Real Fascination in "The Marriage Maker"-Settings Beautiful.


FINE COMEDY ACT

Most people are from Missouri, and so William de Mille does a risky thing when he allows the plot of "The Marriage Maker" (now at Loew's) to be built around the character of a faun, who is "interesting, if true." Though it has never been proven conclusively that there aren't any fairles, yet the majority profess to find proof beyond their own five senses, entirely unnecessary. So, when you go to see "The Marriage Maker," go with an open mind, be-cause it is the first time the screen has dared to dip into the realm of the purely fantastic for a real flesh and blood picture. In its originality, the picture is frankly interesting. As a comedy, it is utterly delightful. and as a romance it is pleasing.
William De Mille has done everything beautifully, with the characteristic touch of making his picacteristic touch of making his patture as great an appeal to the mind as his brother Cecil usually makes to the eye. "The Marriage-Maker' not only fascinates the attention, but it is produced and screened with great beauty of setting, and is further great beauty of setting, and is further enhanced by the lovely presence of Agnes Ayres and Mary Astor. The male stars are really Jack Holt and Charles De la Roche, but Robert Agnew, one of the younger Paramount players, provides a touch that cannot be overlooked.

Never having seen a faun, it is not easy to say whether Charles De la Roche is well cast or not, but he does seem more at home in this role than anymore at home in this role than anything else he's been seen in.

The Arco Brothers provide something of a sensation in the vaudeville program. With pardonable pride, one of the brothers displays a remarkable muscle development, which to judge from the applause, quite seized the fancy of the large audience. In the whole massive frame, it seems that there isn't the width of a hair that hasn't been developed into muscle, and the result is quite marvellous. The entire act evinces prodigious strength and skill.

For the remainder there is "Alice Lewis," whose songs and stories are average, but the bill again goes to topnotch with a pair who present newness and freshness in the way of comedy. Particularly with the kitchen effect of the second part, their act is delightful.
