

O.T.A. DEFEAT WOULD OPEN IMPORTATION FLOOD GATES

Hon. Newton Rowell Declares Ontario Would Lose Federal Protection.

SUFFER LIKE B. C.

Speaks at Mass Meeting—Harold Barnum, K.C., Also Defends Prohibition.

A keen analysis of the liquor situation in Ontario and an appeal for the continuance of the Ontario temperance act, was presented by Hon. Newton W. Rowell, K.C., noted barrister and parliamentarian, and Harold Barnum, K.C., of Aylmer, to 1,500 people at a mass meeting in the Capitol theatre yesterday afternoon. Mr. Rowell dealt exhaustively with his subject, forming conclusions only after giving arguments of both the wet and dry. With all its imperfections he termed the Ontario temperance act, the most progressive piece of legislation ever enacted by a government, "an infinite credit to both Liberals and Conservatives that the act was put on the provincial statute books."

Mr. Barnum outlined some of his experiences in Ontario to uphold the O.T.A. and to the discredit of former liquor legislation.

Both speakers created much enthusiasm. Not Party Issue. "The question to be decided next Thursday is not a party issue," Mr. Rowell stated. "Unfortunately no political considerations are involved in its decision. The Ontario temperance act was introduced and passed through the legislature by a conservative administration and received the hearty support of the Liberals in the house. It represents the political action of both parties and the results do great credit to both."

"If the existing law, admittedly not perfect, as a whole does produce public good, then, as sane, sober, intelligent citizens, all desiring public good, we should support the law."

"If the methods of government control would reduce the evils of liquor traffic more than they are now reduced, then it would be our duty to support it."

"What reasons are given by those who oppose the present legislation for reversing our present policy and introducing a new one? The first is that the present act is not, and cannot be, enforced."

"It is gratifying to know that we have the pledge of the prime minister that if the act is sustained it will be strengthened and strictly and vigorously enforced. With this assurance no one should have any hesitation in giving whole-hearted support to the present law."

"The action of the legislature in 1916 in passing the O.T.A. was sustained by an overwhelming majority of the electors when the question was submitted to them in 1919. In 1921, part four of the Canada temperance act, prohibiting importation, was brought into operation by the vote of the electors of Ontario. The Ontario temperance act, coupled with the prohibition of importation contained in part four of the Canada temperance act, represents, therefore, not only the political action of both parties, but the judgment of the electors of Ontario. This was not the result of a spasm of enthusiasm. Were the people of Ontario wrong in their conclusion they reached? Has it been a failure?"

"In my opinion, if you vote for government control you place Ontario, in respect of all intoxicating liquors which may be lawfully sold in the same position as British Columbia, where the bootlegger thrives and where his activities have so bedeviled conditions that the government of British Columbia made an urgent appeal to the federal government to prohibit importation into the province, save to government stores or dispensaries. The parliament of Canada refused this legislation. After the experience of British Columbia, I have no doubt that the consequences if we vote for government control, for all practical purposes, is that we have created a British Columbia, so far as importations and bootlegging is concerned."

"I was a member of the Ontario legislature when the Ontario temperance act was passed. I was a member of the dominion parliament and of the government of Canada when part IV of the Canada temperance act prohibiting importation was enacted, and during the past two years I have been engaged as the counsel in a case in which the interpretation of these two acts has been up for consideration and decision. I have therefore had certain had ample opportunity to form an opinion of the character and scope of these acts."

"It has been suggested that even though there were government sale of both spirituous and malt liquors under government control, part four of the Canada temperance act would continue to apply. Once you permit government control you remove the barrier placed by the federal government against importation. Are the people of Ontario ready to magnify the bootleggers' opportunity for debauching the people of this province? In that case you would make Ontario the rendezvous and headquarters for gangs of American bootleggers who, for the sake of gain, are plotting against the Canadian temperance act and the very constitution of the United States."

Mr. Rowell then outlined what the Ontario temperance act has done for good in the province.

"Accomplishes Much. "We should support the present law because of what it has accomplished. It has diminished drunkenness, and, although you do not need statistics to actually prove this, I will quote the official government returns for convictions for drunkenness for the past ten years."

Great applause greeted Mr. Rowell as he quoted figures showing a remarkable decrease in drunkenness in the province each year during the enactment of the O.T.A.

"The Ontario temperance act has immensely diminished crime," Mr. Rowell continued. "It has helped the home. It has helped the school, far beyond what its most earnest advocates ever thought possible."

Mr. Rowell then quoted school statistics for the city of Toronto. In the secondary schools of Toronto where the average attendance in 1914 per thousand was only 17, in 1923 the average attendance was 43. These remarkable figures, Mr. Rowell

stated, were directly due to the O.T.A., according to one of the leading school authorities in the provincial capital.

Helps the Schools. "The adolescent school act," Mr. Rowell said, "has no doubt affected the increased attendance, but in 1921 the average attendance per one thousand children went up to 37, and that was before the adolescent act came into force."

"Fathers who once spent their money on liquor, now spend it on their homes and families. They are able to give their boys and girls a better chance in life. Are you going to vote on Thursday to take away their chance in life? I do not believe, same, sober, public-thinking people of this province will do so."

"It is not ambition in this province to have a sober, intelligent, healthy and industrious citizenship; to develop and maintain the highest standards of domestic virtue, intellectual culture and social well-being; to give the children of this province the best chance for the future? Are we going to do this by restoring the sale of intoxicating liquor for beverage purposes? Let Ontario lead the dominion, as she has in the past, along the paths of temperance and sobriety."

Harold Barnum Speaks. Harold Barnum, K.C., of Aylmer, was received with much applause. He discussed the arguments advanced by the moderation league members for government control, and in each case convincingly refuted their statements.

"We must avoid thinking that all those who are opposed to the question of the Ontario temperance act are insincere or hypocritical," Mr. Barnum stated. "But, while there is a sincere, honest, upright people on the other side, they do not constitute the majority, and they are not always sincere and honest."

Our opponents state that the O.T.A. is not being properly enforced and that the authorities are falling down on their jobs. A law can always be enforced if it is attacked with sufficient energy."

"Let us discuss the imitation ballots which our friend the enemy, the Moderation League (hereby used to call themselves the Liberal League), have had printed and distributed about. These imitation ballots bear the words 'which, bootleg control or government control.' I would say that the question to be answered next Thursday is not government control. It is government sale from government shops."

Need Strong Men. "It might be possible that a system of government sale might work out, providing good, strong, capable men are in governmental positions. But there comes a time to all governments when they are not strong enough to get in a rut. They can't adjust themselves to a change in conditions."

The more critical break away from the party line follows this more hidebound. They are human beings like you and I. They like their positions, and they reach a state of mind where they will keep the positions. There are wets in every party, on both sides of the fence. Some would want to ease up on the enforcement of the liquor legislation."

"In a condition like that it would not be government control of liquor, but liquor control of government."

"Our opponents say the act is no good. They will say they can get out in the streets and have a bottle of liquor in their possession within three minutes. Then what is wrong with the act so far as they are concerned? No, their arguments are not always logical or sincere."

"Members of the Moderation League mention that there is a great deal of drinking among the younger people since the Ontario temperance act has come into effect. Was there no liquor drinking among the young in the old days? And I see no reason why they should not get liquor as much under government control."

"Young people are drinking now because there are too many women who will serve to them raspberry wine, native wine, or that particular abominable, dandelion wine. Mothers will give their children these beverages, and I believe that is one reason young people are drinking if they are drinking. If, as the moderationists state, the young people are drinking bootleg liquor, they are doing so because they can get nothing else. When a person charges that the O.T.A. has introduced bootlegging, they admit the efficiency of the act."

Sees Dry World. Mr. Barnum predicted a dry world in the very near future. He pointed little while, making a temporary detour for government control they are asking the people to submit to a system of liquor shops—a system the people were successful in minimizing fifty years ago. He stated that the worst the anti-temperance crowd could do on Thursday was to set back the clock for a day that when the moderationists lay in a march towards ultimate prohibition."

"Ladies and gentlemen, the world is going dry," Mr. Barnum declared amid great applause from the crowd.

At this point several in the audience rose to heckle, and before Mr. Barnum could answer their questions, they were seated when the crowd yelled to "sit down."

"The man who is working for the free sale of liquor is living in a world that has been created by the O.T.A. But we are not living in that age today. Scientists say liquor in moderation reduces efficiency to some extent, and in large quantities is absolutely fatal. The man of the future who is not in the best physical condition will only be a hanger on. In spite of anything that is said I say the world is going dry."

Liquor vs. Gasoline. "There are 15,000,000 reasons why the country is going dry. Fourteen million of them are in the United States and the other one is in Canada. They are automobiles. The automobile itself should make a dry world necessary."

"The whole question boils down to this, has the O.T.A. helped anybody? You have a right to vote against the O.T.A. by reason of conviction, but not by your own personal feelings. It is to help out others that so many of us have taken up the cause. I am going to vote dry."

BISHOP CONDUCTS SPECIAL SERVICES

Preaches to Large Audiences in Two of Sarnia Churches.

NO RESENTMENT

Special to The Advertiser. Sarnia, Oct. 19.—Bishop Michael Fallon today conducted special services in the Roman Catholic churches here in reparation and atonement for the sacrilege committed on August 13 last, when unknown persons removed sacred hosts from St. Joseph's church.

Pontifical high mass was celebrated in Our Lady of Mercy church in the morning, with pontifical benediction there in the evening, and a special service in St. Joseph's church in the afternoon. In all his addresses Bishop Fallon made repeated reference to the removal of sacred hosts and the sacrilege thus committed.

In regard to the trial of Garner Bros., United States evangelists who were alleged to have committed the deed and who were found not guilty by the court, Bishop Fallon said: "I have been given to understand that the crown attorney at the trial made a statement to the effect that the Roman Catholic church buys souls out of purgatory. I congratulate a clever, honest, upright person atorney with such gross ignorance of the Roman Catholic church as to make a statement of that nature in the trial of these men."

Bishop Fallon declared that he held no resentment against the perpetrators of the deed, but that non-Catholics should have resented the action, and that Roman Catholics have only pain and sorrow because of the insult offered when unclean hands were laid on the body of Christ as represented by the sacred hosts.

"Had they been found guilty no reparation services would have been demanded," he declared. "Roman Catholics demand the right to practice their religion in freedom. Throughout history no Roman Catholic has been found guilty of sacrilege against other Christian doctrines."

At the evening service the text was "Jesus taking bread and blessing and said: 'This is my body, take and eat.' This service was closed with the declaration that the reparation services were demanded when they seemed sufficient to obliterate the insult to the church."

Clergy of nine Western Ontario counties were invited to Sarnia to attend the services and join in an expression of faith in the real presence of the blessed sacrament. The entire trend of the addresses of his lordship was the Roman Catholic doctrine and that the real presence of Christ existed in the sacrament.

Rev. L. Foristral of London was high priest; Rev. Father Brennan and Rev. P. Mahoney of London, honorary priests; Rev. Father McCarthy of Sarnia, deacon of mass; Rev. Father Power, sub-deacon, and masters of ceremonies were Messrs. Borden and Morrison. Rev. Father Drisen of London assisted the choir.

The attendance at all services was large, and many were unable to gain admittance to the church. Members of the Holy Name society lined up on each side of the walk from the house to the church.

INDIANS RETURNING TO OLD CUSTOMS

Claim Movement Started To Bring Tribes Back To Ancient Rites.

Canadian Press Despatch. Montreal, Oct. 19.—That the Indians were returning to their ancient rites and customs, and were "throwing off their artificialities which the white men have constantly endeavored to impose upon us," was stated here in an interview today by Chief Dominic Two Axe, of the Indian tribes in Montreal district.

The nationalistic tendencies among my people are becoming more and more manifest," he said. His own last baby was not baptized by a white man's ceremony, but was initiated by Two Axe into the Iroquois religion. More unbaptized babies would be taken into the Iroquois faith during the next seasonal prayer-dance ceremonies, which will be held from January 5 to January 11.

The Indians of the Caughnawaga reserve, near here, the chief explained, had some of the old customs of observing, four times a year—in spring, summer, autumn and mid-winter—ceremonies, during which prayer was offered to the "Great Spirit," accompanied by tribal dancing.

The Indians' traditions had been handed down from mother to babe even to the present day, said Two Axe, and a big movement was on foot all over America to bring all the tribes back to the old customs and ceremonies. He explained that the Iroquois of America had selected Tonawanda, N.Y., as their capital, and that their first parliament assembled there about a week ago. The first aim of this council was to press the Iroquois claims against the United States government for money they assert amount to several millions of dollars.

STRONG APPEAL MADE AT TEMPERANCE RALLY

Mass Meeting in Theatre at Woodstock Is Largely Attended.

Woodstock, Oct. 19.—A day of special appeals is being held on behalf of the Ontario temperance act was brought to a culmination this evening when a huge temperance rally was held in the Griffin theatre. The theatre, which accommodates about 1,300 people, was well filled, and a strong appeal was made by John A. Barry, K.C., of Toronto, who presented an imposing array of facts and figures in support of his arguments that the Ontario temperance act should be maintained in its entirety. Rev. Mr. Gibson of Knox church, while supporting the O.T.A., took the stand that the question was one on which there were no grounds for difference of opinion, and that it was left to the conscience of each individual to decide which way to vote.

APPEAL FOR RETRIAL IN DAMAGE ACTIONS

Cases Recently Dismissed in Woodstock Court May Be Reopened.

SEVENTY INJURED

Buffalo, Oct. 19.—Two are dead, four more probably will die, 75 injured are in hospitals and private homes and an undetermined number of passengers are suffering from slight bruises as the result of a rear end collision of two three-car International Railway electric trains on the Niagara Falls-Buffalo high speed line at Elliott Creek in Tonawanda at 1:15 o'clock this afternoon.
