

MOVES REWARD
OR FINDING STILLS

General Williams Stops Order
Giving Personal or Private
Remuneration.

LONDON, Aug. 24.—"Still fishing" the special remuneration provided in the inland revenue act as a reward for the discovery of stills, has been eliminated by a provincial police force active in the inland revenue act.

While the superintendent of provincial police, General Williams, is endeavoring to imbue his men with "go get 'em" spirit in relation to stills, he has issued an order that removes the incentive of personal or private reward for so doing.

Under the inland revenue act the informer in a still seizure case is entitled to half the fine of \$500, and before the general's regime a percentage of provincial police officers specially favored with "still" crops reaped a considerable harvest in assisting the Dominion authorities in their discovery.

According to the general's information one of two men assisted in locating thirty or forty stills a year, which, by simple process of multiplication reveals a side line income of between \$7,500 and \$10,000 a year.

According to the new plan set out by the general, the proceeds of the inland revenue act special reward for still seizures must be funded with the department as a nucleus of a special police benefit fund from which will be met cases of unusual hardship arising out of illness, etc., among provincial police officers. In this will take a prominent part.

FORMER WALLACEBURG
BANKER GETS 3 YEARS

WALLACEBURG, Aug. 24.—Donald Nado, formerly manager of the Bank of Montreal, Tupperville, and also previously accountant at the Merchants Bank at Wallaceburg, who was yesterday convicted for having misappropriated \$3,370.75, and sentenced to three years in Kingston Penitentiary, was a member of the G. GIVE MILLION
TO FIND CURES

U. S. Congressmen Would
Offer Big Reward For
Discoveries.

Specifies That Treatments
Must Destroy Germ of
Diseases.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—Lure of a million dollar reward is held out in a bill introduced in the house to physicians and scientists of the world who discover and give to humanity specific cures for half a dozen prevalent diseases which have baffled doctors and surgeons since the advent of medical science.

The author of the bill is Representative Elliott W. Sproul of Chicago.

Under the terms of the measure \$1,000,000 would be paid in 10 annual instalments to any one who finds a successful cure for tuberculosis, cancer, pneumonia, paralysis, epilepsy, or dementia praecox (mental disease).

Systems of treatment, such as open air and diet for tuberculosis patients, would not be considered, Mr. Sproul said. The cure must be specific, such as a serum, or something that definitely kills the germ of particular disease or will restore the impaired organs to normality.

A board composed of the surgeons general of the United States army, navy and public health service is provided in the bill to pass upon all cures alleged to be discovered. Payments of rewards would be made only upon certificates from the board that the genuineness of the cure has been demonstrated.

Representative Sproul's idea is that the offering of a million dollar reward would lure the world's most famous scientists in an intensive battle with the greatest enemies of the human race.

FIGHTS TO RETAIN
GYPSUM PROPERTY

Stanley MacNeil, War Veteran,
in Ottawa Investigating
Further Complications.

OTTAWA, Aug. 24.—Although D. Stanley MacNeil, Sydney, N.S., war veteran, is now in actual possession of the \$1,750,000 gypsum property at Island Point, Cape Breton, for which he has fought a continuous legal battle since returning from overseas, there may yet be further attempts to disprove his title.

In May, 1921, the Nova Scotia Legislature passed a bill vesting the property in the title of Jane E. MacNeil, the sister, who afterwards deeded it to Stanley MacNeil. He now believes that efforts are being made to have the federal government quash the legislation and is in Ottawa where the Dominion Command, G. W. V. A., is investigating this further complication.

The property was originally purchased by elder members of the MacNeil family as a farm home for the younger children, the title to go to Stanley MacNeil when he became of age.

At that time the value of the gypsum deposits were not known. An elder brother was a member of a Montreal contracting firm which subsequently went into the hands of the receiver, and efforts were made to prove that the gypsum property had been purchased with funds of the firm and was, therefore, an asset of the company.

The first action failed, but succeeded upon appeal. The matter was brought to the attention of the Alberta Command, G. W. V. A., upon the return of Stanley MacNeil from overseas, and, after investigation, belief in his claim was expressed. The Dominion Command and the Nova Scotia Command subsequently investigated and assisted Stanley MacNeil in his fight until the property was finally transferred to him.

CHINAMAN DIES IN
ENGLEHART FIRE

Rushes To Death Into Burning
Laundry On Unknown
Mission.

ENGLEHART, Aug. 24.—George Tam, a Chinaman, is dead and a loss running into five figures was sustained here this morning as a consequence of a fire of unknown origin which broke out in the rear of the Tam laundry shop.

Four buildings were destroyed, among them being the McPherson bakery and two private dwellings, in addition to the laundry.

Tam made his escape in company with other occupants of the doomed buildings, but was seen to dash wildly back into the burning struc-

ture, while his charred remains, recovered later in the day, tell a mute tale of the failure of his unknown mission.

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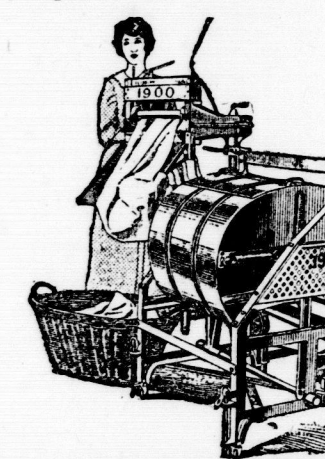
