THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY. Thursday, March 8, 1884. House met at 3:15 p.m. Members present—Messrs. Young, DeCosmos, Powell, Franklin, Trimble, Jackson, Duncan, Cameron, Bayley, DeCosmos, Andrews.

Mr. DeCosmos said that although this reserve had been made some time ago, it was doubtful whether it had been properly secured to the public. He would therefore move that an address be presented to His Excellency, praying that the necessary steps be taken to secure the reserve to the public forever.

Mr. Bayley said he hoped the lines of the reserve would be properly defined, so that the public should be able to do some of the matter of DeCosmos's Bill. Motion carried.

Mr. Trimble introduced a motion for an appropriation of money for the purpose of erecting light-houses. The House appointed Wednesday next to go into committee on the motion.

Mr. DeCosmos said a great part of this bill was the same as the old Act, and would simply require re-enacting. But the bill contained a great deal of new machinery which would require careful examination.
