# HOLLAND SENDS

If Dutch Ship Is Sunk, the Kaiser's Land Will Be Responsible.

THE HAGUE (via London), Feb. 19. -1:45 a.m.—An official statement issued by the Netherlands Government gives contents of the note of protest sent to Germany on that Government's establishment of its sea war zone.

The note declares that the Netherattitude to both Great Britain and Gernany and protests against Germany declaring as a theatre of war such an enormous stretch of water which peaceful neutral vessels may not safely enter or cross. It adds that the sinking of erchantmen on suspicion without arrest or search, would contravene in-ternational law, and that if a Dutch ship were thus sunk the Netherlands would hold Germany responsible.

The Government of the Netherlands as refused a request for war vessels Dutch merchant ships through the marine areas prescribed by Germany, on the ground that such action would enhance the risks of ships without such escorts.
