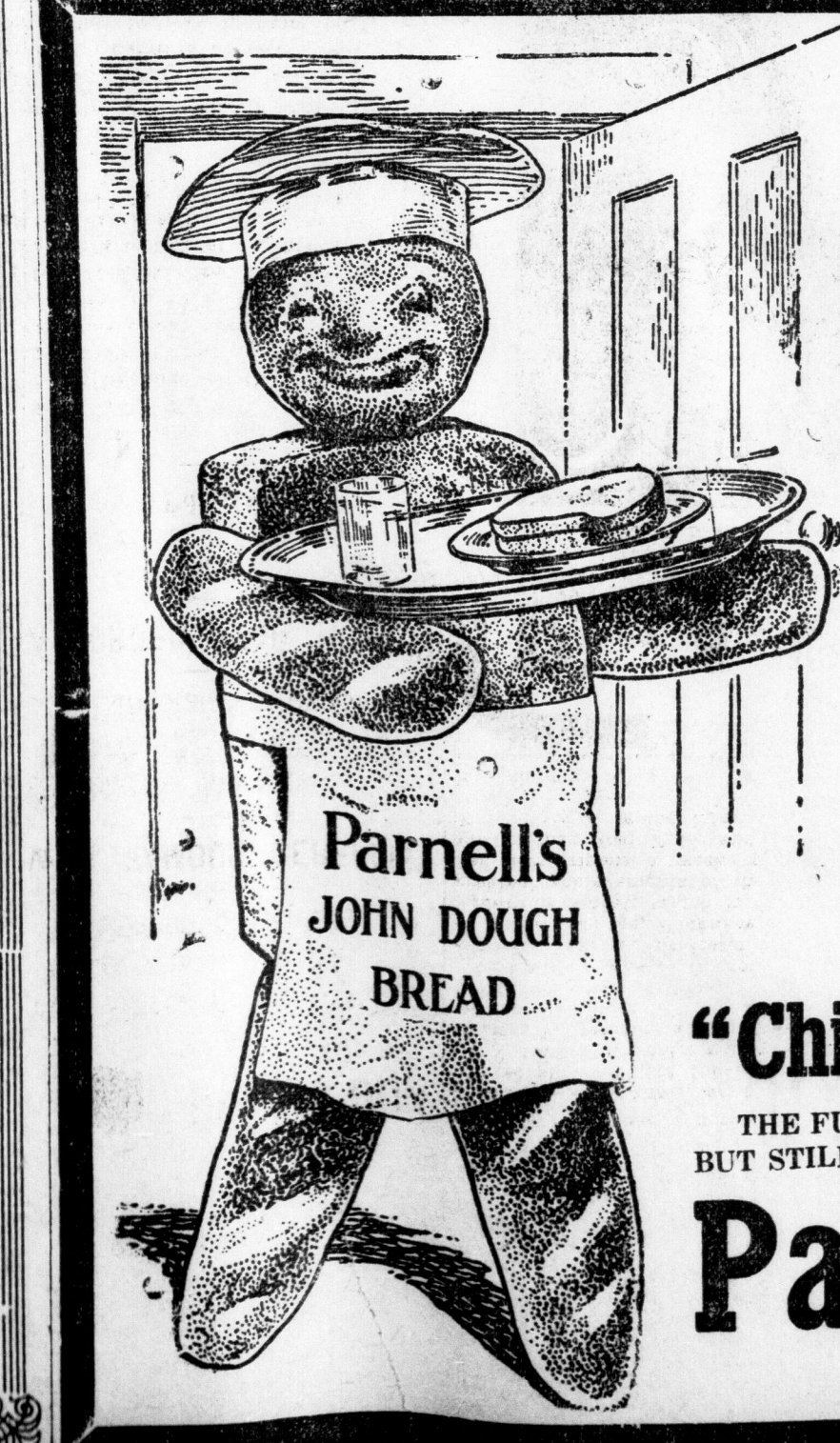
