Rev. Wm. Beattie Believes Ideas of Organization Repugnant To Canadians.

#### MOTIVES SINISTER

Preacher Feels Ashamed Protestantism Should Have Such Champions.

"We would be doing less than justice to Hignett if we did not believe his statements in which he claims that the Klan is not a bloodthirsty organization," said Rev. William Beattie, speaking last night in the First Presbyterian Church in a three-minute sermonette on "Hooded Barbarities and the Mayor's Letter on the Ku Klux Klan."

Voicing General Opinion.

Nevertheless, I believe I am voicing the general opinion of this country when I say that the whole idea of the Klan is repugnant. There are two features of the Klan as I see it that are especially offensive to us as Canadians: 'their secrecy and their methods. We have, of course, other secret societies over here such as the Masonic bodies, and so on, but we have no society in which this secrecy is so rigidly enforced that even the wife of the member is not alowed to know of his membership. Then as to their methods, all these midnight parades, hooded and shrouded. If their aims are all they claim to be, why all this attempt at terrorism? It is impossible to believe that these methods to not cover some more sinister motive than they have given us to understand. "I think The Advertiser in their interview with this man Hignett was very right in saying that the actions the Klan seemed to belie the theor-

ies expressed by him. "For instance, they claim that they are anti-nothing, yet they are constitutionally opposed to the Negro, the Jew and the Roman Catholic.
"And in regard to this last claim I feel thoroughly ashamed," said Dr. Beattie, "that Protestantism should have such champions as these and have such champions as these, and would assure them that in this country at least, the methods of the Clan are not our attitude to them. "This idea that the government of

country can be controlled by direct action, for that is what the methods of the Klan represent, Higthe nett himself stating that 'We issue a warning, and if that is not heeded, then we draw the sword,' or words to that effect, is a principle entirely contrary to every thought and intention of British democracy. We want none of it, no matter who the organizer may be. Robbed It of Sting.

"As to the mayor's letter on the subject, the statement of Hignett that the Kian has no intention of coming to Canada rather robbed it of its sting. Just the same," went on Dr. Beattie, "if the Kian should think of coming here I am sure they would find a strong opposition that would represent one hundred per cent of the population.
"They say they are not coming into this country?" he asked. "Perhaps not, but I can assure you of one thing, this man Hignett has been followed to London by another officer of the Ku Klux Klux who is in the city today."


