SUN YAT SEN DIES AFTER LONG FIGHT

Operation Fails To Save Life
of South China
Leader.

Associated Press Despatch.
Peking, March 12.—Sun Yat Sen,
the South China leader, died this
(Thursday) morning.

Surgeons who operated on him at
the Rockefeller hospital here Janu-
ary 26, declared his case was hope-
less, and gave him only ten days to
live. The aged Chinese clung to life,
however, the ten days passing, leav-
ing him weaker, but still alive.

On February 18, against the advice
of the hospital authorities, Dr. Sun
was removed by friends and political
associates to the headquarters of the
Kuomintang (People's Party) to the
former residence of Wellington Koo,
former foreign minister. It was there
that he died.

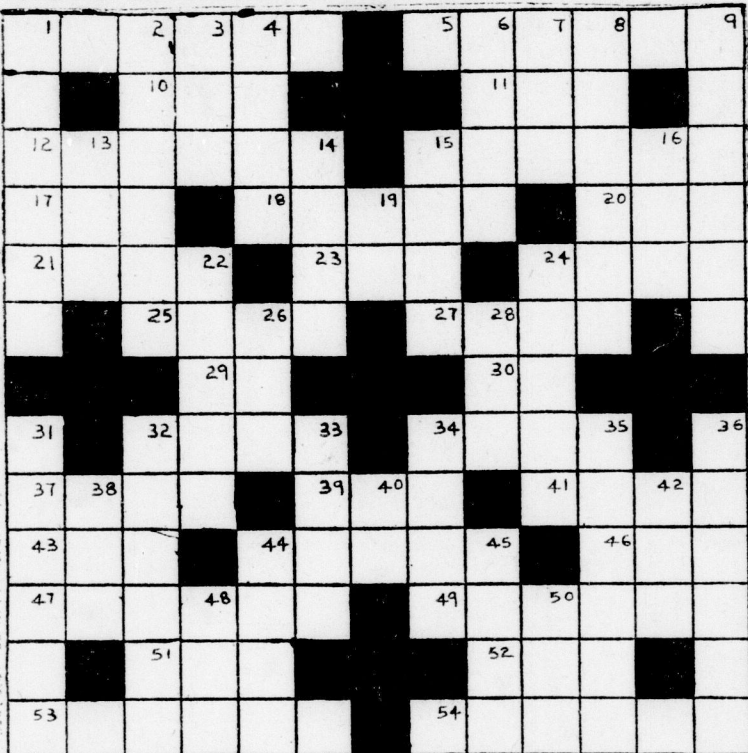

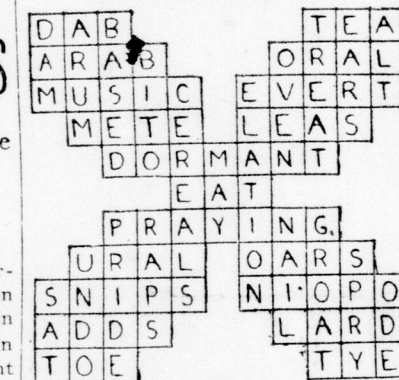

NICKLE FAILS IN APPEAL IN EXPORT LIQUOR CASE

Windsor Judge Rules Export
Papers Are Not Always
Necessary.

BACKS MAGISTRATE

Windsor, March 11.—An important
and far-reaching decision in connection
with the exportation of liquor from
Ontario to the U. S., which
it is believed, establishes a precedent
in whiskey dealings along the Cana-
dian borders, was handed down by
County Judge J. J. Coughlin at Sand-
wich this afternoon, when he decreed
that export papers are not absolutely
essential in liquor transactions be-
tween parties in Ontario and parties
in the United States providing it can
otherwise be proven the liquor is
genuinely intended for export.

The ruling quashes an appeal made
by Attorney-General Nickle of On-
tario against a similar decision ren-
dered by Police Magistrate Gundy of
Windsor last December, when Roy
Steele, a Detroit man, was freed from
a charge of having liquor in a place
other than a private dwelling, and
will, it is believed, exercise consid-
erable bearing in the case of Terrill
Winstead of Detroit, who recently
claimed a big consignment of liquor
seized in this city.

Decision Appealed.
Steele was arrested at Windsor
ferry dock in his automobile without
export papers and \$1,800 worth of
liquor confiscated. Magistrate Gundy
accepted Steele's plea that the whis-
key was intended for Detroit, and
held like Judge Coughlin, that ex-
port papers were not necessary if it
could be proven the shipment was of
bona fide. This decision resulted in
the attorney-general appealing to
higher court, and the case was re-
argued by Crown Attorney Urquhart
before Judge Coughlin at Sandwich
last week.

Winstead claimed the ownership to
several thousand dollars worth of
liquor, seized a few weeks ago in an
automobile when Windsor police
raided the residence of Mrs. Ada L.
Ross, 1418 Douglas avenue. David
MacLachrie, Detroit, arrested in con-
nection with the raid, was later
released as Mrs. Ross. In testify-
ing during the hearing of Mac-
Lachrie, Winstead claimed he pur-
chased the liquor on the Canadian
side, but said he had "missed an ex-
port boat." MacLachrie invited him

Upholds Ruling.

The ruling handed down by Judge
Coughlin today upholds the police
court decision given by Magistrate
Gundy. The judgment against the
crown as rendered reads as follows:
"In interpreting the phrase, 'transac-
tions in liquor,' I am guided by the
opinion expressed by Hodgkins, J. A.,
in Rex versus Gooderham & Worts,
Limited, 560, L.R.P. 186, in the
following: 'Transactions in liquor, is a
comprehensive expression, and where
it takes the form of a purchase, and
includes the making of a con-
tract, payment, delivery and accep-
tance of goods, and consequently
their transit to their lawful destina-
tion.'

"The appellant contends that the
agreement for sale in Detroit was
one transaction and that the delivery
in Windsor was another transaction,
and that the subsequent transporta-
tion of the goods, the course of
which the seizure took place, was no
part of a transaction in liquor be-
tween two parties, but was wholly
the act of one party, that is, the pur-
chaser."

TORONTO GIRL WINS DEPORTATION FIGHT

Muriel Gilmour Allowed To
Remain in United
States.

Detroit, March 11.—Muriel Gilmour,
21, Toronto society girl, today won
her two months' fight against at-
tempts of the government to deport
her.

Miss Gilmour was arrested with
William S. Anderson, son of a wealthy
St. John, N. B., banker, at the Book-
Cadillac Hotel in January of this
year, on a charge of violating im-
migration laws. Anderson was deported
six weeks ago.

Inspector A. M. Doiz of the U. S.
immigration service, today received
word from Washington to the effect
that the warrant of deportation for
which he had applied would not be
granted. No reason for the refusal
was given.

She has been out on bond. Her
